

Dodgers Whip Milwaukee Eighth Consecutive Time; Cards Take Sixth Straight

The Dodgers have a date for the World Series — and just so no one can call 'em Bum Stealers, they're trying to get the Braves to join them. The Dodgers are still mired in last place but they're No. 1 on the list for giving Milwaukee trouble this season. They have now beaten the World Champion Braves eight times in a row since last Sept. 12.

Don Drysdale did the honors last night with a 4-1 triumph over the Braves that silenced their National League to one and a half games. Drysdale pitched 7 2/3.

The lanky 31-year-old fast-baller got down Milwaukee on eight hits and added a bit of icing to the victory cake with a seventh-inning homer for lower Lew Burdette.

Southpaw Johnny Antonelli limited Cincinnati to seven hits in pitching San Francisco to a 6-1 decision. Antonelli was locked in a 1-1 pitching duel with Harvey Haddix until the eighth when the Giants rallied for four runs, includ-

ing Orlando Cepeda's 15th homer with two men on base.

The St. Louis Cardinals beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-2, for their sixth straight win in the only other National League game scheduled.

Three errors contributed to the downfall of the Pirates, who lost their sixth straight. Left fielder Bob Skinner dropped Stan Musial's fly ball for a two-base error in the seventh and the Cards went on to score three runs on four hits off Vern Law.

Another pair of errors by the usually brilliant-fielding Bill Mazeroski in the ninth enabled the Cardinals to add two more unearned runs. Lindy McDaniel gained his fourth victory although requiring relief from Larry Jackson in the eighth. Frank Thomas hit his 21st homer for the Pirates.

Hector Lopez of the Kansas City Athletics supplied the big noise in the American League with three home runs that sank the Washington Senators, 8-6, in 12 innings.

Lopez' third homer of the game came in the 12th with one on off Vito Valentini and earned ageless Murry Dickson his sixth victory.

Ted Williams' ninth homer of the year in the eighth inning powered the Boston Red Sox to a 2-1 victory over the Cleveland Indians. Williams hit his tie-breaking homer off Cal McLish, who also was tagged for a seventh inning homer by Dick Gernert.

Ike Delock led the Indians to five hits and struck out 12 to notch his fifth victory without a defeat.

Southpaw Jack Harshman of the Orioles turned in his third shutout of the campaign

by beating the Tigers, 2-0, with a five-hitter. The victory was Harshman's sixth. Oriole Bob Boyd homered in the sixth.

Hitless relief pitching over the last 2 2/3 innings by Bobby Shantz and Art Ditmar helped the Yankees to a 4-3 triumph over the White Sox.

Johnny Kucks, who was credited with the victory, was lifted in the seventh after Jim Rivera hit a two-run homer. Shantz and Ditmar then thoroughly bottled up Chicago's attack. Norm Siebern's homer in the seventh proved to be the winning run.

Edstrom, Anderson 2nd, 3rd Behind Rafer Johnson In California Decathlon

Kingsburg, Calif. — (UPI) — Home-town boy Rafer Johnson fell short of a world mark, but captured the California Invitational Decathlon with 7,780 points.

The giant UCLA star had to share the spotlight, however, with Dave Edstrom, a 19-year-old University of Oregon student built along the lines of two-time Olympic king Bob Mathias. Edstrom tallied 7,736 points in this, his second shot at the 10-event grind.

Other Places
Steve Anderson, also of the University of Oregon, was third with 6,663 points. Other scores were Clarence Treat, Occidental college, 5,901; Walter Mince, Bakersfield College, 5,841; and Walt Williamson, also of Occidental, 5,664.

Johnson, Edstrom and Anderson will compete in the National A A U Decathlon championship at Palmira, N.J., July 4-5. Top two men at Palmira will go to Russia where they will meet world record holder Vassily Kuznetsov in a U.S.-Russia track meet in Moscow.

Ready For Record?
Johnson is the former world record holder and he took second in the 1956 Olympics. There is little doubt that he will be ready to crack Kuznetsov's recent world mark of 8,013 points if and his sore knee ceases to bother him. In compiling his 7,780 score, Johnson took only one high jump at 5 feet 2 1/2 inches and one pole vault at 10 feet 11 7/8 inches for fear of reinjuring the knee.

Wimbledon, England—(UPI) — Young Barry MacKay, hopeful that a day of rest has improved a painful blister on his racket hand, led the last four American survivors in men's singles into dangerous third-round matches today.

One Yank was sure to be eliminated, because on match

today pitted 44-year-old Gardner Mulloy of Denver, Colo., against young Mike Green of Miami, Fla.

But MacKay also appeared in for a full test against Bob Mark, an experienced Australian who rates just a cut below the Aussie "big four" that is top-seeded here. And 1950 champion Budge Patty of Los Angeles and Paris faced a competent but erratic foe in Denmark's Torben Ulrich.

Four Alive
Only four American entries still are "alive" in women's singles, too. Two of these—top-seeded Althea Gibson of New York and Mimi Arnold of Redwood City, Calif.—have gained the fourth round.

The other two were scheduled to compete in third-round matches today—eighth-seeded blonde beauty Karol Fageros of Miami, Fla., against British Wightman Cupper Pat Ward and 40-year-old U.S. Wightman Cup Captain Margaret Osborne of Point of Wilmington, Del., against Norma Marsh of Australia.

Also on today's program were scattered matches in men's and women's doubles and mixed doubles.

Cal Group Sanctions Ring Scrap

Los Angeles—(UPI) —The scheduled world championship heavyweight bout between Floyd Patterson and challenger Roy Harris on Aug. 18 had the official sanction today of the California Athletic commission.

The commission voted approval of the fight, which will be staged at Wrigley field here, and of business executive William Rosenjohn as promoter, despite loud opposition from George Parnassus, and the co-managers of Carmen Basilio.

A half-million dollar gate is regarded as a possibility for the title bout.

May Reconsider
Matchmaker Parnassus sent a telegram to the commission which said he felt "extreme disappointment" because the date of the Patterson-Harris bout fell only 10 days before Basilio's match with Art Aragon.

Joe Netro and John De John, Basilio's managers, said that unless there was a change in the date for the Patterson-Harris fight "we may be forced, due to financial reasons, to reconsider negotiations for the scheduled bout with Art Aragon."

Patterson and Harris are expected to arrive here in about a month to begin training for the bout.
