As far as storms go, Alma was a weak sister. Winds reached only 50 miles per hour at the height of the storm Sunday morning. Its center hit a few miles south of Brownsville.

The first tropical storm of last season was Audrey, the killer hurricane that struck Cameron Parish, La., with the loss of 353 lives and millions of dollars in damage. Audrey came 12 days later by the calendar than Alma.

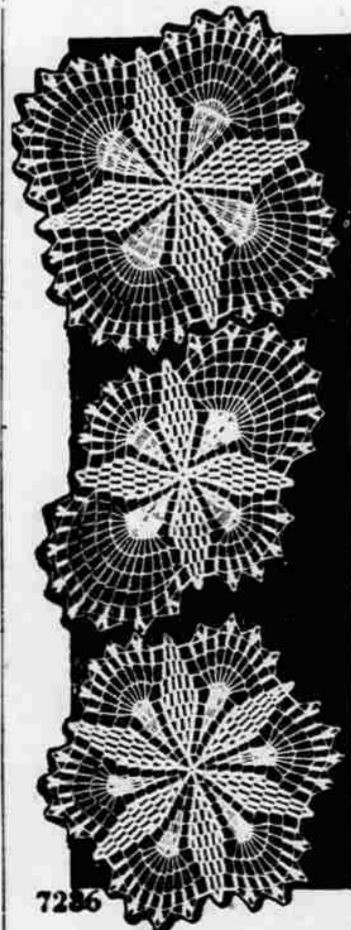
