New York (UPI)—Stocks mounted to new highs for 1958 today.

All sections of the market joined the rise which began last week.

Business news contributed to the bullish atmosphere and helped put prices higher.

Steel operations featured by rising to 64.4 per cent of rated capacity which brought the output index to 108.1 per cent of the 1947-48 average.

The industry therefore was producing 8 per cent more steel than it was 10 years ago.

Steel shares recorded small net gains. High sales of autos helped lift the auto group by fractions. The market ignored the Middle East situation and bought heavily of oil issues, many of which set new highs for the year.

Railroads moved up fractions to a point in Northern Pacific. Aircrafts strengthened with the best showing in Boeing and Bendix.

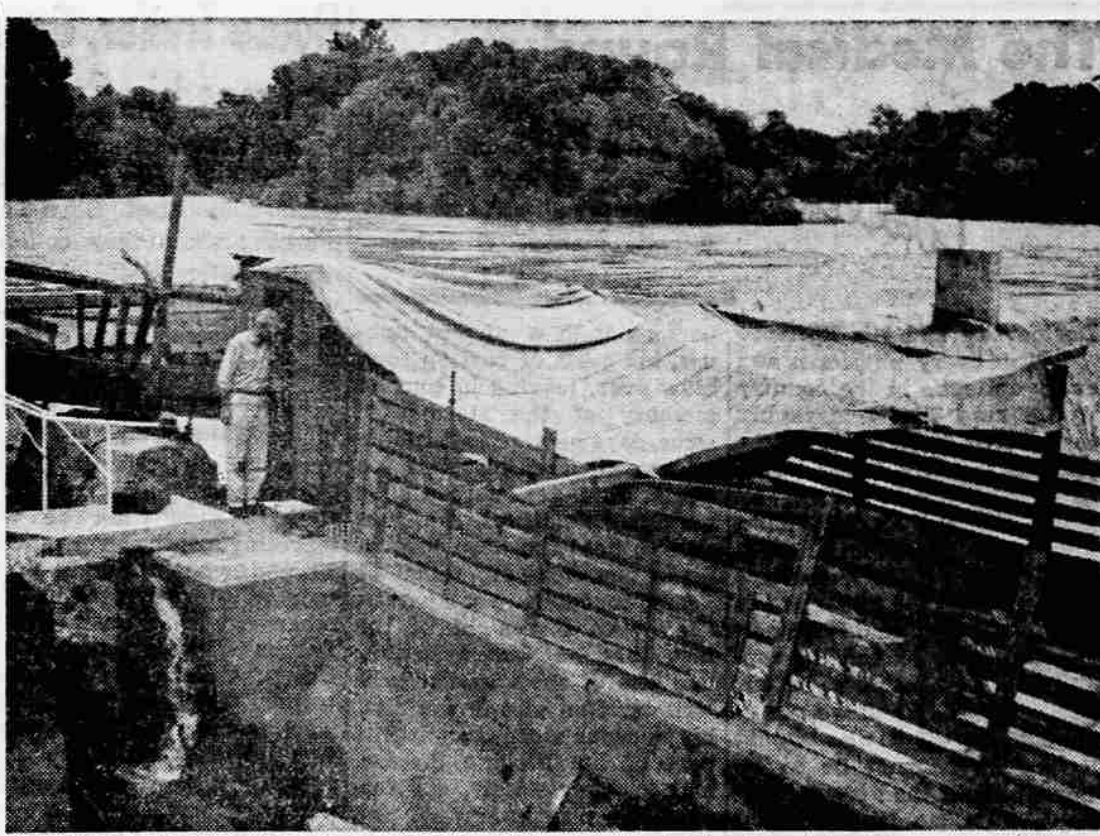
Fred M. Brown, 1701 Stratford Way, Medford, died this morning at his residence. Funeral arrangements will be announced by Perl Funeral home.

MARRIAGES DECREASED

New York — (UPI) — The Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. revealed there were 4.2 per cent fewer marriages in the U. S. in 1957 than in 1956. The drop—from 9.4 per 1,000 Americans to 8.9 per 1,000—was heaviest during September through December. This four-month period coincided with the start of the recession.

City Crews Install Black Oak Main

Water department crews today began laying a twenty-four main along Black Oak dr. from Country Club dr. to Walden pl., according to Robert L. Lee, Medford water superintendent.

Lee also reported completion of an eight-inch main along Fourth st., between Bartlett st. and Riverside ave. Installing the 8-inch pipe along Black Oak dr. is expected to take approximately 10 days. The completion will allow subsequent street paving.

Purpose of extending the main along Black Oak, known as the Barneburg feeder main, is to furnish water for the Country Club Manor subdivision and the southeast part of Medford.
