

# Presidio Wednesday Foe of Camp White

Camp White—Camp White baseball nine on Wednesday night will get a second hand clue on how it compares to other semi-pro clubs in the state.

The Veterans Administration domiciliary aggregation will entertain the strong Army San Francisco Presidio team. This tussle is set for 8 p.m. at Camp White's memorial field.

Presidio will come here after a Monday and Tuesday night stand against the traditionally strong Drain Black Sox, familiar name to southern Oregon semi-pro baseball followers.

Information on the Presidio's exact record to date has not been received. However, using the available information on victories by the pitchers, the Toreros must be doing all right. The advance billing shows one Army flinger with eight triumphs, another with seven and a third with six.

**Maddox Local Interest**  
Chief interest for local fans in the hassle is the appearance of Terry Maddox, who pitched and played outfield for Medford high and for the semi-pro Medford Cheney Studs. Maddox, who gained all-division, all-conference and all-American honors at University of Oregon, is right fielder for the Presidio.

Players with a mixture of college and pro experience make up the Torero roster. Pitcher probably will be named from among Wes Stock, Roger Sawyer and Vic Delante, with either Mike Setate or Paul Belafar going the catching.

Others in the possible lineup are Mike DeSouza, first base; Bill Julian, second; Mike Drummetry, shortstop; Walt Barrett, third base; Charles Grinn, center field, and Dave Hinnigan, left field.

John Eggers or Clyde Smith could get the ball assignment for Camp White. Others in a probably opening crew are Pete Hale, catcher; Don Sanford, first base; Chuck Warrichant, second; Vera Poynt, shortstop; Wayne Allen, third; and Bob Wendt, Ron Peery and Don Smith, outfielders.

**Don Jordan, Logart Vie Wednesday**  
New York—(UPI)—The holiday week's boxing will be featured by welterweight Don Jordan's TV fight.

Twenty-three year old Jordan of Los Angeles, unrated among 147-pound contenders, tackles top-ranked Isaac Logart of Cuba at the Hollywood (Calif.) Legion Stadium on Wednesday.

Logart, making his first start since his kayo by Virgil Akins on March 21, is favored at 2-1. Akins went on to win the vacant welterweight crown by knocking out Vince Martinez.

Jordan is a good boxer-puncher whose 44-8-0 record includes 16 kayoes. He lost but one of his last 11 starts on a questionable decision to Dave Charnley at London, Jan. 28. Logart, 25, has a 52-8-5 record that includes 19 kayoes.

On Friday night, light heavyweight contender Jesse Bowdry of St. Louis will try for his 10th straight victory in a TV-radio (NBC) 10-rounder against unranked Jerry Luedee at the Louisville (Ky.) Center.

Bowdry, ranked eighth, easily outpointed Clarence Hinnant in his last start on April 30 and is favored at 3-1 over Luedee, who hasn't fought since losing a decision to Canadian Yvon Durelle last December. Luedee's 23-7-1 record includes 13 kayoes. He was never stopped. Bowdry won 22 of his 24 starts, 18 by knockouts. He was stopped once.

Swedens Ingemar Johanson will defend his European heavyweight title against Heinz Newhaus of Germany at Stockholm next Sunday.

The Pacific Coast League went through the formality of an annual all star game Monday night at Vancouver, with the South defeating the North 13-4 in a contest that became a rout after the fifth inning.

Heavy hitter Carlos Bernier of Salt Lake City broke it open in the top of the sixth by slugging out a home run off righthander Dick Hanlon of Spokane, the North's starter. Four other Southern hitters got four masters to add to an assortment of other hits that buried the North.

Portland first baseman George Froese featured the Northern attack with a home run and a double in four trips. His homer with one on in the first inning tied the score at 2-2.

Phoenix righthander Don Zanni was credited with the victory. The crowd of 2,200 saw the colorful pre-game ceremonies, including the awarding of plaques by PCL President Leslie O'Connell to umpires Chris Pelekoudas and Emmet Ashford for their work last winter with the U.S. armed forces in Japan.

The league gets back down to pennant business tonight, with the narrowly-leading Mounties entering Seattle, Sacramento at Spokane and Salt Lake City, at San Diego, Phoenix, two percentage points under Vancouver, and fifth place Portland, are idle.

# Rhodes' Hopes Fade For Return To Giants

Phoenix, Ariz.—(UPI)—Dusty Rhodes, hero of the New York Giants' 1954 world championship, realizes that his chances of ever getting back to his old club are dwindling with each passing day.

Since the Giants sent Rhodes down to their Phoenix farm club last April, they've recalled three outfielders. They've been youngsters—Felipe Alou, Willie Kirkland and Leon Wagner. And the 31-year-old Dusty can read the handwriting on the wall.

San Francisco is rebuilding and those kids play a bigger part in the Giants' future than does Rhodes.

**Do I Like Phoenix?**  
"I'm not even thinking about this year," Rhodes remarked. "I like it here in Phoenix. Of course, the only place to play ball is in the majors. But since I'm in the minors, I'm glad it's Phoenix. Rhodes' batting average is only a smokescreen, but he has hit 12 homers and has driven in 40 runs.

"This is the most loopy-gooey ball club I've ever played for," Rhodes said. "Everybody is relaxed. And they all want to win. We have one of the finest managers, Red Davis, in the minors, too."

**Could Fill a Need**  
Dusty, never a great outfielder, realizes that his best chance of returning to the majors is with a pennant-winning club that needs a left-handed pinch-hitter in the late stages of this season. Players with Rhodes' pinch-hitting talent sometimes wind up with clubs like the New York Yankees and earn a share of the World Series purse.

Failing that, Rhodes still can return to the majors with any club that may want to draft him for \$25,000 at next winter's major league meeting.

Rhodes gave the Phoenix fans one of their biggest thrills on June 25 when he hit a grand slam homer against Spokane. The biggest crowd of the season was on hand.

"Just like old times, Dusty!" a fan hollered from the stands. No one could blame Rhodes for muttering to himself: "Not quite. Not quite."

# Split Decisions Haunt Ring Rivals

San Francisco—(UPI)—Fight where they may, the ghost of "robbery" seems destined to haunt any bouts between Joey Giambra and Joey Giardello.

Giambra, who was on the brink of fistic oblivion, rallied Monday night to win a 10-round split decision over his favored opponent and take the "rubber" match between them.

But the outcome was greeted with booing from the 4,324 persons who came to see the non-televized bout in the Cow Palace. And reporters who were polled came out for Giardello, 7-1, while the United Press International and Associated Press called it a draw.

Judge Jack Silver voted for Giambra, 87-85, and referee Jack Downey, 98-94 for the winner while judge Eddie James scored it for Giardello, 88-90.

Giambra weighed 156½ to Giardello's 161. It was Giardello's first loss in 17 bouts. Giambra and Giardello took turns outpointing each other in a pair of bouts in 1952 at Brooklyn and Buffalo. The cry of robbery followed each one. It was raised again Monday night.

Eugene—(UPI)—Eugene's Emeralds of the Northwest league made it three in a row over the Pacific Coast league Portland Beavers here on Monday night as they edged the Beavers 4-3 in an exhibition game before 200 fans.

The Beavers, in their previous two slugs with the Emeralds were edged by one run.

Eugene's two rookies, Bob Wills and Bill Pitts, while giving up eight hits allowed none but extra bases. First baseman Frank Kellert had four-at-bats for Portland.

Portland's first two runs came in the opening inning when Alex Cosmidis singled and Terry Burke walked. Both scored on Kellert's first single.

In the fifth inning two walks, another single by Kellert, and a Texas league single by Jack Lohrke scored two more runs.

In the ninth three scratch hits and an error scored two unearned Portland runs.

Eugene picked up a run in the second on a single by Nickie Hopkins and a double by Matt Kellurgos.

In the third inning five hits including a triple by Mel Krause and double by Bill Eastburn and Hopkins paced a five-run attack off Ed Meyer, the loser.

A walk and two singles scored a run in the fourth for Eugene. And in the eighth a walk to Chuck Stacy and a double by Rex Comford scored the final Eugene run.
