22 Mumps Cases Reported Last Week

Twenty-two cases of mumps were among the communicable diseases reported to the Jackson county health department for the week ending June 20, according to Dr. A. Erin Merkel, public health physician.

The cases included 14 in Medford, four in Phoenix, and two each in Talent and Shady Cove.

One case of influenza was reported in Phoenix, and one case of tuberculosis was reported in Medford. Two German measles cases were reported in Ashland, two in Rogue River, one in Eagle Point and one in Jacksonville.

There was one case of pneumonia reported in Ashland. Four persons had whooping cough in Medford, and three Medford residents had chicken pox.
