Old Elements Show New Capacity

Chicago—(UPI)—Science is drawing nourishment for today's demands from old wine in new bottles.

The "wine" in this case consists of beryllium, titanium, vanadium, tungsten and several other elements, sometimes referred to as "newer metals." Most of them, however, have been known for ages, according to the Illinois Institute of Technology.

Dr. Donald J. McPherson, manager of metals research at I.T.S. Armour research foundation, said the old elements simply are showing new capacity to meet current scientific requirements. He said the elements have promise of fulfilling needs in three categories.

1. Metals for use at moderate temperatures lower than many commercial alloys, but improved because of lighter weight or higher strength-to-weight ratios.

2. Metals to provide adequate structural strength at temperatures around 1,700 degrees F. above the tolerance level of the commercial alloys.

3. Metals sufficiently transparent to thermal or intermediate speed neutrons to be of use in the structure of a nuclear reactor and its fuel cladding.

Old Theater Organ To Be Used Again

Cleveland, Ohio—(UPI)—The nostalgic sounds of the once-familiar theater organ will again delight listeners on Cleveland's West Side.

Found in an old movie house by Gerald E. Brookins, owner of the new Lamplight Inn, the theatrical organ is one of two remaining instruments of its kind left in the city. At one time, at least 12 organs were in use daily.

Although theatrical organs differ greatly from church and concert organs, Brookins plans to use his new discovery in his inn.

Practically unused since 1930, Brookins' organ simulates such special effects as Chinese clock rolls, a doorbell, a xylophone, cymbals, tambourines and drums of all kinds.
