Scottish Rite men will join their wives for refreshments. All wives, mothers, sisters and widows of Scottish Rite men are invited to attend.

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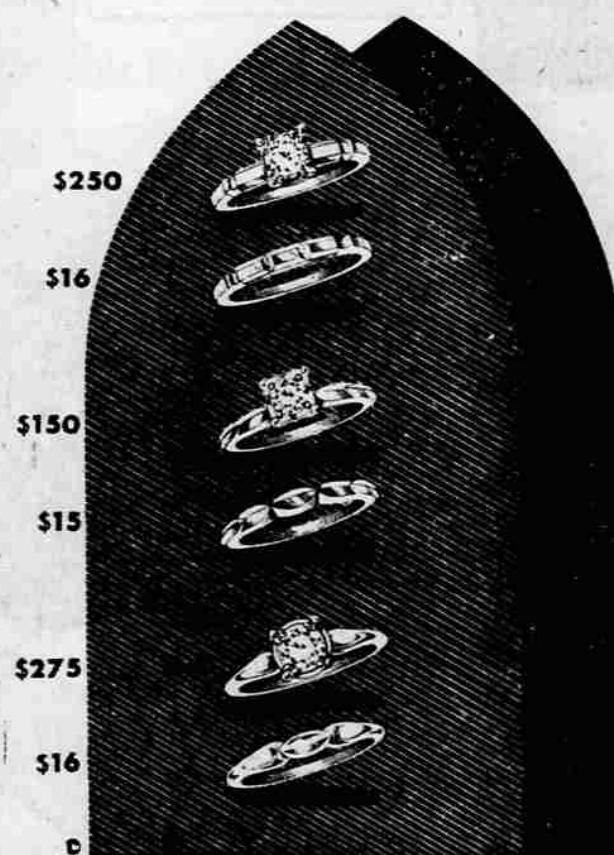
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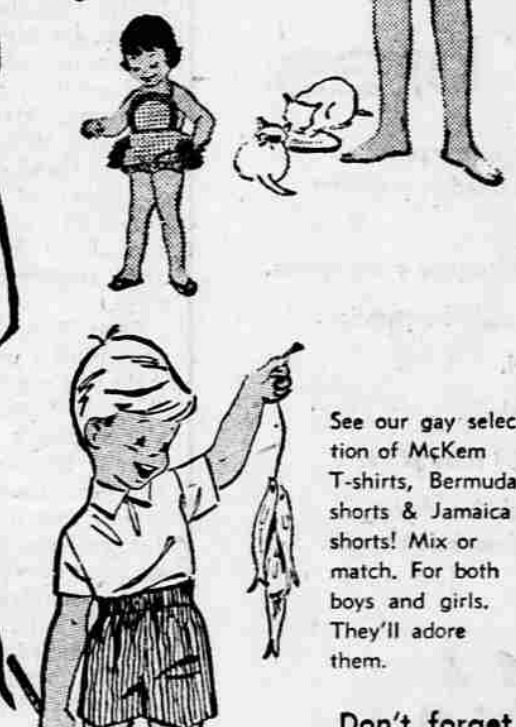
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
