

Williams Leads Boston to 10-4 Victory Over Yanks

 A couple of old pros named Ted Williams and Mickey Mantle are right in a trim for that big All-Star Game in Baltimore today, but the way some of the other "stars" played today you couldn't tell them from the blue-eyes without a scorecard.

Williams slammed three hits, including his 16th homer of the season, and boosted his batting average to a season-high of .314 as the Boston Red Sox drubbed the New York Yankees, 10-4, Mantle, meantime, hammered his 31st homer for the Yankees with one mate aboard.

Jackie Jensen and Frank Malzone of the Red Sox, selected along with Williams for the mid-season classic, got in the spirit, too, with three runs-batted-in each.

But how about relief pitcher Larry Jackson of the Cardinals? He lost a 5-4 decision to the Giants when the hit batter Jim Davenport with a

pitched ball with the bases loaded in the ninth inning — one day after he'd lost to the same team, also 5-4, by walking a batter with the bases jammed in the ninth.

Yanks Back Seats
 None of the other All-Star players fared as badly as Jackson. But by and large they took backseats to a bunch of over-looked players like Jim Bunning of the Phillies, Roman Semproch of the Braves, Ike Delock of the Red Sox, Gus Bell and Walt Dropp of the Redlegs, and Dick Drott and Don Elston of the Cubs. None of those chaps will be around when the big game starts in Baltimore.

In addition to the Red Sox win over the Yankees, other A.L. action Sunday saw the Detroit Tigers nip the Chicago White Sox, 2-1; the Washington Senators beat Baltimore, 4-3; and the Cleveland Indians downed Kansas City, 8-5. Besides the Giants, other National League win-

PCL Teams Split Twin Bills; Race Remains Close

 The three-way battle for first place in the Pacific Coast league stayed as tight as ever yesterday as Phoenix, San Diego and Vancouver all split twin bills.

Phoenix rallied to defeat the Mounties 3-1 and capture the series fourth game to three, after Vancouver won the first contest 7-6. San Diego lost a 2-1 pitchers' battle to Salt Lake but bounced back to an easy 11-3 win.

Seattle downed Spokane 3-1 and Sacramento beat Portland 2-1 in other contests.

Durham Dops Bismarck
 Vancouver briefly bashed in first place thanks to a heavy hitting of Jim Durham. In the opening game of the twin bill with Phoenix, he pushed the Mounties off to a 4-0 lead with a bases jammed roundtrip in the first.

Owen Friend's two-run blast made it 6-0.

But Phoenix, which likes to score in bunches, fought back. Jim King and Andre Rogers whacked roundtrippers for the homer-happy Arizonans and it was six-all at the end of the fourth.

In the seventh, Durham singled home the winning marker to bring the win to reliever Joe Hatten.

In the second game, Phoenix again fought back, this time for the win and a return to first.

A third-inning homer by Friend helped the Mounties get off to a 6-2 lead. But the Giants showed their usual muscle as Dusty Rhodes hit his 16th homer, Andre Rogers blasted his second homer of the day and Jake Jenkins banged one out of the park. Meanwhile, Marion Fricano pitched steady relief ball and the Giants won 11-7.

The Phoenix total of 24 homers in the seven-game series tied the PCL mark.

Light Hitter Connects
 San Diego's pitchers stifled the usual hard-hitting Salt Lake bats. Steve Ridzik pitched a three-hitter in the opener but the Bees still won 2-1. George Perez scattered six hits to record the win. Pete Naxton, a .135 hitter, hit the home run in the eighth which broke the 1-1 tie.

In the second game, San Diego displayed the strong attack which has carried the Pads to their present heir apparent position in the PCL. The Padres have won five straight series.

The Bordertowners banged out 13 hits with Eddie Kazak's two-run double launching a four-run scoring blast in the fourth.

At Spokane, Chuck Churn spaced seven hits as he pitched the win. Seattle collected six hits off Larry Sherry and scored their trio of runs in the fourth on hits by Jack Bloomfield and Hal Bevan, a hit batsman, a throwing error by Sherry and a sacrifice fly.

Cellar-dwelling Sacramento parlayed its usual combination of good pitching and weak hitting into its 2-1 triumph over Portland. Hard-throwing Roger Osenbaugh scattered six hits to gain the win. The Solons scored both runs in the fifth when Al Heist singled, Harry Bright did the same, Nippy Jones hit a sacrifice fly to deep center and Jim Greengrass singled.

Today's action only involves the four second-division clubs. Portland is at Sacramento and Spokane at Seattle.

Warren Spahn to Oppose Turley in All-Star Game

 Baltimore, Md.—(UPI)—Manager Fred Haney, making a last-minute switch, today named his southpaw ace Warren Spahn to oppose Bob Turley, the Yankees' 12-game winner, in Tuesday's 25th annual All-Star Game.

Although the American League will have eight right-handed batters in its lineup, Haney selected Spahn, who has won 10 games while losing five this season, over Bob Friend, the 10-game winner

of the Pirates. Friend was expected to be his choice because he is a right-hander.

Spahn, who is appearing in the All-Star Game for the 10th time, has a record of one victory against no defeats in the classic. Spahn won the All-Star game in 1953.

Manager Casey Stengel of the Yankees went along with his original selection in naming Turley, who has lost only three games this year. Neither Haney nor Stengel announced which pitchers they would use after the two starters.

Under the rules of the game, hurlers can pitch only three innings unless the game goes into extra innings.

Bating Order Announced
 Stengel, in naming his batting order, put his star center fielder, Mickey Mantle, into the second spot instead of the third or fourth spots in which he usually bats. He named Nellie Fox, White Sox second baseman and the only left-handed hitter in the American League lineup, to lead off, followed by Mantle, who is a switch-hitter.

Right fielder Jackie Jensen of the Red Sox will bat third with left fielder, Bob Cerv of the Athletics in the cleanup spot. Then will come Moose Skowron, Yankee first baseman; Frank Malzone, Red Sox third baseman; Gus Triandos, Orioles catcher; Lou Aparacio, White Sox shortstop, and Turley.

Willie Mays, Giants' center fielder, will lead off for the National League, followed by left fielder Bob Skinner of the Pirates. First baseman Stan Musial of the Cardinals will bat third with right fielder Hank Aaron of the Braves in the cleanup spot. Following Aaron will be shortstop Ernie Banks of the Cubs; third baseman Frank Thomas of the Pirates; second baseman Bill Mazeroski of the Pirates; catcher Dell Crandall of the Braves, and Spahn.

Both managers indicated they would stay with their starting players if they jump out in front. The starting players, exclusive of the pitchers, were chosen in a poll of major league managers, coaches and players. But they were not permitted to vote for anyone on their own teams.

The American League, which has won 14 of the previous 24 games played, was established a 13-10 betting fa-

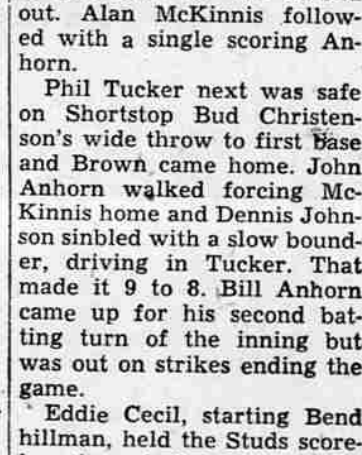
Riley Relieves
