

Newcombe Triumphs First Time on Hill for Redlegs

A beaming "new" Don Newcombe today credited it all to that "old" psychologist—Birdie Tebbetts.

Newcombe had that new look in a lot of respect Wednesday night. He was pitching in a Cincinnati uniform for the first time, he was working under Tebbetts for the first time and when it was all over, he was a winner for the first time this season following six straight losses with the Dodgers.

Big News, shared by the Dodgers last Sunday, did it with a 6-1 victory over

St. Louis but he insisted that Tebbetts share his hour of triumph.

The canny Redleg manager made a special trip to the mound after the Cardinals loaded the bases on three successive singles with one out in the ninth.

Birdie Talks Him Home
"I know you... you are going to finish this," Tebbetts said. "Take your time... get in an argument if you want to slow down."

Newcombe promptly retired pinch hitters Irv Noren and Hobbie Landrith to end the game.

"Walt Alston would have had me out of there," said the huge right-hander, who gave up the Cards' only run when Stan Musial tagged him for his 12th homer in the first inning.

Good as Newcombe was for the Redlegs, the Dodgers did some rejoicing of their own over the showing of rookie Stan Williams, who shut out the Phillies, 3-0, on four hits.

Williams out-duelled Robin Roberts for his second victory since being recalled from St. Paul.

The game was marked by a fifth-inning shower of beer cans from Philadelphia fans, who didn't let up until umpire Frank Dascoli threatened to forfeit the game to Los Angeles. The uproar all came about following Joe Pignatano's two-run homer, which some of the fans felt had curved foul. Carl Furillo made the rumpus a purely academic one when he singled home another run in the sixth.

Way's Rode Bench
Whitey Lockman, given a chance to start when Willie Mays was benched for the first time this season, rapped out a 10th inning single to give the Giants a 2-1 win over the Pirates.

Lockman's single sent Bob Friend down to his sixth setback. The winner was Giel.

Eddie Mathew's 14th home run was wiped out when rain caused postponement of the Milwaukee-Chicago game with the Braves ahead, 1-0, in the second inning. The Braves still led the National League by two games.

Casey Stengel's parting message before leaving New York was "Watch our smoke on the road," and the Yankees made him look good by taking their second straight from the Cleveland Indians, 3-2.

Art Ditmar got his first starting assignment of the season and turned it into his first victory. He didn't allow a hit until the sixth when the Indians scored both their runs but Ryne Duren took over in the seventh, retired the last seven men in a row and wrapped it up.

Pappas Wins
Milt Pappas, a 19-year-old fastballer, out-pitched 41-year-old Murry Dickson in Baltimore's 5-3 triumph over Kansas City.

The A's went ahead with two runs in the first inning—all they ever got off Pappas—but Gus Triandis's 14th homer with one on tied the score in the sixth. Pappas later belted a double that produced the tie-breaking run.

Boston snapped Chicago's four-game winning streak, 13-9, with a 15-hit attack that included homers by Marty Keough, Don Buddin, Jackie Jensen, Frank Malzone and Ted Williams.

Rain washed out the Detroit-Washington game in the fourth inning after the Senators had taken a 3-2 lead with the help of Neil Chrisley's two-run homer.

Antlerless Deer Hunt Plans Told

Portland — A plan for a unit system for tubing antlerless deer will be presented to the Oregon Game commission for its consideration when it meets July 19 to set the 1938 hunting regulations. John McKean, chief of the game division, said that if the unit system is adopted it will mark the end of the general either-sex hunt which has been in effect since 1932.

This does not mean that the taking of either-sex deer will also come to an end, McKean said. In order to harvest surplus numbers of deer on the various herd ranges, some does as well as bucks must be taken. However, the unit system will not only control the number of hunters in a unit but also control the number of animals taken from each specific area.

The unit hunt will not allow the wide freedom of choice that hunters have had during the either-sex seasons of the past. Under the new system, a hunter would decide in advance which area he wanted to hunt, apply for a permit, and take his chances in a drawing. This would disperse the hunting pressure throughout the state and eliminate any concentration of hunters as has often occurred on several popular herd ranges during past either-sex seasons.

Buck Season Not Affected
In no way will the unit hunt affect the general buck season. Hunters could still exercise their freedom of choice of hunting territory for the taking of buck deer.

In order to achieve a kill of some 30,000 antlerless deer — about the average number taken each year since 1932 — it would be necessary to issue some 400,000 permits. This may seem like a lot of permits but in reality a conservative minimum when past kill records and hunter success are analyzed.

According to past kill records a fourth of the hunters holding permits would kill their buck during the general buck season, eliminating about one-half of the actual participants would be successful in taking a deer during the unit hunt season.

The problem of handling an estimated 300,000 applications and the issuance of the 400,000 permits through a drawing is now being straightened out by the game staff as they prepare the plan for presentation to the commission at the July hearing.

60 Units Planned
The plan as it is established now calls for a total of 60 antlerless deer units according to major herd ranges. Forty-five of these are on the mule deer ranges of eastern Oregon.

A hunting map would be included in the hunting regulations synopsis, in addition to a large scale map to be issued to each license agent for inspection by prospective applicants in selecting the unit of their choice. Only the number of permits required to achieve the desired kill in each unit would be issued.

McKean said that uniform dates for all units would be desirable and that the hunts should be held the latter part of the general buck season so that hunting parties could plan their trips together. Only those hunters with unused tags would be allowed to participate. Permits would be issued free.

The game chief said that in discussing the unit system during the past year it has received full acceptance from most of the organized sportsmen's organizations in the state. The July hearing will give all hunters an opportunity to voice their views on the proposal.
