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Wildcat Strike at Missile Plant Ends

Detroit — (UPI) — Double-barreled action by the Macomb county sheriff's department and the United Auto Workers International Union today all but ended the wildcat strike at the Redstone-Jupiter missile plant.

More than 5,500 of the 7,500 non-union day shift employees at the government-owned, Chrysler-operated missile plant showed up for work — the largest working force in the plant since the wildcat action started Monday morning.

Macomb Sheriff Harley Ensign called in more than 100 city officers from four suburban towns to reinforce his deputies and insure safe passage for workers through the picket lines.
