

Army Presidio Nine Edges Camp White

Memorial Stadium, Camp White—Slipping over the lone marker in the eighth inning, the Army's San Francisco Presidio baseball nine nosed out Camp White 1 to 0 here last night in a snappy, well-played tussle.

To set up the only counter Chico Seate drew a base on balls and Rodger Sawyer doubled. Bill Julia socked a

ground ball to Wayne Allen at third base. Sawyer was trapped between second and third bases. During that run-down, Seate headed for home and the throw to the plate after Sawyer tagged out was too late to prevent the score.

Otherwise, the game was a pitching and fielding duel. Seate, on the mound for the Presidio, permitted just two hits. Both were doubles, by Jim Eggers in the third inning and by Chuck Mairmont in the eighth. The Army thrower struck out six and walked one.

Eggers tossed a three-hitter to Camp White. He held the Toreros hitless through six innings but in the seventh panel Charles Griks and Terry Maddox, ex-Medford High star, slammed consecutive singles. Eggers fanned batters 13 times and issued three bases on balls.

Maddox, in whom there was much interest as the "local boy" in the Army line-up, batted in the clean-up spot, his position in the order through the season. He hit one fly ball to deep center field. But Ron Peery of the Whites was back in position for it. Maddox snapped the ball well in his other two batting turns but grounded out.

In addition to the hits Don Sanford, Eggers and Bob Smith whammed some well-tagged fly balls to the outfield but these were hauled in by the pasture guardians. Whittier Seale Game

The victory was the 34th in 43 games this season for the Toreros, and Sawyer's 11th triumph against two set-backs.

Coffee, Milk Costs Found About Equal

Corvallis—(UPI)—Researchers at Oregon State College have completed their lengthy survey to find out why some Oregon restaurants charge 5 to 15 cents extra per serving or Oregon milk compared to South American coffee.

A report of the economic study asserted that the extra charge made for the Oregon product was "not justified" on the basis of comparative costs of serving the two beverages. The researchers reported that milk and coffee costs the restaurant about the same per guest. Milk costs more than coffee, but when labor, equipment, extra dishes, usual coffee refills, sugar and cream are figured in, there is little difference between the two. The report added that the cost of serving milk has been considerably reduced with the introduction of bulk milk dispensers which simplify storage and handling.

Four western Oregon restaurants were used in the OSC survey.

Gibson Carries U.S. Tennis Banner Alone

Wimbledon, England—(UPI)—Althea Gibson, left alone to carry the American banner in singles competition, was expected today to gain the final round in defense of her women's singles crown in the Wimbledon tennis championships.

The lanky Negro star from New York, who is first seeded, was a heavy favorite in her semi-final match against unseeded British Wimbledon Cupper Ann Haydon.

In the other semi-final, sixth-seeded Suzi Kormoczi was favored over Britain's Angela Mortimer.

The second straight all-Aus-

tralian final in men's singles was set up Wednesday by victories of topsseeded Ashley Cooper and fourth-seeded Neale Fraser in semi-finals.

Cooper downed third-seeded Mervyn Rose of Australia, 7-9, 6-2, 6-2, 6-3, and Fraser defeated sixth-seeded Kurt Nielsen of Denmark, 6-3, 6-4, 17-19, 6-4.

Gardner Mulloy of Denver, Colo., and Budge Patty of Los Angeles and Paris, the second seeded pair whose combined ages add to 78, failed in their defense of the men's doubles title when they lost Wednesday to India's Ramanathan Krishnan and Naresh Kumar, 3-6, 6-4, 6-2, 3-6, 7-5.

Boxing Judge Maintains He's Innocent of Bribe Charges; First Indicted

New York—(UPI)—Bert Grant, the indicted boxing judge, said today, "I'm completely innocent of all charges, and I expect to prove it."

Smallish, dark-haired Grant of Brooklyn, who was indicted and arrested Wednesday for allegedly accepting a total \$400 in bribes after five New York fights, declared, "The charges amazed me; I can't understand them."

He added, "My lawyer told me not to talk. So I can't say anything more—except that I pleaded not guilty Wednesday, and I'm not guilty."

Grant, now at liberty on \$2,500 bail, was the first man indicted by the "boxing grand jury" investigating corruption in the fight game. Two more indictments were expected to-

day or Monday and several more later.

Maximum 10 Years

The maximum penalty for fixing a fight in New York State is 10 years, for either the briber or the man accepting the bribe. And the penalty for merely conspiring to bribe could be three years.

Grant's indictment contains 10 counts for alleged bribery and one for conspiracy.

The indictment includes as a co-conspirator Hymie (The Mink) Wellman, New York furrier and fight manager, but he is not named a defendant. Wellman, alleged to have given five bribes to Grant, has been described by District Attorney Frank Hogan as "the front man" for Frankie Carbo—reputed underworld boss of boxing.

Don Jordan Split Nod Unpopular

Hollywood—(UPI)—Randy Don Jordan called for a shot at lightweight champion Joe Brown today after his upset split decision victory over Cuban Isaac Logart, the No. 1 welterweight contender.

Jordan, badly cut over the right eye and bleeding profusely from the nose, came up with a furious late rally Wednesday night to edge the veteran Logart in a nationally televised 10-rounder at Hollywood Legion Stadium.

The decision was unpopular with the estimated 1,500 fans and also with the sports writers at ringside, who voted 8-1-1 for Logart in a post-fight poll.

Jordan, who said he felt he deserved the verdict, indicated he'll confine his activity to the lightweight division from now on. He weighed 161 to Logart's 146 1/2.

Judge George Latka had Logart an easy winner, 97-93, but judge John Thomas voted 97-95 for Jordan and referee Mush Callahan gave it to Jordan, 95-94. The United Press International card was identical to Latka's.

Publisher Faces New Indictment

Portland—(UPI)—Alfred E. Kiefer, 35, operator of the Monarch Publishing Company here, Wednesday was named in a new grand jury indictment accusing him of conspiracy to commit extortion.

The warrant was served on Kiefer in the Multnomah county jail where he is held on two other extortion charges in connection with alleged threats to nursing home operators. Two others named with Kiefer in secret indictments had not been picked up and their identities were not revealed by authorities.

The grand jury said Kiefer threatened the nursing home operators with adverse publicity in a publication called The Star if they failed to buy advertising space.

Rainier Boy Drowns in Columbia River

Rainier, Ore.—(UPI)—Raymond Arthur Phillips, 11, drowned in the Columbia river near the Klept shipyards Wednesday afternoon. Columbia County Sheriff Bill Evans reported the boy apparently slipped from a float a few feet from shore.
