Talks for Missile Bases in France Considered Urgent by NATO Quarters

Editor's note: United Press International correspondent Charles Corddry has just completed a strategic Air Force tour, during which he also inspected NATO bases and spoke with NATO leaders.

Paris (UPI)—A quick new start on negotiations for ballistic missile bases in France is considered urgent at Gen. Lauris Norstad's Supreme Allied Headquarters.
Military men regard the basing of 1,500-mile range rockets of the American Thor or Jupiter type here as crucial to western defense, but the matter of an agreement has got nowhere for two months during France's governmental crises.
Authorities said they hoped negotiations would be resumed with Premier Charles de Gaulle's new government at the earliest moment that French officials can spare time from Algerian and other immediately critical problems.
There has been apprehension from the first that negotiations could be complicated by the De Gaulle government's insistence on making France a nuclear power. As a condition for setting up missile bases the French might demand American aid in their atomic enterprises.
De Gaulle's government has not been able to agree on a NATO-wide defense basis, with selection of missile sites a purely military matter.
But no one now doubts that any final French-American arrangement will be worked out at the highest political levels of the two governments, with the way paved by Norstad's headquarters.
In deference to countries like Norway and Denmark, which want no part of atomic-armed long-range missiles, Norstad has said their great range makes it unnecessary "that they be located in all NATO countries."

Runaway Girl, 14, Kills Policeman With Rifle Shot

Leviston, Maine—(UPI)—A 14-year-old runaway girl allegedly shot and killed a policeman attempting to take her into custody Monday night after she ignored her warning to "keep those flat feet away from here."

Police said the victim, Paul J. Simard, 32, a father of two, was hit "right between the eyes" by a .22 caliber bullet as he advanced with several other officers toward a clump of bushes which hid red-haired Sandra Knowlton.
Investigators said a murder warrant against the girl, who had run away from home earlier Monday when her parents refused to move from their rural home to the city, would be sought in court today.

Took Gun From Cabin
The girl fled into the woods following an argument with her mother. Police said she broke into a hunter's cabin where she got a rifle and about 75 rounds of ammunition.
For more than half an hour, police said, she peeped the area where they were hiding.
Police said the girl warned them to "keep those flat feet away from here" as they closed in and then cut loose with the rifle. Her fire was not returned.
Deputy Sheriff Jean B. Herbert told United Press International, "We didn't expect her to shoot, though she had warned us."

Swim Classes Large At Ashland YMCA

Ashland—Swim classes at the Ashland YMCA this summer have been exceptionally large, according to Wilson Gilinsky, aquatic director, and most boys and girls are beginning to progress rapidly in their swimming skill.
Last Monday students in the tiny-tot classes, composed of boys and girls 6 to 8 years old, gave their first parent demonstration. About 60 persons took part, Gilinsky said.
The various swimming classes are divided according to demonstrated skills, beginning with tadpole and continuing through flounder, minnow, fish, flying fish, and shark. Tadpoles are those students just learning to swim whereas sharks are the most advanced students, except for junior and senior life savers.

The five men were accused of assaulting W. H. Harvey and tossing him into the Columbia river where the boat owner dock at Longview.
Harvey swam to shore and reported the incident. Capt. C. A. Holleyok turned the five men over to the Cowlitz county sheriff's office.

Portland—(UPI)—Two teenage boys accused of stealing a late model Jaguar sports car here over the weekend and driving to the Oregon coast were in the custody of Multnomah county juvenile authorities after an alert radio announcer in Tillamook gave an on-the-spot rundown that led to the capture.
Creighton Sanders, an announcer for radio station KTLB, was giving a morning broadcast Saturday when he saw the sports car crash into the front of a bank. The young driver and his passenger climbed dizzily from the car and began running in the direction of a nearby field.
Sanders notified police, then went back to his microphone and alerted residents in the area. Listeners started after the boys, getting directions from Sanders. Police followed the crowd and apprehended the youths, who were hiding in a creek with only their faces above water.
The boys, both 17, were returned to Portland Sunday. One of them was a parolee from Woodburn School for Boys, police said.
