Housing Problems For Aging Topic of C. of C. Meeting

Ashland — Problems of providing adequate housing for persons more than 65 years old were outlined at a meeting of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce this week.

Speakers were Mrs. Velma Jones, chamber secretary, and Mrs. Fred Rankin, Medford, a member of the Oregon Council on Aging. They said plans for a village of 100 units for senior citizens was being considered.

Mrs. Jones noted that under recent legislation, FHA loans may be obtained for construction of low-rental housing for senior citizens. A sponsoring group is required to provide 10 per cent of the capital investment, either in cash or property.

She said the Jackson County Council on Aging is giving consideration to a 100-unit rental development and several sites at Eagle Point and Rogue River.

Mrs. Rankin pointed out that such a development would provide modern, comfortable living at a rental cost which a couple on pension could afford. Such a village would include some cottage-type structures for couples, and smaller units for men and women who have no families.

She said the county council hopes to get at least one such unit started in the future.

Three Appear in District Court

Raymond La Grande De Marr, Jr., Medford, has been released from the Jackson county jail where he was held on charges of being a fugitive from justice.

De Marr was released when a letter was received by county authorities Monday from Hunterdon county, New Jersey, authorities saying they had insufficient evidence on which to hold De Marr, according to the district court.

In other district court actions, Ray Sargent, no address given, pleaded guilty to charges of making a false statement. He was given a suspended sentence of one year in the county jail. The charges were reduced from that of uttering and publishing a false check.

Gordon Casey, Medford, was fined \$55 after he pleaded guilty to giving liquor to five minors on May 17. Thirty days in the county jail was suspended.

Carlos E. Morrison, no address given, pleaded guilty to failure to stop and give aid to domestic animals, and was fined \$20. Morrison was charged with killing one cow and injuring three May 15 on the Butte Falls highway. The complaint was signed by Verma R. Matthews.

Phair Fined \$100 For Slot Machines

Roseburg — Richard G. Phair, 37, Medford, was fined \$100 and costs by District Judge Warren A. Woodruff Wednesday on a charge of illegal possession of slot machines. Woodruff also signed an order directing Sheriff Ira C. Byrd to destroy the 17 machines found in Phair's possession when he was arrested on an anonymous tip to state police here Sunday.

At the time of his arrest, Phair admitted ownership of the machines but refused to say where he was taking them. Phair, secretary of the Medford Elks club, posted \$500 bond at the time of his arrest and was released from county jail. He was represented at the hearing by his attorney, Robert M. Stults.

Myrtle Creek Woman Arrested for Theft

Mrs. Lanet V. Paroz, 34, Myrtle Creek, was lodged in the county jail by state police early today in connection with the theft of an auto belonging to her ex-husband. Police said they arrested Mrs. Paroz after receiving a bulletin from Roseburg authorities.

She was accompanied by her daughters, aged 3 and 6, who were turned over to juvenile authorities.

Oil Shares Feature Higher Stock Market

New York (UPI) — The stock market, helped by a long list of favorable developments in the world of business, today rose to around its best levels of the year with volume sharply higher.

Oil shares featured the market by rising fractions to more than a point. New highs were set by Amerasia, Cities Service, Continental Oil, Honolulu Oil, Kern County Land, Kerr McGee, Richfield, Phillips, Texas Co., Texas Gulf Producing, and Wilcox.

Drug shares with the exception of American Home prod-

ucts which lost two points, moved higher. DuPont rose a point in the chemicals and gains of nearly a point were set by Allied and Dow.

Railroad issues were higher for the most part with Louisville & Nashville up more than a point.

Contract Let for Ashland Lighting

Ashland — General Electric company, Medford, was awarded a contract by the Ashland city council this week to furnish and install street lighting from the fire station to the hospital along Siskiyou blvd.

The company bid \$6,523.40. Other bidders were the Graybar company, Eugene, \$6,590.84, and Line Material company, Portland, \$7,446.80.

Weldrite company of San Francisco was awarded a contract to furnish poles. The firm bid \$6,384 for 42 poles, the same as the bid submitted by Line Material company. The council chose the Weldrite company's bid because heavier poles were offered.

Other bidders for poles were the Graybar company, \$6,421.80, and Stubbs Electric, Portland, \$6,720. The state highway commission is expected to let a contract for widening the section

of Siskiyou blvd. June 19. M. V. Lininger and sons, Medford, was low bidder on the project at \$107,125.

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
