# Road Blocks on Fresh Cherries Are Removed

Salem—All road blocks to shipment of fresh cherries from Oregon into California and Idaho, provided they have been properly fumigated, have been removed with the establishment of a federal tolerance for use of ethylene dibromide as a fumigant to control cherry fruit fly.

Frank McKennon, chief of the plant industry division of the state department of agriculture, said that the United States Food and Drug administration has declared a tolerance of 25 parts per million of total combined bromide residue as result of fumigation. The Oregon department of agriculture and Oregon State college requested an official tolerance and have been working for it for more than a year. Experimental work at Oregon State college shows that the residues from fumigation of cherries will not exceed the tolerance just established.

Prior to this time, California and Idaho have not accepted fresh cherries from Oregon because of the cherry fruit fly and the unknown residual quantity of the ethylene dibromide fumigation. McKennon pointed out that all fumigation on fresh cherries must be conducted under the supervision of the Oregon state department of agriculture. For California shipment, the ethylene dibromide must be used at the rate of one pound for every 1,000 cubic feet of chamber space, including the load, held for two hours at 70 degrees Fahrenheit or above. The state department of agriculture has approved three fumigation chambers in southern Oregon where fresh cherries may be treated before going over the state line into California. They are Harry Downs, Hugo; W. E. Hohlbauch, 910 SE M. St. Grants Pass, and Oak Grove Furniture company, 2470 West Main st., Medford. No other approved fumigation chambers are listed.
