Yank Makes Bid For Semi-Finals At Wimbledon

Wimbledon, England (UPI) — Barry MacKay, sole U.S. survivor in men's singles, and three American women bid for semi-final berths in the Wimbledon tennis championships today but the only favorite among them was defending women's queen Althea Gibson.

Miss Gibson, top-seeded in defense of her title, faced a dangerous rival in fifth-seeded Shirley Bloomer, ace of Britain's victorious Wightman Cup team, but was a solid choice to win.

MacKay, seeded No. 8 in men's play, found himself an underdog against third-seeded Mervyn Rose, the Australian southpaw.

In women's singles, unseeded Mimi Arnold of Redwood City, Calif., was up against sixth-seeded Suzi Kormoczi of Hungary, and 40-year-old Margaret Osborne Du Pont of Wilmington, Del., who won the 1947 championship here but no longer plays on the regular tennis circuit, faced British Wightman Cupper Angela Mortimer.

MacKay was left as the only U.S. player in men's singles when 44-year-old Gardner Mulloy of Denver, Colo., and 34-year-old Patty Budge of

Los Angeles were beaten in fourth round matches Monday. Patty, the 1950 champion, was ahead after three sets but then became weary and lost to seventh-seeded Sven Davidson of Sweden, 6-4, 2-6, 4-6, 9-7, 6-4. Mulloy never was in contention against Rose, 6-2, 6-3, 6-1.

Mrs. Du Pont won her fourth round match in women's singles Monday 6-3, 8-2, over Fay Muller of Australia.

Tiger Scouts Sign Up Lolich

Portland (UPI) — Mickey Lolich, sensational Portland Peep and Junior Legion baseball hurler, signed with the Detroit Tigers of the American league Monday for an undisclosed bonus.

Lolich, a left-hander, will report to the American Association Charleston Senators for spring training in February, 1959, according to tiger scouts Ed Demorest and Bernie DeViveiro, who signed Lolich.

Lolich was voted outstanding player of the Babe Ruth World tournament in Austin, Tex., in 1955.

Bobby Bragan Heads Up Spokane Indian Team

Spokane (UPI) — Rambunctious Bobby Bragan, whose desire to be a major league manager ended in a disaster on two fronts, returned to the Pacific Coast league today as head man of the Spokane Indians.

The former Brooklyn Dodger catcher was hired in Vancouver Monday to replace Golden Desmond (Goldie) Holt, a veteran minor league manager who could not get the Los Angeles farm club very far out of seventh place, Bragan, 40, will take over

the team here tonight when it opens a six-game series against Sacramento.

It was a case of one fired manager replacing another. Bragan, who was released by the Pittsburgh Pirates on Aug. 3 of last season, got the thumb from the sixth-place Cleveland Indians last Thursday. He was replaced by Joe Gordon, former American league star.

Bragan spent his most successful days managing the Dodgers' Fort Worth team in the Texas league and Pittsburgh's Hollywood club in the PCL.

When he came to Pittsburgh in 1956, the Pirates went on a hot streak and on June 4 were in first place by one game over Cincinnati and Milwaukee. But after that, they slowly sank and finished seventh. Bragan was a National league catcher for seven years at Philadelphia and then Brooklyn.

The Cardinal slugger teed off on him for his 13th homer in the first inning to start St. Louis on the way to a 4-2 victory over the Dodgers.

Later in the game, Musial doubled to drive in another run. The two extra base hits brought Stan within two of Lou Gehrig's total of 1,190, which ranks second best in the majors. Babe Ruth is the all-time leader with 1,356 extra bases.

Chicago (UPI) — The San Francisco Giants meet the Chicago Cubs today in the first of a two-game series at Wrigley field, with pitcher Johnny Antonelli choosing for his ninth win.

The clubs will be playing each other most of the week. After Wednesday's game, they fly west for a series in San Francisco which includes a fourth of July double header.

Antonelli (8-3) faced Mog Drabowski (3-2) on the mound. Johnny has yet to lose to the Cubs, having defeated them twice by 3-1 and 7-3 scores. He chalked up the 7-3 win against Drabowski.

The Giants were hoping Willie Mays would be ready to break out again after his recent slump. He ripped two doubles, his first extra base hit since early June, against Cincinnati on Sunday.

Two injured Giants were mended and ready for action. Tippo wore second baseman Danny O'Connell, knocked out of action June 7 with a rib bruise, and Joe Spivley, a right-handed bullet thrower, who broke down while warming up on June 7 after he was recalled from Phoenix.

Manager Bill Rigney ordered Shipley to be bullpen, saying: "You're the first guy I'm calling on if things get rough."

Gen. De Gaulle in Algeria for Tour

Constantine, Algeria (UPI) — Gen. Charles de Gaulle arrived in Algeria today to measure the gravity of the Algerian problem in person with a three-day "military inspection" tour.

So much secrecy surrounded his visit that his right wing critics were uneasy — but under orders from the All-Algerian committee of Public Safety to behave "correctly" toward his companions.

The Premier was accompanied by Gen. Paul Ely, chief of staff of France's armed forces; Pierre Guillaumat, secretary of state for armed forces; Rene Brouillet, new secretary for Algerian affairs and former Premier Guy Mollet.

The Moslem rebels took note of De Gaulle's arrival by exploding a bomb in an open air market in Algier's Moslem casbah section. Ten persons were injured, one gravely.

Elgin Boy Loses Leg To Mower

La Grande (UPI) — A four-year-old boy lost his left leg above the kneecap Monday after he was pulled under a power mower at the Elgin high school football field.

The boy, Bobby Snyder, son of Mr. and Mrs. Delmer Snyder of Elgin, was reported in "good" condition.

Doctors credited Ted Shadewitz, football coach at Elgin, with helping to save the boy's life by applying a tourniquet soon after the accident. Shadewitz first took the boy to the Elgin first aid car and then he was rushed 21 miles to Grande Ronde hospital here.
