Election year note:  
The house of representatives rejects three major changes in the defense reorganization bill. President Eisenhower had backed these changes strongly, contending that they would strengthen our military establishment and make it more efficient. The house supported its own armed services committee against the President, turned down the changes he asked for, passed the bill and sent it on to the senate.

The vote generally followed party lines, with Republicans for and Democrats against the President's proposals.

WHO is right—the house or the President?  
I wouldn't know. The issues involved are highly technical, and an ordinary layman isn't competent to pass an opinion on them.

But—President Eisenhower is generally accepted as the world's foremost soldier. It stands to reason that when it comes to military matters he knows what he is talking about and isn't playing election year politics.

This is the issue:
