Local Resident Adopts Greek Boy

James G. Pedersen, 78 Perrydale ave., Medford, has financially "adopted" a 10-year-old Greek boy through Foster Parents' Plan, Inc., according to Plan officials.

The boy, Konstantinos (Kostas) Kyletsis, lives with his parents and a younger brother in Drama. The four of them have been surviving on an average monthly income of only \$8.66, the officials report.

Kostas' father has suffered from asthma for the past seven years and has been unable to work. His mother works in the field to bring in the only income that the four have had recently.

"Home" is a one-room house built of mud bricks, and having an earthen floor. There is only one bed, no electricity and no running water.

Pedersen became a foster parent by offering to contribute \$15 a month for the child's support for at least one year. Foster Parents' Plan has rehabilitated more than 76,000 children and is now helping 11,500 youngsters, according to Plan officials.

Salem—Reasons for the variations in timber taxation in several Oregon counties will be aired at public hearings before the Oregon State tax commission beginning on Monday at 1:30 p.m.

The three-man tax commission is slated to hear assessors and boards of equalization from Benton, Coos, Douglas and Lane counties during the first week of the sessions.

Tax Commission Chairman C. W. Chambers reported a wide divergence in valuation of timber by the different counties in Oregon, and expressed the hope that these hearings will enable the commission to perform its function of equalization.

The tax commission has requested that any persons interested in giving testimony at the hearings submit written requests to the executive office of the commission at the state office building, Salem.
