

# Tommy Bolt Wins U. S. Open With 72-hole Total Tally of 283

Tulsa, Okla. — (UPI) — Jut-jawed Tommy Bolt, a once thundefous club thrower who got golfing religion, reached the end of the fairway rainbow Saturday when he calmly battled par and pressure to win the U.S. Open Golf championship.

While more than 40 of the gasping 20,000 people who merely watched him collapsed in the 95 degree heat that blistered the toruous hills and valleys at Southern Hills country club, the 39-year-old one-time carpenter hammered together rounds of 69 — one under par — and 72 for a

wound up four shots on top of Gary Player. The 22-year-old South African, Trsznt, to become the first foreign winner since Ted Ray in 1920, had a final round 71 for 287.

Third came Julius Boros, the 1952 champion who Bolt feared the most, with a 71 for 287. Gene Littler, whose morning 33-34—67 was the tournament's best round, closed with a 76 for 290. Far back at 291 came Bob Rosburg and Wally Burkemo with Don January at 293. Frank Stranahan, only two shots back as the two final rounds started, wound up at 294 along with Ben Hogan as the "little iceman" had a 75-71 to blow his chances for a record fifth victory.

It was Bolt all the way in the big one. He led at the end of the first round with a 71 tied by Julius Boros and Dick Metz. At the end of the second round, he was in front with another one over par 71, good for a one-shot edge on South African Gary Player. And, while the rest of them tumbled, going into the final round he was on top by three shots with a third round 36-33—69 total.

Making a run at him was young Gene Littler, whose third round three under par 33-34—67 was the hottest of the tournament as the Cali-

## Rugged Irishman Gets Double Win In NCAA Track

Berkeley, Calif. — (UPI) — Rugged Ron Delany of Ireland and Villanova, completed one of the great "doubles" in track and field history Saturday when he won the mile and half mile races in the NCAA championships.

Even though Glen Davis of Ohio State set a new world mark of 45.7 in the 440, Delany stole the hearts of the 16,000 fans who cheered every bob of his head in both races.

Delany won the mile with a Silky Sullivan-like, come from behind finish at 4:03.5, a new NCAA record. He toured the 880 in 1:48.6, coming from last place in the nine-man field with 200 yards to go.

As the Irishman hit the tape the crowd was on its feet to give him a thunderous ovation which lasted about three minutes. Delany, his sides heaving, smiled and gave a wave of his hand in acknowledgment.

The only other time in the 37-year history of this meet a runner captured both the mile and half mile crowns was in 1945 when Ross Hume of Michigan turned the trick.

Alex Henderson, an Australian competing for Arizona State at Tempe, set a new American record in the two mile run when he was clocked in 8:46.3. The recognized U. S. mark was 8:49.6, set by Horace Ashenfelter of the New York Athletic club in 1955.

Davis was pressed for all but the final 20 yards by Eddie Southern of Texas in the sizzling quarter mile.

Davis ran in lane 8, while Southern was in lane 4. They stayed even in their staggered lines until they hit the head of the stretch. Then the powerful Buckeye pulled steadily ahead and Southern barely hung on for second place with a clocking of 46.5. Third finisher Jack Herman of California was timed in 46.6 and Ivan Rodriguez of Puerto Rico was clocked in 46.8 for fourth place.

The race was run on a two-turn track and cracked the World mark of 45.8 set by Jim Lea of USC on a one turn track at Modesto, Calif., in 1956.

Don Bowden set the pace for the first three quarters in the mile, with Delany at times running as far back as ninth place and 30 yards back. But midway in the final lap Gale Hodgson of Oklahoma and Jim Grelle of Oregon overtook the tiring pacesetter. It was at this point that Delany turned on the steam.

The Villanova star first caught Bowden but he was still 10 yards behind Hodgson and Grelle, who were running neck and neck at the far turn. But while the two lead-

### Philadelphia Wins 3-2 Over Giants; Padres Wins Sixth

San Francisco — (UPI) — Solly Hemus lined a home run into the right field seats Saturday to give the Philadelphia Phillies a 3-2 victory over San Francisco and drop the Giants to their sixth loss in seven games.

Hemus who now has hit safely in 14 straight games, led off the seventh inning with his third homer of the year to break a 2-2 tie and lift Roman Semproch to his seventh win. It also was the third straight triumph for Philadelphia's rookie right-hander.

The loss went to Ramon Monzant, who took over for Mike McCormick in the fourth inning then surrendered the homerun ball to Hemus. Marv Grissom pitched the last two innings for San Francisco.

The Giants took a 2-0 lead with single runs in the second and third innings but Stan Lopata, playing his first game since he was beamed last Sunday by Larry Jackson of the Cardinals, clubbed a two-run homer in the fourth inning to tie the score.

That blow, which followed a single by Rip Repulski, started McCormick on the way out. Monzant relieved him after the young southpaw had walked Wally Post and given up a single to Harry Anderson.

The attendance for today's game was 16,363, which swelled the seasonal turnout to 511,968 for 32 home games.

San Diego, Calif. — (UPI) — The San Diego Padres made it six Pacific Coast league wins in a row over Sacramento Saturday by scoring four runs in the eighth for a 5-3 victory.

## Tabulation of Fish Crossing Gold Ray Will Be Published

Because of the interest of fishermen and the public as a whole, the Medford Mail Tribune today starts the publication of weekly figures on the fish count at Gold Ray dam on Rogue river.

An Oregon State Game commission tally is kept at Gold Ray of upstream moving adult steelhead and Chinook and silver salmon and of a few suckers moving back and forth across the dam.

The fishery division of

game department uses the count to determine annual trends of the runs and to determine the spawning escapement. Annual trends of different "races" in the runs of steelhead and salmon also are noted. This information is correlated with studies of catches at Gold Beach and other places along the Rogue river system.

Fishermen also use the count as an indication of when to go fishing, although its full value for this purpose is subject to some question.

Game commission count at Gold Ray has been a continuous full 12-month operation since 1942. Until 1948 every fish crossing the dam was tallied. Since then a sample

count plan has been used. Fish are tabulated during certain periods of the day each day. A formula of the Oregon State college statistics department is applied to compute the total. This sample count has proved within 0.58 per cent of error.

Present tally man is Arthur Besaw, Eagle Point. His station is a small hut on the fish ladder. The ladder at the hut is raked off with a grill and gate. At the bottom of the gate there is a white-painted flashboard. When the gate is raised and the fish are permitted to swim over the board, they are tabulated through a window in the side and bottom. There is a rule that the taller must not take his eyes off the flashboard when the gate is open.

Count is separated as to species and size.

Besaw currently makes a count during the morning on one day and in the afternoon of the next. Fish at Gold Ray do not move at night and the gate is closed during hours of darkness.

Chinooks move up the ladder April through September, reaching their peak in June. Summer steelhead run is late April to Nov. 15 and winter steelhead Nov. 16 until mid-May. Silvers start their run in November, straggling sometime into January.

A number of game commission employees have started their careers at the station at Gold Ray. Harvey Cassman, Central Point, retired several years ago after 15 years. Bert Peck, who recently retired as foreman at the Central Point screening shop, worked first at the counting job.

Operation of the counting station is not open to view by the public because it is located in the switch yard of the California Oregon Power company which uses the dam to generate electricity.

## Medford Delegation Places High in Meet

Portland — The Medford delegation to the state AAU track meet at Jefferson high school in Portland took two first places and three second places Saturday.

Mike Hood, McLoughlin junior high school, took a first place in the broad jump leaping for 19 feet, 10 1/2 inches. He took second in the high jump by barreling up and over five feet, six inches. The young trackman also took fifth in the high hurdles.

Albert Funtston, Hood's teammate, placed first in the shot put by heaving the lead ball 55 feet, five inches to set a new McLoughlin record. He also tied for third place in the low hurdles.

Walt Ayres, McLoughlin, tied for third place in the high jump with a mark of five feet, three inches.
