Publication Devoted To Oldsters

Quakertown, Pa.—(UPI)—A new slick-paper monthly magazine for oldsters called "65" is being published here by a 79-year-old former newspaperman who believes "old people are being ignored, but they're fascinating."

The publisher, Henry L. Sreking, also is the founder of The Bucks County Traveler, a highly respected monthly which tub-thumps for the county's many attractions. Sreking said he got the idea for the magazine four years ago when he sponsored Quakertown's first annual "Oldtimers Day." Some 3,500 persons 65 years old or more from all over the country came to the outing.

To get mention in the magazine, a person must be over 65.

The first issue carried stories about several "oldtimers."

One of them concerned Sam Hoffman Davis, an 89-year-old retired businessman who is now a successful painter of primitives in Daytona Beach, Fla. Another was about Dr. George F. Pottenger, 90-year-old Hamburg, Pa., physician who is still practicing after 87 years.

Dr. Pottenger, who says he has delivered more than 2,000 babies, has stopped the obstetrics part of his practice because "too many babies are born in the middle of the night."

Then there was the story about an 85-year-old retired automobile mechanic who drives 25 miles every week end to court his 66-year-old sweetheart. The mechanic, James Dorney of Wecosville, Pa., quit work two years ago.

The second issue of the magazine will feature a story of this year's "Oldtimers Day" outing written by 96-year-old Britain Roth, a columnist with the Allentown, Pa., Chronicle.

Frozen Soup As Dip
