

Medford, Roseburg Legion Vie Tonight; Central Point Clips Lockwood Motors 4-1

Central Point Cheney Studs tipped Roseburg Lockwood Motors 3 to 1 here last night in a non-district American Legion junior baseball tangle which saw each club collect only one hit and CP twirler

American Legion junior baseball activity at Cheney field here will continue Thursday when Central Point opposes Grants Pass at 8 p.m. in a non-district tussle.

Pete Stemple is scheduled to pitch for the Cheney Studs with Bill Anhorn held in reserve. Grants Pass pitcher may be Dick Hayes or Dennis Barlow. Central Point line-up is expected to be about the same as last night. There may be a change at one or two positions. Grants Pass has some nine players on the squad from its District 6 title high school team.

The Studs open their district season against Lakeview here Saturday night while Medford goes to Klamath Falls.

Alan McKinnis came within one strike of a no-hit, no-run verdict.

The Cheney club tallied

single markers in the fourth, fifth and sixth innings. There was nary a safe blow until the sixth frame.

Roseburg is making a two-night stand at Cheney field in the old fairgrounds area at the south edge of Medford and tonight opposes the Medford Crater Lake Motors Legion club which topped Central Point last week end. Play ball will be at 8 p.m.

McKinnis walked the first three men he faced in the opening inning, retired the next two on strikeouts and assisted on a grounder to end the inning. He evaded a similar jam the rest of the way although men got to second base against him in the second and fourth innings and to third in the fifth and sixth frames.

In the seventh with two men out on a strikeout and a ground out, McKinnis got two strikes and no balls against Roseburg's Wes Young but his next pitch hit Young to put the Lockwood player on base. Byron Baker, the next batter then smacked his second offering from McKinnis into right field. The ball rolled for a triple when outfielder Dave Brown overran it and Young crossed with the lone Roseburg tally.

Bob Johnson socked a single to right field in the sixth canto for the only Cheney hit. The blow scored Dennis Pfaff who had walked and advanced to third base on a balk and passed ball.

Runs Walked In
The other two Central Point runs were walked home. Roseburg pitcher John Livingston issued three bases on balls and hit one batter to force in one run in the fourth inning.

In the fifth panel Livingston walked Bob Johnson and John Anhorn. A dropped third strike on batter McKinnis enabled Central Point to load the bases. Catcher Baker's throw to first, after dropping the ball, was in time but first sacker Gene Waggoner muffed it. Rick Summers relieved Livingston at this point and issued a base on balls to Loyal Higginbotham to push over a run.

McKinnis had eight strike-

outs, he walked six men and hit one. Livingston struck out 11, walked six and hit two in 4 2/3 innings and Summers fanned two and issued two bases on balls over the rest of the route. McKinnis helped his cause with five assists.

Laurance To Pitch
CP shortstop Higginbotham prevented a Roseburg run in the sixth inning. He snared Livingston's hot liner after Floyd Phillips had reached third base on an error and a passed ball.

Central Point had three men on base in the first inning with two out. A strikeout cut off the threat.

Medford Coach John Kovenz said that Tom Laurance may start on the hill for Crater Lake against Roseburg this evening. He may go about four innings with Dennis Barr possibly finishing on the mound. For Roseburg Mentor Bill Harper may call on Bob Whipple, hurler from Drain high. It will be Whipple's first chugging performance of the season for Lockwood.

Medford's line-up may be just about the same as last Saturday night when Lowell Dean was at first base, Ray Konopasek at second, Ken Durkee at third, and Calvin Dean at shortstop and Ken Jensen, Frank Peterson and Dick Barlow were in the outfield.

Congress Comes Under Pressure Of Legislation

Washington — (UPI) — Congress will be in session at least nine more weeks, but the mounting pressure of major legislation convened the Senate and House at mid-morning today.

Senate Democratic leaders called the body into the unusual morning session to start debate on a bill that would provide loan guarantees and other stimulants for the nation's ailing railroads. Despite administration opposition, odds favored approval.

Day-Night Schedule
The Senate has been put on a day and night schedule to act on railroad, labor, atomic energy, Alaskan statehood and appropriation bills over the next two weeks or so.

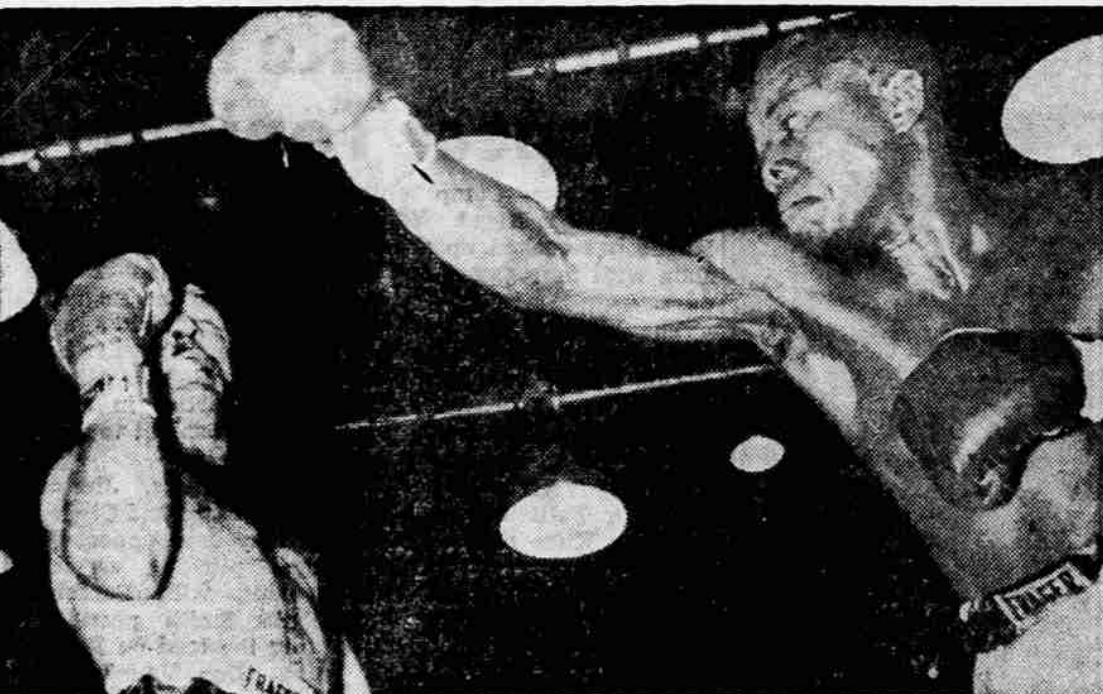
In the House, a final vote approached on President Eisenhower's much-debated request for power to cut U.S. tariffs 25 per cent over the next five years.

The House, too, met two hours earlier than usual to settle the issue: Shall the United States continue its 24-year-old policy of liberal trade or adopt a policy of protectionism designed to erect new barriers against foreign imports?

Defeat Chances Waning
Protectionists frankly admitted their chances of defeating the administration's bill were waning under extraordinary pressures by the White House and Democratic leaders on House members.

If the House quickly winds up the trade bill it was scheduled to begin debate on the President's defense reorganization bill.

Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) today introduced a bill putting legislators under the same conflict-of-interest restrictions as officials in the executive branch of government.

Vancouver Mounties Grab Two-Tilt Lead; Beavers Tip Indians

The Vancouver Mounties, as tight a club in the run department the Pacific Coast league has seen in many a year, moved into a two-game leader over Phoenix today after scoring their third straight victory by a 1-0 score.

Seattle was the victim Tuesday night, marking the Mounties' fifth shutout in their last six games. The Canadians handed Portland a double defeat Monday by the same 1-0 score.

Phoenix meanwhile, possibly feeling the loss of some Giant players recalled by the parent San Francisco club, blew a 6-1 lead to Salt Lake as the Bees rolled to a 10-6 victory.

San Diego, although outfit 14-11, defeated Sacramento, 9-7, and Portland shaded Spo-

kane, 4-3 in other games.

Joe Durham's single off shortstop Phil Shartzler's glove with two out in the ninth inning scored Buddy Peterson with Vancouver's winning run. George Bamberger of the Mounties and Seattle's Max Surkont left the hitters little leeway until the ninth. Surkont allowing only four hits and Bamberger but five.

The victory was Bamberger's sixth against three losses this season, also marking his 98th PCL win. Surkont had allowed Vancouver only two singles before the ninth.

The Rainiers threatened to dent the plate in their half of the final frame when Surkont and Jack Bloomfield hit back-to-back singles with one out, but Bamberger retired the last two batters to halt the rally.

At Phoenix, the Bees erupted in the seventh and eighth innings to win going away. The Giants had taken an early lead before Salt Lake, paced by homers off the bats of Don Williams and Carlos Bernier, began to connect. Andre Rodgers homered for Phoenix.

Good Crowd
A crowd of 3,338, the biggest since opening night, attended the contest.

San Diego also came from behind for the Padres' victory over Sacramento. The Pads broke loose for four runs in the seventh and another in the eighth to overcome a 7-4 Solon lead. Dave Pope homered for the winners.

Portland, humiliated by a 6-1 margin in the Beavers' series with Vancouver last week, finally gave some hitting support to its harassed pitching staff as Howie Judson went the distance for his second victory.

The Beavers collected 10 hits off three Spokane hurlers, scoring a single run in the first, two in the fourth and the deciding marker in the eighth. Judson limited the Indians to six hits, one a 380-foot four-bagger by Jim Gentile.

Senate Passes Bill To Up Duck Stamps To \$3

Washington — (UPI) — The Senate passed and sent to the House today a bill to raise the price of federal duck-hunting stamps from \$2 to \$3, after June 30.

The bill also provides that after subtracting the cost of handling the stamps all remaining revenue after July 1, 1960, would be earmarked for acquiring land for migratory bird refuges and water-fowl protection. The Interior Department would have discretion to open up to 40 per cent of any refuge for hunting.

The Senate commerce committee reported that of \$54,029,540 collected for duck stamps since 1934, only \$7,449,908 had been spent to acquire refuge land. The rest went for administrative costs.
