

Stu Locklin Singles in 16th For Padre Victory Over Bees

Pinch-hitter Stu Locklin singled with the bases loaded in the 16th inning at San Diego early this morning to give the red hot Padres an uphill 12-11 victory over Salt Lake and tighten an already close Pacific Coast League pennant chase.

The Pads had knotted the count at 8-8 by scoring five runs in the last two regulation innings, then went six scoreless in the 16th. Salt Lake had sent three runners across the plate in its half of the 16th to apparently ice the victory.

The win moved San Diego into second place in the standings, a half game behind front-running Phoenix and .002 percentage points ahead of Vancouver.

Giants Blast Mounties
At Phoenix, where the

home run bell is supreme, the Giants turned on the power to bury Vancouver, 11-5, and regain the PCL lead from the Mounties. The Arizonans smashed five homers, while limiting the Mounties to only one, to coast to an easy victory.

In the only other game played, Seattle shut out Portland, 3-0, behind the six-hit pitching of Chico Clara. The Sacramento Spokesman outfit was winded out.

The Salt Lake-San Diego marathon was a thriller all the way, with the Padres coming from behind two times before the issue was finally decided.

The Bees led 8-3 before Earl Averill smashed a grand slam homer in the eighth to leave the Pads only one run behind going into the ninth. Fred Hatfield doubled Bill Lynn home in the ninth with the tieing run to send the game into extra innings, six of them scoreless.

Rudy's Big Home Run
Salt Lake broke the scoring drought in the top of the 16th with three runs on a walk, two bunts, two singles and an infield out. But the Padres came back with four markers in their half of the 16th on Rudy Regalado's two-run homer and Locklin's game-winning single.

Dick Brodowski, who came on in the ninth for San Diego, was the winner. Ron Kildoo, who pitched the last two innings for Salt Lake, was charged with the loss.

Don Taussig blasted two homers for Phoenix and Willie McCovey, Bobby Prescott and Dusty Rhodes chipped in with one apiece as the Giants trounced Vancouver. Both clubs had 13 hits, but Johnny Jorgensen collected the Mounties' only four-bagger, a solo shot in the ninth. At Seattle, the Rainiers reached losing pitcher Elmer Siggler for nine hits, scoring one in the first and twice in the eighth, while Churn picked up his fourth victory in eight decisions. The Suds bunched seven of their runners in the two scoring innings to send Singleton down to his seventh defeat.

One-Stroke Lead Held By Aussie

St. Anne's-on-the-Sea, England — (UPI) — Favored Australian Peter Thomson carried a one-stroke lead into the second round of the British Open golf championship today with Americans Gene Sarazen and Monte Bradley far behind.

Thomson slogged through heavy rains Wednesday to post a brilliant five-under-par 32-34—66 over the water-logged Royal Lytham and St. Anne's course.

Sarazen, the 56-year-old 1937 British Open champion from Germantown, N.Y., who is anxious to "keep the American flag flying," was two over par with a 73.

Bradley, an Army sergeant from Hillsboro, Tex., managed only a 39-37—76 over the 6,635 yard layout.

Race To Offer Style Contrast

Eugene—(UPI)—Gail Hodgson of Oklahoma and Arizona State's Alex Henderson will set the pace in the invitational mile at the Oregon AAU field and track meet at Hayward field here Friday, according to University of Oregon Coach Bill Bowerman.

Bowerman said both men want to be on top and depend on early speed to wear out the competition.

He said Oregon's own two ace runners, Jim Grelle and Air Force Lt. Bill Dellinger, would rather pour it on toward the end of the race. The contrast in styles will assure a fast pace and fast performance, Bowerman said.

The other two mile men are Hungarian Lazalo Tabori, who has run under the four minute mark, and Washington sophomore Jack Larson.

Hunting & Fishing Southern Oregon

Lepine, Oregon — It's fairly easy to write about fishing when trailer-camped beside a stream such as the Big Deschutes. Although we in the Rogue valley live in the middle of such varied outdoor sports, it's fun now and then to snoop in our neighbors' favorite fishing haunts—and snare some of their fish also.

SINGLE EGGS PRODUCE

In the three days spent at Diamond Lake, the weather was cold and windy. The catches were up to those of a week ago, but mainly in the wintertime and the fall moon (I still believe the fishing) some nice strings of fish were brought in, taken mostly on the bottom of the lake with single eggs of the lighter variety. Fly fishing was at a standstill—no bug hatch. Trolling was only fair. Watch for the moon to darken and the weather to warm up and this will be a hot spot again.

DESCHUTES SLOWS

Both the Big and the Little Deschutes are high and consequently the fishing has slowed to a walk. Some fish are being taken on bait and a few catches are reported on wet flies but the dry fly fishing is slow. Just say Mrs. Dietz Newland of Grants Pass came in with a 17-inch brown taken on a grey, deer hair fly—she thinks fishing is great!

A phone call to Harriman's Resort brings the information that during the last week fishing has been fair to good. Top honors on the big fish board were shared by Kent Kidder, 13-year-old boy from Gresham, and H. O. Willis, of Medford, who boated fish weighing 7 pounds. Frank Hamberger of Los Angeles took a 9 pounder; Frank Logan of San Diego, 4 1/2; Chuck Kinney of Ashland, 4 1/2; and Gordon Russel of Gresham, Ore., 4 1/2. Weather is the answer here also.

LA Anticipates Millionth Fan

Los Angeles—(UPI)—Fan No. 1,000,000 is expected to file into Memorial Coliseum tonight to see the Dodgers meet the St. Louis Cardinals in a twilight doubleheader.
