

Gibson Only Yank Left In Singles

Wimbledon, England.—(UPI)—An almost all-Australian semifinal round in men's singles was on tap in the Wimbledon tennis championships today while disappointed American entries were forced to turn to doubles competition.

Top-seeded Ashley Cooper and third-ranked Mervyn Rose met in one all-Aussie semifinal match. In the other, fourth-seeded Neale Fraser of Australia was pitted against sixth-seeded Kurt Nielsen of Denmark.

Althea Gibson of New York, the defending champion in women's singles, was the only American to gain a semi-final spot in either men's or women's singles today.

This marked the second straight year that no American reached the semi-finals in men's singles. Barry Mackay of Dayton, Ohio, was eighth seeded, came closest but proved an easy victim for southpaw Rose, 6-2, 6-4, 6-4, in a quarter-final match Tuesday.

Silky Gains Win Circle

Inglewood, Calif.—(UPI)—The "new" Silky Sullivan may not provide as many thrills as the "old," but if his latest race is any indication he's probably going to make a lot of bettors happier.

Silky, after a long drought in which he failed to win a race despite his highly publicized late finish, came home in front at Hollywood Park Tuesday afternoon to capture the \$7500 San Clemente Purse by two lengths.

Forsaking his usual desperate gallop in the stretch, Silky's dismal failure in the Kentucky Derby and Preakness never trailed by more than three lengths under a steady ride by jockey Bill Shoemaker.

Den Moyer Victor in Ring Fray

Portland.—(UPI)—Denny Moyer, 153½, Portland, won a unanimous decision over Al Andrews, 160½, Minneapolis, in their 10-round middleweight clash here Tuesday night.

The victory was Moyer's 13th since turning professional last December and was his first against an experienced fighter of national reputation. Moyer repeatedly jabbed the stronger and heavier Andrews with darting lefts to the head and countered with uppercut rights to the body.

Andrews pressed the fight throughout but Moyer scored with heavier blows. Moyer's best round was the fifth when he landed hard rights to Andrews' midsection and fought the Minnesota batter off the ropes. There were no knockdowns but Moyer opened a slight cut on the left side of Andrews' head.

Plywood Producer Hikes Sanded Stock

Portland.—(UPI)—A major plywood producer Tuesday boosted prices \$4 a thousand square feet on sanded stock. It was the second such rise in less than a month.

Quotations were raised on index grade 14 inch AD plywood to \$72 by Georgia-Pacific Corp. Other major producers made no changes Tuesday but several companies indicated an advance was under consideration.

Improved demand and production curtailment resulting from plant shutdowns were factors in the firmer market, industry spokesmen said.

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Canadians Claim Cup

Toronto, Ont.—(UPI)—It took a pressure putt on the last hole of the last match, but Canada can boast of a Carling Cup triumph over the favored United States team for the second straight year.

Canadian amateur champion Nick Weslock clinched a 6½ to 5½ point victory with a pressure birdie putt on the 18th hole of the final match of the best-ball foursomes at Toronto's St. George Golf club Tuesday.

Canada won the inaugural program at Flint, Mich., last year.

Canadian PGA champion Stan Leonard and Gary Cowan swept their match against Julius Boros and amateur Fred Paine of Pittsburgh, earning a full three points under the Nassau scoring system.

The Weslock-Al Balding combination halved their first nine against Doug Ford and Ward Wettlaufer as each picked up ½ point, but the Canadians won the match and the cup with a 2-up win on the back nine.

Paul Harney and amateur Bob Shave of Cleveland, were the only U.S. team to earn a full three points. They defeated Jack Kay and young amateur Hugh Patterson.

Dow Finsterwald and veteran amateur Ed Meister, Jr., Willoughby, Ohio, rallied after losing the front nine 2-up to Johnny Henrick and Eric Hanson to score a 3-up win on the back nine and the match for two points.

Riley Heads Curtis Gang

New York.—(UPI)—Polly Riley of Fort Worth, Tex., a veteran of five previous series, headed eight players today who were named to the U.S. Curtis Cup team which meets Britain's top women amateur golfers at West Newton, Mass., Aug. 8 and 9.

Miss Riley and Barbara Romack of Sacramento, Calif., who has participated in two of the series, were the only veterans selected by the U.S. Golf association.

New York.—(UPI)—Student-actor Joey Giambra was named "fighter of the month" for June today by Ring magazine and brought back to the ratings because of Monday's upset triumph over Joey Giardello.

Handsome Joey, unranked among the middleweight contenders for some time because of inactivity, was rated number eight because of his split decision over highly favored Giardello.

Giardello's San Francisco defeat dropped him from second to third among the 160-pounders. Ex-champion Gene Fulmer rose a notch to second.
