

Scientists Find Two Drinks Will Make It Unsafe to Drive Auto

New York — (UPI) — Two scientists put liquor into people experimentally and found that two stiff drinks within an hour were enough to make it unsafe for a man to drive a car.

That's a drastic reduction in number of drinks usually permitted under driving laws in many states. In effect these laws say it takes about six stiff drinks within an hour to justify the accusation that someone has been driving while drunk.

Legally the question of whether you're under the influence depends upon how much alcohol is in the blood. If it comes up to 0.15 per cent, you're drunk to drive.

Lessons Afore

But Dr. T. A. Loomis and T. C. West of the University of Washington, Seattle, say that they have shown experimentally that one third that amount (0.05 per cent) is enough to lessen a man's ability to keep his car on the road and to respond promptly to changing traffic lights.

Therefore, two drinks have made him drunk for driving purposes and present laws are

"too lenient," they concluded. They argued that it takes eight to 10 ounces of 100-proof liquor consumed within an hour to produce a blood level of 0.15 per cent. If you figure that one and a half ounces of 100 proof liquor makes a stiff drink, then six such drinks add up to nine ounces. If that is so, only two stiff drinks will produce a blood alcohol level of 0.05 per cent, they say.

Their experiments showed also that the first few drinks do not bestow a "quick tolerance" which make the next few less effective in kicking up the blood alcohol level. Their people were tested over five-hour periods and the drinks were just as intoxicating as those of the first.

Ten Persons Tested

They experimented with 10 men and a set of standard car controls (steering wheel and accelerator and brake pedals) which controlled a miniature automobile suspended over a moving belt which represented the road. The men at the wheel could move the car to left or right or "speed" it or "stop" it by controlling the belt with accelerator or brake.

First, the men were trained into expertness in operating this apparatus. Then they were put to operating it with increasing amounts of alcohol in their blood (put there by martinis, manhattans and bourbons). The requirements were to keep the car evenly on the "road" and to respond promptly to the green, red or amber of a miniature traffic light.

"All the subjects showed some impairment of function at blood alcohol concentration of 0.05 per cent," they reported to the Yale University Center of Alcohol Studies.

Oregon Professor Of Law Appointed To Supreme Court

Salem — (UPI) — Gov. Robert D. Holmes Sunday announced the appointment of Kenneth J. O'Connell, law professor at University of Oregon, to the State Supreme Court to fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Justice James T. Brand, 71.

O'Connell, 48, will take the post July 1, the date of Justice Brand's retirement from the court. Brand has accepted a position as a professor of law at Stetson University College of Law at St. Petersburg, Fla. Bar Plaque Winner.

A native of Bayfield, Wis., and a Democrat, O'Connell joined the law faculty at the university in 1935. In 1953 he won the Oregon Bar Association plaque for "outstanding contribution" to the legal profession.

O'Connell left the law school in 1944 to enter private practice in Eugene and returned to the law school staff as a full professor in 1947.

He is recognized as a leading authority on property law. He must seek election to the post in November if he wishes to remain on the court. He can conduct a write-in campaign or his name can get on the ballot if he gets petitions bearing signatures of 22,078 registered voters.

American Priests Released by Reds

Hong Kong — (UPI) — Communist China Saturday freed two American Roman Catholic priests who served out five-year terms in Red prisons on spy and sabotage charges.

Released were Fathers Joseph P. McCormick, a Maryknoll priest from Ossington, N. Y., and Cyril Wagner, a Franciscan priest from Pittsburgh, Pa.

Both told the United Press International Hong Kong bureau by telephone from Shanghai that they were in good health and "feel great." They said they would leave Shanghai by ship for Hong Kong next Friday.

The release of Fathers McCormick and Wagner left four Americans still in Red Chinese prisons. Two are serving life sentences, one a 20-year term and the other a 15-year term. All are civilians.

Tokyo — (UPI) — Communist China Saturday reported substantial gains in all sectors of the nation's economy during May.

Two Nuclear Tests Reported by AEC

Washington — (UPI) — The Atomic Energy Commission announced Saturday that two nuclear detonations occurred Friday afternoon on Bikini and Eniwetok atolls as part of the current U. S. test series in the Pacific.

The terse AEC announcement gave only the barest details. It did not specify how large the explosions were.

Moscow — (UPI) — Russia has agreed to send scientific experts to Geneva July 1 to begin negotiations for control of nuclear tests, it was announced Saturday.

Building Industry Declared To Be Out Of Recession Slump

Washington — (UPI) — The government says the home-building industry has pulled out of its recession slump. It reports home and apartment construction in May returned to a boom-time rate of more than a million a year.

The Labor Department said work started on 105,000 non-farm homes and apartments last month — an 11 per cent increase over April and slightly more than usual for May.

Weakest in South

Allowing for seasonal factors, the annual rate of housing starts reached 1,010,000. The rate for most of the past five years was over a million, but it dropped during the recession beginning last summer.

The department said a preliminary survey showed home-building rose everywhere in the nation, but was weakest in the South.

A less optimistic note was sounded by the Federal Reserve Board which released statistics showing the business downturn has been "relatively sharper" than it was in the 1948-49 recession.

Profits Slump

The board said corporate profits have slumped 25 per cent since the beginning of the drop-off last year through the first quarter of this year. In spite of the skid in profits, prices continued to climb.
