

### Backstairs: Cabinet Meets Are Formal

Washington — (UPI) — Backstairs at the White House.

Cabinet meetings are being developed into formal, efficiently-run affairs, requiring detailed, thorough planning. They now are similar to staff meetings over which Eisenhower presided when he was a top military commander. They are in sharp contrast to the informal cabinet meetings in the Democratic Administration of former Presidents Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S. Truman.

One of Eisenhower's first actions after he became President was to order that the cabinet meetings be put on a business-like basis, a military-precise procedure. He set up a new staff, cabinet secretary, to see that this was done. He directed that there be an agenda for each meeting. He expanded attendance at cabinet meetings to include regularly, in addition to secretaries heading departments, such key government officials as his top aide, Sherman Adams, and Defense Mobilization Gordon Gray.

**Major Role**  
The first cabinet secretary, Maxwell M. Rabb, can be credited with a major role in the development of the present form of cabinet meetings. But 36-year-old, prematurely gray-haired Robert K. Gray, who recently succeeded Rabb, installed one innovation to keep departmental staff aides from running over time in their briefings. He had installed on the speaker's rostrum in the cabinet room a system of lights for signaling three minutes before, one minute before, and the scheduled time for ending a presentation.

The warning lights are only for staff aides, however. The importance of keeping within time limits is known to cabinet members. But they are not subjected to the warning lights. And cabinet members seldom go to the rostrum, preferring to speak from their seats at the long table in the pale green cabinet room.

Topics for the cabinet meeting agendas originate from the President, top White House staff aides and department heads. But, in any case, they must have the President's approval before Gray places them on the agenda. Of course, only major matters are proposed.

After a topic is placed on the agenda, Gray and his assistants work with department staff members on preparation of the presentation. Sometimes, there is a rehearsal either at the White House or the department con-

cerned to determine whether it can be improved or tightened.

**Prayer**  
The President opens the meetings by asking the members to bow their heads in silent prayer. Only once—at the first cabinet meeting over which he presided—did he have it opened with an audible prayer. He then called on Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson, an apostle of the Mormon church, to ask God's blessing on the meetings.

The President presides without gavel. After the silent prayer, he asks for the first presentation. A cabinet member usually outlines the topic in general terms and introduces a staff aide to make the detailed presentation, often with charts and occasionally with movies or slides. A general discussion usually follows.

But there are no votes in the cabinet. The final decision on acceptance, rejection, modification or postponement for further study is the President's alone.

Gray's job includes seeing that the President's decisions on cabinet matters are carried out. Four times a year, a representative of each department or agency reports to the cabinet on the progress of the programs and policies which have been determined at the meetings.

### Bomb Explodes in British Columbia Hotel Interior

Kelowna, B.C. — (UPI) — Terrorist activities erupted again in the British Columbia interior Sunday when a bomb exploded in a Kelowna hotel and two others were discovered before they went off.

**Royal Canadian Mounted Police** set up roadblocks but said that no arrests had been made.

**Proprietor Rex McKenzie** of the Willow Inn hotel said the bomb exploded in a washroom and caused an estimated \$1,000 damage. No one was injured.

**Found in Washroom**  
Another bomb was discovered in the washroom of a Vernon, B.C., beverage room and still another in the women's washroom of the Ferry Lequime, one of three ferries which run between Kelowna and Westbank on Okanagan lake.

The incidents were the latest in a series of bombings which have rocked the Kootenay and Okanagan districts. A standing offer of a \$25,000 reward has been posted by the provincial government for information leading to the capture of the terrorists.

**To Be Rounded Up**  
Meanwhile, in Victoria, the provincial highway minister, Phil Gaglardi, predicted that "all persons responsible for the vicious bombings in the province" will be rounded up before Princess Margaret visits the area next month.

**Princess Margaret** is scheduled to open the new Kelowna bridge July 19 and spend two days here.

### Definition of Jew Brings Resignations

Jerusalem, Israel — (UPI) — Two members of Premier David Ben-Gurion's cabinet resigned Sunday night over the government's definition of a Jew.

The coalition cabinet decided last Sunday that for official registration purposes a Jew was anyone who claimed to be a Jew.

Religious Affairs Minister Moshe Shapira and Post Office Minister Joseph Burg resigned because their National Religious Party maintains the orthodox position that a Jew is a person born to a Jewish mother.

### Five Persons Hurt In Hillsboro Crash

Hillsboro — (UPI) — A Seattle family of four and a Portland youth were injured Sunday afternoon in a two car collision here.

Douglas Gibson, his 12-year-old twins, David and Dianne, and another daughter, Sharon, 16, all of Seattle, were thrown from the car. Sharon was the most seriously hurt, suffering from a broken arm, face cuts and bruises. Also injured was Gary M. Byer, 19, Portland.
