# Anti-Trust Laws On Pro Sports Main House Issue

Washington — (UPI) — The house started choosing up sides today in a battle over how far Congress should go in applying anti-trust laws to professional sports.

activities" of professional baseball, football, basketball and hockey but would exempt sports activities "reasonable and necessary" to preservation of the game.

There were three major sides to the fight: a judiciary committee bill pushed by Chairman Emanuel Celler (D-N.Y.) and a compromise between the two proposed by Rep. Albert W. Cretella (R-Conn.).

The Keating bill deletes the words "reasonable and necessary" to give a flat exemption to such practices.

"He is very nice," said the 26-year-old Pan American purser, "but there is definitely no romantic connection."

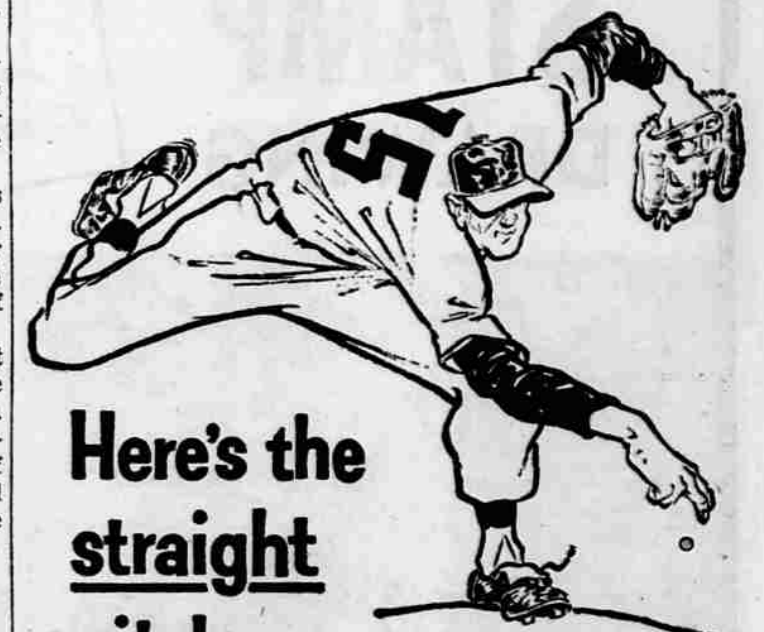
Meanwhile, the Shah continued the rounds of luncheons, dinners and receptions mapped out for him on his four-day visit to San Francisco.
