

Hunter, Miller, Milligan Claim Diadems Here in Oregon State Tournament of PITA

Jim Hunter Jr., Reno, Nev., won the Jim Morris Memorial handicap with a perfect score and five shagunners had 100 straights in the 16-yard singles to highlight Saturday competition in the Oregon State shoot of the Pacific International Trapshooting association at Medford Gun club.

Hunter smashed his 100 from 19 yards to take the open event honoring the late Mr. Morris, who was for some 40 years secretary of the Oregon State Trapshooting association.

Those with 100s in the first half of the singles shooting were Laurence Jones Sr., Condon; Rolfe Simpson, Cornelius; Dr. J. Martin Adams, Klamath Falls; Bob Dudley, St. Helens, and Harry Lupher, Drain.

Events Today

Second 100 to determine the state singles championship will be shot today starting at 9 a.m. The 200 Saturday and Sunday 16-yard targets, in addition to deciding a winner and runner-up, will determine ladies' and veterans' titles and today's 100 will settle the junior and sub-junior issues.

The Oregon State handicap, 100 birds, this afternoon will complete four consecutive days of shooting at the local grounds. Today's shooting all will help determine overall and all-around championships. Overall is on the Friday through Sunday program and all-around is on today's 16-yard and handicap, yesterday's 16-yard and Fridays' doubles.

Runner-up to Hunter in the Morris Memorial was Don Rose, Corvallis with 99, running from 20 yards. Rolfe Simpson, a 24-yarder and Ernie Patton, Myrtle Point, a 22-yarder, tied with 98s and Simpson won the shoot-off for third place 25 to 23.

Shooters observed a minute of silence in memory of Morris before the handicap began Saturday. At the Friday annual meeting of the state association resolutions were passed commemorating the late secretary.

There were 138 entrants in the Saturday singles. Eleven of these had near perfect 99s. Miller Busts 200

Gordon Miller, Drain, and Orley Milligan, Roseburg, collected the major trophies Friday in the first day of championship shooting in the Oregon State shoot of the Pacific International Trapshooting association at Medford Gun club.

Miller cracked a perfect 200 targets to head a field of 99 gunners in the 16-yard class event. He was the Class AA titlist. Milligan annexed the Oregon 16-yard doubles crown with 94 out of 100

In the doubles, Martin Clogston, Medford, was runner-up with 93 count. However, Orlich led all shooters in the event with a 95 bird total and gained the out-of-state hardware. Ohnstead splattered 93.

Charles Collins, Roseburg, won a six-way extra for the A division laurels in the class championships. He broke 75 straight on three rounds of 25, and Marshall Hunt, Bend, 74, for runner-up after they and four others compiled 197s in the regular event. W. W. Hileman, Cottage Grove, and Ken Gilkeson, Roseburg, were eliminated with 24s on the first round and Everett Armstrong, McKenzie Bridge, and Bub Morris, Maupin, went out with 49s on 50.

Fred Gage, Salem, trimmed Jack Maulding, Cottage Grove, 25 to 23 in a run-off for Class C to go after each busted 193. Wanda Blum, Tillamook, and Howard Pernel, Klamath Falls, tied in Class D with 187s and Mrs. Blum won the extra 24 to 23.
