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Heavy Fighting Rages in Beirut

U. S. Diplomats, Families Huddle Amid Debris

Apartment House Comes Under Attack

Beirut, Lebanon — (UPI)—The heaviest firing of the Lebanese revolt swept Beirut Tuesday night and early today. Coming under concentrated attack was an apartment house where two American diplomats, their wives and children huddled amid shattering glass, chipped masonry and flying bullets.

President Camille Chamoun's oldest son, Dory, helped beat off the attack on the apartment house.

Huddle in Nightclothes
U. S. Embassy political counselor Francis Boardman, Washington, his wife, Ann, and their daughter, Pamela, 2½, huddled in their nightclothes in a lower hallway during the battle.

Three flights up where the firing was more concentrated, Point Four counselor Steven P. Dorsey, Washington, his wife and their two daughters, Gwynn, 14, and Charlotte, 11, took refuge.

The steady chatter of rifle and automatic weapons fire was broken frequently by the heavier thud of exploding rifle grenades and 75-millimeter shells from tank and armored car guns.

There were no reliable reports of casualties, although unofficial reports said 25 persons were wounded.

Fighting in Tripoli
Heavy fighting was reported meanwhile in the northern port city of Tripoli.

Officials of the Iraq Petroleum company said the army used tanks and armored cars to beat off a determined rebel attack on the company's pipeline terminus eight miles north of the center of Tripoli.

They said it was the heaviest rebel assault on their installation to date, but they reported no damage.

Evans Creek Area To Join District

Residents of the Evans Creek drainage area yesterday voted 109 to 17 to join the Rogue Soil Conservation District, according to C. W. Jensen, Rogue River, chairman of the district.

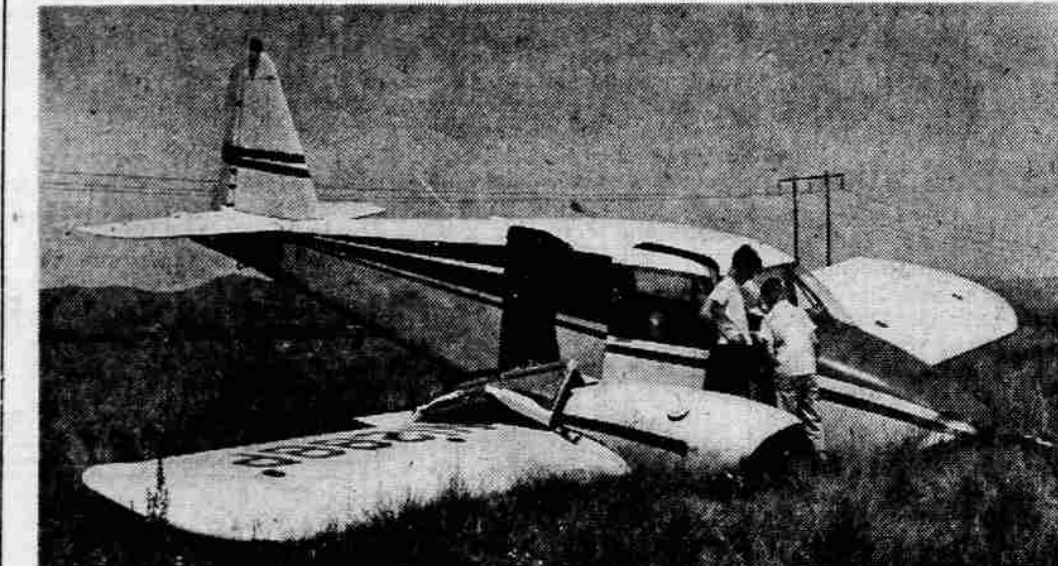
Jensen said it was one of the heaviest voter turnouts for such an election in recent years.

The area favoring inclusion in the district comprises about 142,000 acres, bringing the total area in the Rogue Soil Conservation district to about 900,000 acres.

The area approved for inclusion yesterday was the only area in Jackson County which was not in a soil conservation district.

Trailways Bus Service Not Affected
Local bus service by Continental Trailways has not been affected by the strike of drivers in Los Angeles, San Francisco and other western cities, local company officials said today.

The strike began Tuesday over wages and other contractual issues, it was stated.

Both Burrill, 38, and his passenger, James M. Wright, 25, of 825 South Central ave., Medford, walked away from the damaged plane unhurt.

State's Case Being Presented in Court

Presentation of the state's case against Roger Smith, 106 Crater Lake highway, charged with burglary is expected to continue through today's jury session here, it was reported.

The circuit court jury was selected yesterday. City police officers testifying for the state were Roy Thompson, Keith Gildesgard and Ronald Clawson, all of the Medford city police.

Expected to testify today are Police Chief Charles Champlin, Lt. Lyle Perkins, Jack Sanders, Robert Wright, Raymond Seely and Keith Van Horn, all of the Medford police force.

Smith is charged with removing a safe from Southern Oregon Distributors, 710 South Grape st., on March 30.

Tax Commission Hearings Continue

Salem — (UPI)—State Tax commission hearing on the valuation of timber in Oregon continued here today with representatives from Coos county appearing to testify.

Coos County Assessor C. G. Caughell, Coquille, told the commission he accepted most tax commission recommendations on valuing timber, but changed the recommended 20-year depletion allowance by splitting the county into 15-year and 40-year depletion areas.

Caughell said he did not consider who owned the land when he divided the county into areas. He added that most smaller operators would cut their timber in 15 years or less.

Medford Woman Hurt When Jars Explode

Mrs. Helen Graves, 806 North Riverside ave., suffered burns and lacerations Monday night when nine jars of raspberries being canned in her oven exploded. Glass and hot raspberries spewed from the oven door, striking Mrs. Graves and covering the kitchen walls.

She said she had taken the proper precautions, but that the oven must have been hotter than indicated.

Architect Asked To Prepare Plans For Valley Manor

Trustees Authorize Action Last Night

The board of trustees of Rogue Valley Manor last night authorized John W. Maloney, architect of Seattle, to complete plans and specifications for the \$5½ million retirement home here.

Bids will be called after plans and specifications have been completed, Manor officials said.

Walter Higgins, executive director, told trustees that half the apartments in the Manor have been sold. The structure will be built on Barneburg hill southeast of Medford.

Plans for the retirement home were first started here in September, 1955, and received endorsement by local churches. Trustees were appointed, and officers elected later in 1955. The Manor was incorporated as a non-profit corporation in November, 1955.

Apartment Sales Start
Apartment sales started in March last year under the direction of Higgins, M. N. Hogan, president of the Manor, and other Manor officials.

Members of the Manor who have purchased apartments came from 15 states, and Hawaii.

Of the total, 50 per cent of the members now live in the Rogue valley, Higgins pointed out, and another 10 per cent are Oregon residents.

Hogan noted that it took 15 months to sell enough apartments to proceed with plans and specifications for the local Manor, compared to several years for similar type retirement homes in other locations.

Higgins, prior to moving here, was assistant administrator of the Willamette View Manor of Portland. He was there during the latter part of its construction and during the first year of operation.

County Heads to Submit Petition
A petition signed by county department heads will be presented to the county budget committee tonight requesting that it create a budget item to make adjustments in job reclassifications, an administrative committee said today.

The petition will be presented during the budget hearing at 8 p.m. in the courthouse auditorium, it was announced.

"We request that your committee create a budget item to handle adjustments in equity on employees requesting a reclassification and granted them by a review board (to be set up in the future). Any adjustments made to be retroactive for the 1958-1959 budget."

"Many of the employees are dissatisfied with their new job classifications and if some consideration is not given now we face the possibility of losing these trained persons and the cost to the taxpayers of training new employees would be in excess of salary adjustments due them," the petition pointed out.

Conference With Airmen Postponed

Wiesbaden, Germany — (UPI)—The U. S. Air Force today postponed indefinitely a scheduled press conference for nine airmen whose unarmed transport plane was shot down in flames by two Russian MIG jet fighters.

Officials said the conference was postponed "on advice of medical officials and for additional debriefing opportunities." The men had been described as extremely fatigued and exhausted when they arrived here Tuesday.

Washington — (UPI)—The State Department has charged Russian airmen with "inhuman attacks" and the Soviet foreign minister with not telling the truth in the shooting down of an unarmed U. S. Air Force transport over Soviet Armenia June 27.

Use of Military Planes by Ike's Brother Draws Fire From Top Wisconsin Democrat

Wausau, Wis. — (UPI)—A top Wisconsin Democrat said today he wants to know who ordered the three military planes that picked up vacationing Dr. Milton Eisenhower, the President's brother, suggests tourist methods.

Former Wisconsin Democratic Party Chairman Philo Nash said he hoped the next time Eisenhower visited Wisconsin he'd "use the same means of transportation as thousands of other tourists."

Two of the three planes, single-engine Army craft, flew from Ft. Sheridan, Ill., to pick up Eisenhower and his daughter, Ruth, at Land O'Lakes, Wis., Tuesday.

One plane took the Eisenhower family to Wausau. The other took their baggage.

At Wausau, they were met by an Air Force C-131 Convair for the trip to Washington.

200 Registered For Postmasters Convention Here

Registration for the convention is nearly 200 as the group continues its second day of the three-day meeting. Mrs. Hope Brader, Chemult, state president, has been presiding at the meetings.

Election of officers will be held Thursday morning. Sessions so far have consisted of morning meetings at Medford High school auditorium and classes at the high school. Conducting the classes are field officers of the post office department. Postmaster Thomas Palmer, Albany, is educational director for the association.

Tuesday afternoon the group toured Bear Creek orchards packing plant and the Shakespearean theatre and Lithia park in Ashland.

Robert Karr, Portland, postmaster, was the featured speaker at the dinner at the Medford hotel. Scheduled this afternoon was a tea and tour of the gardens at Hanleylands with hostesses, Mrs. E. B. Hanley and Mrs. Katherine Hanley Heffernan.

A. J. Tonsing, Portland, organizations management officer, will be principal speaker at a dinner tonight at the Rogue Valley Country club.

New officers will be installed at the Thursday night banquet with Harold Prestel, Grants Pass, postmaster, as master of ceremonies. Samuel G. Schwartz, Portland, regional operations manager, will also speak at the final dinner.

Social Security Boost Proposed

Washington — (UPI)—Sen. Clifford P. Case (R-N.J.) proposed a 10 per cent boost in Social Security benefits today as a fair shake for the aged and an effective anti-recession measure.

But his bill and similar legislation were given only a slim chance of enactment at this session of Congress.

The Senate Finance committee, now considering the House-passed reciprocal trade bill, was seen as the key stumbling block to fast action on Social Security. Finance Chairman Harry F. Byrd (D-Va.) has made it clear he would expect thorough hearings on any "comprehensive" bill.

Washington — (UPI)—Allen T. Ettinger has been nominated as postmaster at Brookings, Ore. The nomination has been sent to the Senate.

Goldfine Tells Of Requesting Help by Adams

Washington — (UPI)—Bernard Goldfine and his son, H. Maxwell, told House investigators today that they turned to Presidential Assistant Sherman Adams for help in a tangle with the Federal Trade Commission because they did not trust the commission.

Goldfine and son were dubious, however, about what good their friend Adams did them.

Third Time on Stand
The morning session of the House influence-investigation subcommittee brought Goldfine to the witness stand for the third time.

Committee counsel Robert W. Lishman took up most of the session asked the Boston textile tycoon and his son about their mislabeling troubles with the Federal Trade Commission and about technical problems in operating the family's woolen mills.

Goldfine was ready with what his aides said were complete records on \$776,000 in un cashed checks, held by Goldfine firms since 1941. The subcommittee had threatened him with contempt if he failed to produce them.

The subcommittee did not get to this phase of the inquiry before it recessed for lunch.

The subcommittee counsel has suggested some of the bank checks might have gone too timid to cash them but were willing to use them for collateral in business deals. Goldfine has denied that anything like that ever happened.

Another Hotel Bill
Lishman brought up at one point a previously undisclosed instance in which Adams stayed at the Sheraton Plaza hotel in Boston and his bill was paid by Goldfine's Strathmore Woolen company. This occurred Dec. 23-24, 1953, when the FTC was investigating nylon labels used by

266 Registered for Swimming Classes

Swimming class registrations at the Hawthorne Park pool for the second series now in progress totaled 266, according to Bob Sutherland, head instructor.

There were 225 registered in the first series, including 162 beginners and 63 intermediates, Sutherland reported. Of these, he said, 39 beginners and 32 intermediates passed their courses. Cubans Indicate Captive Release

Havana — (UPI)—The Cuban rebels indicated they would begin releasing 30 kidnapped American sailors and Marines today but a U. S. Embassy spokesman warned the operation may take some time. The Cuban government said the rebels are stalling to hold off an army offensive.

One more American civilian captive was flown out of the rebel mountain stronghold in Oriente Province to the U. S. Naval Base at Guantanamo Tuesday night. He was Raymond Elmore, of Haynesville, La., assistant manager of the Ermita Sugar mill. Elmore was kidnapped June 26.

Warning Against Losing Sight of Cooperation Told Russia Termed Main Problem

Ottawa, Ont. — (UPI)—President Eisenhower said today Canada and the United States must never let their differences result in their losing sight of the importance of Free World cooperation in winning the global struggle against Communist imperialism.

In an address before a joint meeting of the Canadian Parliament, the President said he was sure Canada and his nation could settle their relatively minor differences in a friendly spirit.

The main problem of the two neighbor nations was Russia's "military threat and political attacks," he said.

"Our system of free enterprise is challenged throughout the world by a state-directed, state-controlled economic system," he said.

"Indeed this could well be the area in which the competition will be most bitter and most decisive between the Free World and Communist imperialism."

For this reason, he said, the two North American nations must not let bilateral economic problems dominate their relations.

The President saw no reason "to be surprised or disturbed to discover that occasionally differences arise between us."

"The distinguishing character of the peoples of the Free World lies in the fact that differences between them can develop, be expressed and amicably resolved," he said.

"We in the United States have no more desire than you to seek in our relations with others the silent, sullen unity that elsewhere has been purchased or imposed."

Public Highlight

Eisenhower's address before the Parliament was the public highlight of his three-day informal visit here in an effort to improve Canadian-U. S. relations which have deteriorated sharply over economic differences.

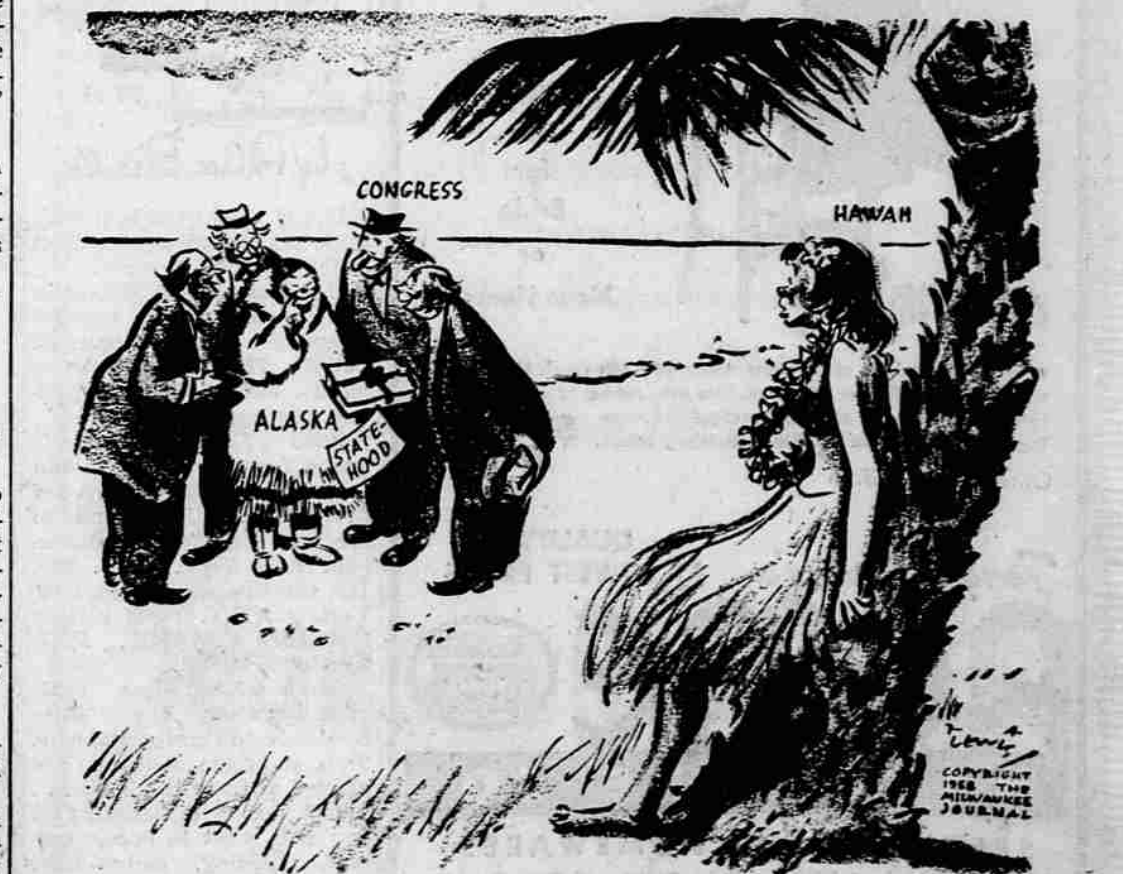
Before making the speech, he laid a wreath at the National War Memorial honoring Canada's dead in the two world wars. He met with the Canadian Cabinet before leaving the Parliament building.

The President and Prime Minister John Diefenbaker held their first discussion late Tuesday five hours after Eisenhower arrived here on the presidential plane Columbine III.

Arctic Inspection Zone
Eisenhower saw in Canadian-U. S. cooperation on defense and projects such as the St. Lawrence Seaway a lesson "that by mutual respect, understanding and with good will we can find acceptable solutions to any problems which exist or may arise between us."

He noted both nations were trying to get the Kremlin to agree to an Arctic inspection zone against surprise attack. He expressed cautious optimism that Russia's latest note to him indicated they will eventually agree to such a plan.
