# School Asked to Withdraw Books

Portland—(UPI)—The Portland Urban League's education committee has asked that 2,000 volumes of a reading reference book be withdrawn from Portland public schools.

The book, "Adventures for Readers," used in all the eighth grades in the city, contains a selection portraying an objectionable Negro stereotype, the committee said.

The 1947 edition of the book was adopted for use in Portland public schools in 1950. It is this edition the committee objects to, they said, because of the portrayal of a fat Negro cook who appears as a member of a family circle in a short play and speaks poor English in a Negro dialect.

The committee made no formal protest but met informally with Dr. Norman Hamilton, assistant superintendent of schools, John Holley, director of community services for the league, said.

Although the cook has only a few lines in the play, "she represents what can be easily recognized as one of the harsher Negro stereotypes," Holley said.

# Two Tuberculosis Cases Reported

Two cases of tuberculosis, one in Jacksonville and one in Central Point, were among communicable diseases reported to the Jackson county department of health during the week ending June 13.

Other cases reported were mumps, 15 Medford, 2 Camp White, and one each Talent, Gold Hill and Central Point; German measles, 7 Medford, and 1 each Ashland, Central Point and Camp White; measles, 3 in Medford and Ashland and 1 in Camp White; scarlet fever, 2 Central Point and 1 Medford.

Four cases of chicken pox were reported in Ashland and 1 Medford, and 1 case of whooping cough in Jacksonville, influenza in Medford, meningococcal infection in Medford and 5 strep throat Ashland.

Four cases of pneumonia also were reported in Medford.

# News Briefs...

### CURFEW LIFTED

Nicosia, Cyprus — (UPI)—Britain lifted its 24-hour curfew on Nicosia early Saturday just 2 1/2 hours before the first of 700 battle-ready paratroops took off from England under orders to restore order in this strategic Mediterranean island.

The lifting of the curfew marked a lull in the Greek-Turk rioting which has caused 14 deaths on Cyprus last week.

### NEGOTIATIONS ADJOURNED

Detroit — (UPI)—Auto-contract negotiations Saturday stand adjourned for the weekend with negotiators meeting the unhurried pace they have set for 12 weeks.

The United Auto Workers will resume negotiations at 1 p.m. Monday at General Motors, 10 a.m. Monday at Ford and 1:30 p.m. Tuesday at Chrysler.

### ACCEPT INCREASE

London — (UPI)—London's strike-immobilized buses will be back on the job, probably late this week.

Leaders of 50,000 striking busmen voted Friday night to accept a \$1.25 pay increase and call off the six-week walkout. It was almost certain the members would approve their leaders' decision at a mass meeting this week end.

### FACTORY BURNS

Live Oak, Fla. — (UPI)—Fire of undetermined origin burned through a boat factory and a tobacco warehouse here Friday night, destroying both and damaging a cement plant. Damage was unofficially estimated at \$500,000.

All of Live Oak's firemen, using four trucks, fought the fire.

### FIRE KILLS FOUR

Philadelphia — (UPI)—Four children died Saturday when fire swept a West Philadelphia home on the fringe of an area described as a "fire belt" by city council more than a year ago.

It was this city's worst fire involving children's deaths since seven youngsters died in a tenement fire in March, 1957.

### JOIN ATTACK

Tokyo — (UPI) — The Communist radio reported Saturday that North Viet Nam's Reds have joined the worldwide attack on Yugoslavia's President Tito, branding him a "revisionist" who has "smeared the Socialist camp."

A Peiping broadcast quoted Lo Xuan, a member of North Vietnam's Lao Dong party, as saying Tito aims at undermining world Communism.

### VOICES HOPE

Washington — (UPI) — Key members of the Senate Aviation subcommittee voiced hope Saturday that the group can complete action quickly on legislation to provide a single air control agency as demanded by President Eisenhower.

Chairman A. S. Mike Monroney (D-Okla.) said the subcommittee will resume hearings Monday on its own bill introduced two weeks ago to provide such an agency to control civilian and military flights.

### Policeman Cut by Four Teenage Girls

Albany, Ore. — (UPI)—Three Albany policemen suffered multiple cuts and bruises Friday while trying to jail four teenage girls who had escaped from Hillcrest school for girls in Salem.

Officers said the girls scratched and kicked and screamed while they were being hustled out of a restaurant and taken to jail. At the lockup one of the escapees set off a fire alarm. The girls were 14 to 17.

### 'A LITTLE ROCKY'

Washington — (UPI)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles flew home ahead of schedule from a Princeton university reunion because of a new outbreak of violence in Lebanon.

At the airport Dulles said he came back because he would feel "a little easier" at home base. He said he felt "that the conditions in the Middle East looked a little rocky and disturbed."

### BACK HOFFA

New York — (UPI)—Four Detroit police officers backed Teamsters chief James R. Hoffa Friday in his claim that he was in Seattle on the day the government has charged he was getting wiretap instructions in Detroit.

Other witnesses testified that Owen Brennan, Detroit Teamsters officials, had been injured in a racing accident which would have prevented him taking part in the wiretap demonstration.

### STOWS AWAY

Seattle, Wash. — (UPI)—Charles MacMillan, a sandy-haired nine-year-old with a butch haircut, said Saturday

he stowed away aboard two planes during his odyssey between Los Angeles and Seattle in search of "friends."

The boy, who was wearing a pair of ragged blue jeans, a white T-shirt and no socks, said he boarded a Trans-World Airlines plane at Los Angeles Friday and flew to San Francisco where he stowed away aboard Western Airlines Flight 628 which arrived here at 10:30 p.m.

Headquarters of the cruiser and destroyer force of the Pacific Fleet said three others were treated for carbon dioxide poisoning at the Naval hospital but all are in satisfactory condition.

Names of the dead men are being withheld pending notification of next of kin.

### STRIKE THREATENS

New York — (UPI)—A general maritime strike which would idle ships in ports from Boston to Seattle Saturday appeared set for Monday.
