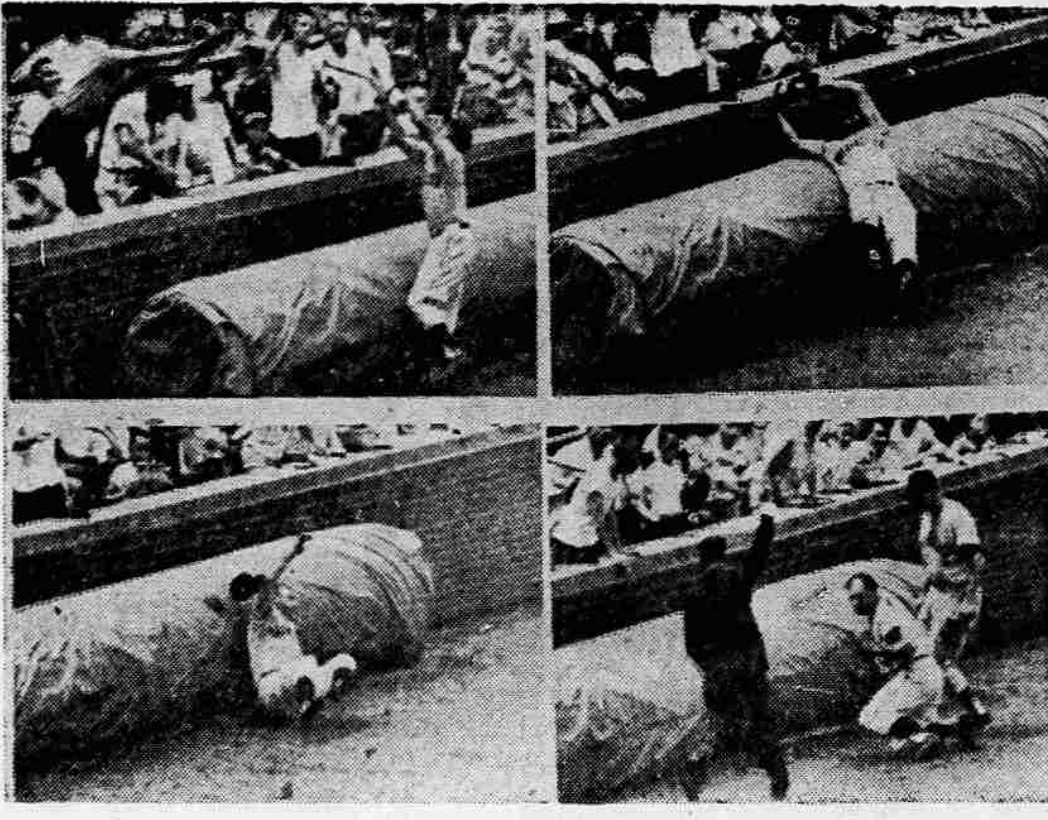

Alex Henderson Triumphs In Oregon AAU Mile Run

Eugene—(UPI)—A distinguished crew of milers was beaten by 10-mile-an-hour winds in the feature invitational mile of the Oregon AAU track and field championships here Friday and the best time was 4:04.9 by Alex Henderson, Arizona State sophomore from Australia.

Lt. Bill Dellinger of the Air Force finished about two yards behind Henderson in 4:05.1. Hungarian runner Lazo Tabori was next in the time of 4:06.3. Then came Grelle, South Africa's Gail Hodgson and Jack Larson of Washington.

Henderson's mile, while slower than had been hoped, was the fastest in the history of Hayward field. The meet was held under bright, sunny skies and the temperature was in the high 80's. Attendance was 6,000.

One meet record was tied. Oresse Elmestor, Ft. Lewis, Wash., tied a 1906 mark in the 100-dash of 9.6 set by Dan Kelly of Oregon.

Wayne Moss, Oregon State, won the high jump with a leap of 6 feet, 8 3/4 inches. Paul Stuber, highly-touted prep star from Bellflower

Harvard Wins Race At Henley

Henley-on-Thames, England—(UPI)—Harvard university's undefeated lightweight crew, only American entry to reach a final at the Henley Royal Regatta, won the Thames Challenge cup Saturday by defeating Britain's Thames Rowing club by three-quarters of a length.

Russia won the grand challenge cup, the regatta's top trophy. Soviet oarsmen also captured the double sculls trophy but Vasilyev Ivanov, their Olympic single sculls champion, suffered the worst defeat of his career when he lost the Diamond sculls final to Australia's Stuart MacKenzie by more than 22 lengths. All Henley races are contested at one-mile, 550-yards on the River Thames.

Friday, Harvard's 150-pounders crushed Washington-Lee, (Va.), high school's dream of winning the Thames cup. Saturday the Ivy leaguers captured the cup by defeating two British eight.

In the final heat, Harvard was clocked in six minutes, 57 seconds, but had to work hard to win. It led by a few feet after the first quarter of a mile. The Yanks then stepped up their heat to 34 strokes to a minute. But the Thames club hung on grimly. The shells were virtually even through most of the last 500 yards but the Americans put on a tremendous spurt at the finish and the Britons could not match it.

Russia's Trud club of Leningrad, which ousted the University of Washington Thursday in the first heat of the grand challenge cup, won this trophy by defeating Australia's Leichardt club by two-and-a-half lengths. The Russians, who averaged 185 pounds, led most of the way and were clocked in six minutes, 40 seconds.
