

Farrell Chalks Up 4th Verdict In Relief Role For Philadelphia

Dick Farrell, a 24-year-old "Boston strong boy," is the National League's answer to New York's Yankee speed king, Ryne Duren.

A 6-3, 220-pound "bomber," who National leaguers say throws every bit as hard as Duren, Farrell is working on his second straight year of spectacular relief work for the Philadelphia Phillies. He compiled a 10-2 record and 2.39 earned run average last season and so far this year stands 4-2 with an amazing 1.23 ERA.

Farrell, who was pretty much overlooked while teammate Jack Sanford was voted rookie of the year in 1957, picked up his fourth victory Wednesday night when the Phillies shaded the Chicago Cubs, 5-4, in 10 innings. The powerful right-hander took

over from fading Ray Semproch in the seventh inning and limited the Cubs to one hit over the last 3 2/3 innings.

Fernandez Triples

The Phillies pushed over the winning rally in the 10th when Wally Post walked with one out, Harry Anderson hit into a force play and Chico Fernandez followed with his second triple of the game. The blow dealt Chicago relief ace Don Elston his fifth defeat against six victories, and prevented the Phillies from dropping into the cellar.

The St. Louis Cardinals moved to within 2 1/2 games of first place when they beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3-1, and the San Francisco Giants clobbered the Milwaukee Braves, 10-2, in the other National League games. The Kansas City Athletics shaded the Washington Senators, 4-3, in the only American league victory.

The Phillies, who had been scoreless for 23 innings, took a 1-0 lead in the third inning on a double by Anderson and Fernandez' first triple and added two more in the fifth on Stan Lopata's ninth home run. Another run in the sixth made it 4-3 but the Cubs tied the score with tree runs in the seventh with the help of an error by Anderson.

Rosensohn Ring Fray Promoter

Los Angeles—(UPI)—William Rosensohn, a slim, young business executive with a love for sports and the nerve to make a quick decision, today was embarked on a new career—promoting a world's championship heavyweight fight.

It took a combination of circumstances for the 38-year-old Rosensohn to step into the tangled Los Angeles fight situation and pick up the Floyd Patterson-Roy Harris title bout tentatively set for Aug. 18.

"It was mostly a case of being in the right place at the right time," Rosensohn told a press conference at which he was introduced as the new promoter, replacing Al Weill who failed to win California Athletic commission approval.

Rumored Association

Rosensohn moved in immediately when it appeared Weill would not be approved because of rumored associations with gambler Frank Carbo. The TV executive resigned from his firm, hustled out to Houston, Tex., and was on the spot when it was officially announced Wednesday Weill's application had been disapproved. D'Amato was there to watch a fight and Harris lives nearby.

Within a matter of hours he had D'Amato's signature for Patterson, and then drove to Cut and Shoot, Tex., to get Harris signed for the same terms Weill promised—\$100,000.

Rosensohn then contacted veteran fight promoter Jack Hurley of Seattle who had put on the Pete Rademacher-Patterson bout last summer. Hurley agreed to become Rosensohn's advisor and promotion director for the fight.

And the athletic commission in taking his application indicated it would be a mere formality for him and the bout is to be approved.

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Budge Patty Choice in Net Tangle

Wimbledon, England—(UPI)—Budge Patty, the dapper dandy who won the title here in 1950, was expected to join two Americans in the third round of men's singles in the Wimbledon tennis championships today, but signs pointed to another battering for the U.S. delegation.

The mustachioed Patty, who hails from Los Angeles, but spends most of his time in Paris, was pitted against young Los Angeles player Bob Perry in one second-round match.

The winner, and Patty was the experts' choice, would join eighth-seeded Barry McKay of Dayton, Ohio, and young Mike Green of Miami, Fla., in the third round. McKay and Green won their second-rounders Wednesday before rain forced a postponement of many matches.

Because of the rain, today's program included a hedge-podge of second and third round matches in men's singles and women's doubles.

Gibson Advances

Going into today's matches only seven Yanks still were "alive" in men's singles, and that number was expected to fall to as low as four or five by nightfall. Only five American women still were competing in women's singles, including defending champion Allie Gibson of New York who faced a third-round match today against Mexican star Yolanda Ramirez.

Three other Yanks hoped to move into the third round today in addition to the Patty-Perry winner. But Nick Carter of San Francisco was up against former U.S. junior champion Rod Laver of Australia; Greg Grant of San Marino, Calif., faced Bob Mark, a "second-line" Aussie veteran of international tournaments; and Gardner Mulloy of Denver, Colo., risked his 44-year-old legs against John Hurry of South Africa.

MacKay, who scored a 6-1, 9-7, 6-2 victory Wednesday over Eric Bulmer of Britain, and Green, 7-5, 6-1, 6-4 winner over lesser-known Aussie Bill Kearney, both were idle in singles today although Green was scheduled in doubles.

Harold Connolly Says Yanks Will Beat Russians

Helsinki, Finland—(UPI)—Harold Connolly of Boston, the world hammer-throwing record-holder, predicted today that the American men would soundly beat the Russians in their track and field meet at Moscow next month.

"Our men will give the Russians a sound beating, but the Russians are favorites against our girls in their meet," Connolly said.

Harold and his Czech athlete wife, Olympic women's discus champion Olga, arrived here Tuesday night for a 14-day tour of Finland during which they will appear in six international track and field meets.
