

Cardinals Beat Phillies; Grand Slam Homer Leads To 8-1 League Victory

Sal (the Barber) Maglie clipped the Philadelphia Phillies with a neat five-hitter Saturday and Gene Green contributed a grand-slam homer to pace the St. Louis Cardinals to an 8-1 victory.

Maglie, winning his second game for the Cards since they obtained him from the Yankees on June 14, had a shut-out until Cpl. Sawatski homered with one out in the ninth inning.

Green hit his homer with the bases full off loser Curt Simmons to highlight a five-run rally in the first inning. The Phils pulled a triple play in the seventh inning, started by second baseman Solly Hemus on Ken Boyer's liner.

Bob Skinner, one of the three Pirates elected to the National league all-star team, drove in three runs to help Pittsburgh snap a seven-game losing streak with a 7-3 triumph over Chicago.

Drives in Run
Skinner drove in Pittsburgh's first run off loser Dick Drott with a sacrifice fly in the opening frame and singled home two more in a four-run inning that clinched Curt Raydon's third victory.

Raydon yielded seven hits in the 5 1/3 innings he pitched and reliever Bob Porterfield held Chicago to one hit over the final 3 2/3 innings.

The Milwaukee Braves scored their first victory of the season over Los Angeles, 7-3. The Braves previously had lost seven straight games to the Dodgers this season and nine in a row dating back to last September.

Rookie Carlton Willey scored his second victory of the season with a four-hitter. One of the Dodgers' hits was a homer by Gil Hodges. Southpaw Johnny Podres started for the Dodgers and lasted only one-third of an inning when he walked two men with the bases loaded to force in two runs.

That gave the Braves a lead they never lost. Homer uns by Hank Aaron and Johnny Logan enabled the Braves to beat a left-hander for the first time in 10 tries this year.

The Cincinnati Redlegs took advantage of an error by pitcher Ramon Monzant to score all their runs in the sixth inning and beat the San Francisco Giants, 8-2, in a night game that rounded out

the NL schedule. The Redlegs scored their runs with the help of Monzant's two-out error on four walks, a triple by Johnny Temple, a double by Frank Robinson and five singles. Joe Nuxhall pitched a five-hitter for his fourth win.

With the bases loaded, two out, and the score tied at 2-2, Monzant missed a throw from Orlando Cepeda covering first base. The Redlegs went on to work their way through four Giant pitchers and score all their runs — six of them unearned.

In addition to the error, coming on Bob Thurman's pinch grounder, the Redlegs mixed in four walks, a triple by John Temple, a double by Fran Robinson and five singles.

The eight-run inning matched the Redlegs' biggest burst of the season, with eight runs also crossing in the ninth against the Chicago Cubs May 8.

Joe Nuxhall threw a five-hitter for his fourth win against three losses and helped himself with a two-run single.

Singles by Ed Bressoud and Felipe Alou with a sacrifice in between gave the Giants a run in the second.

Willie Mays swiped the other run in the sixth as he walked, stole second and scored from there when Nuxhall threw into center field on a pickoff attempt.

Roy Smith, a commissioner of the federal mediation and conciliation service here, announced that a settlement had been reached between the company and local No. 5-3 of the International Woodworkers of America with the assistance of the federal mediation service.

Both parties agreed to recommend the settlement to their principals. The union will call a membership meeting at an early date and, if accepted, work will be resumed immediately, Smith said.

At Oregon he will come under the coaching of Bill Bowerman, one of the nation's best coaches of distance runners. Bowerman has coached such stars as Jim Bailey, Ken Reiser, Jim Grelle and Bill Dellinger.

Burleson's high school coach, Sam Bell, recently was signed as head track coach at Oregon State college.
