Plane Skids as Landing Gear Fails

Reno — (UPI) — A United Air Lines twin-engine Convair carrying 29 persons skidded 850 feet on its belly Tuesday night after the landing gear collapsed on touching down at Reno Municipal airport.

None of the 26 passengers or three crew members was hurt. The wing flaps, cowling and underside of the fuselage were damaged.

The plane was Flight 359 from San Francisco.

The Hollywood Scene

Hollywood — (UPI) — The honorary mayor racket among the cinema folk is pretty much of a cut and dried publicity operation these days — with Art Linkletter and John Saxon notable exceptions.

Linkletter's efforts as Hollywood's honorary mayor for the last year earned him a special luncheon tribute last month by 450 civic leaders and businessmen.

"This tribute is small payment for the untiring efforts of Art Linkletter in behalf of the Hollywood community," the master of ceremonies said, thus putting the genial radio-TV emcee a cut above most other filmland "honorary" mayors.

It's those in the "do-nothing" category that annoy Saxon, the only bonafide movie-TV personality mayor of the 30-odd celluloid luminaries who claim an honorary title.

Last November Saxon claimed a majority of the 2897 ballots cast by employ-

ees of his studio, Universal-International to become the honest-to-gosh mayor of Universal City, an incorporated municipality embracing the movie lot.

And Saxon wants it known there is nothing "honorary" about the deal.

"I figure I've spent a little over 500 hours devoted entirely to civic duties since the election," the good looking young actor said.

Most of the matters reaching the mayor's desk have been less weighty, although he was successful in a campaign to secure a 25-man team of volunteer fire fighters to aid the professional fire department on the lot.

Mayor Saxon ran into trouble on a second campaign. The town council vetoed his proposal for a drinking fountain for pets belonging to actors in the Universal City public park.

As U-I mayor Saxon is pressed into service for visiting politicians. To date he has escorted around the movie lot two state governors; a U.S. senator; and the mayors Arrowmanche-Les-Bains, France; Felixstowe, England; and Marietta, Ohio.

He also accompanied the Moiseyev Ballet Troupe, a convention of 354 motion picture insurance underwriters; a delegation of Los Angeles Dodger baseball fans from Brooklyn (Saxon's home town) and a convention of 500 master plumbers visiting the lot to inspect the artificial waterfall built by studio sanitary engineers.

Saxon recently returned from a European trip where, in addition to film work, he visited the mayors of Brussels, Naples, Bern and Marcellise and Princess Grace (Kelly) of Monaco.

All have promised to return his municipal visits on future trips to the U.S. Better set aside another 500 hours for "civic duties," mayor.

Philadelphians — (UPI) — Members of the Newspaper Guild at the Philadelphia Inquirer voted overwhelmingly to end their 38-day strike, paving the way for resumption of regular delivery of the Inquirer and the Evening Bulletin.

More than 600 members of the Newspaper Guild of greater Philadelphia voted to accept a new two year contract hammered out in night-long negotiations between union and management representatives.

The action sparked immediate delivery of the four-star edition of the Bulletin to newsstands for the first time since Memorial day, when Teamsters walked out at the Bulletin and the Inquirer.

Driving Rain Squall Capsizes Sailboats

New York — (UPI) — A rain squall hit the New York area late Tuesday capsizing nearly 60 small sailboats in the New York Yacht club's "Junior Regatta." All the young sailors from 9 to 18 years old were rescued.

Power launches from the 11 participating yacht clubs and Coast Guard planes and boats rescued the regatta crews despite five-foot waves and driving rain on Long Island sound off Greenwich, Conn.

Japanese Flags Going Back Home

Portland — (UPI) — Many Japanese flags taken on Southwest Pacific battlefields by American soldiers during World War II are going back to Japan, according to officials who are planning the reunion of the 41st Infantry Division here.

The reunion and national convention of the 41st Infantry Division association will open here July 18.

Co-chairmen Paul Yale and Don Cunningham said that all members of the Association have been asked to bring the souvenir flags to the convention. The flags will then be sent to the families of the deceased soldiers.

Cunningham said arrangements have been made with the Japanese Consul in Portland to have lettering on the flags translated. He explained that many Japanese soldiers carried flags usually inscribed with prayers for safe and victorious return and often with patriotic or humorous messages.

Truck Returns Fish To Sea

Astoria — (UPI) — The driver of a flatbed truck loaded with 11,000 pounds of bottom fish unintentionally surrendered most of his load back to the sea Tuesday when a dock suddenly gave way under the rear of the vehicle here.

Driver and owner of the truck, Gene Madon, of Svensen, said he had just finished the loading operation at the dock at the foot of 16th st. and was driving off the pier when weak planking crumbled.

The rear of the truck fell about 10 feet with the front end sticking up through the hole while the load of fish floated out the back end. Madon was uninjured and there was only minor damage to the truck, which was pulled out two hours later with a crane.

Some of the fish were salvaged. Five cars were stranded on the end of the pier before the truck was removed.

More Clearance for Bridge Span Asked

Astoria — (UPI) — A request for a clearance of 198 feet at mean high water instead of a proposed 196 feet at mean low water for the south span was made at a public hearing Tuesday on the proposed new Astoria-Megler Columbia river bridge.

Capt. Howard J. Bergman, who represented the commandant of the 13th Naval District, said the Navy needed the higher span to take care of some aircraft carriers and future possibilities. This would mean the span would have 8-1 feet added to its height.

The hearing was conducted by Army engineers.

Accidental Gun Shot Fatal

The Dalles — (UPI) — A 17-year-old Portland youth died Tuesday after accidentally wounding himself with a 32-20 Colt revolver during a hiking trip with a companion in Eagle Creek park in Hood River county about 45 miles west of here, state police said.

State Policeman Frank Gilbert here identified the victim as Bradford K. Krueger. His companion, Frederick Derrel Emburg, 18, also of Portland, gave this version of the accident:

The pair drove to the park, about 3½ miles off Highway 30, left their car and hiked up a trail. They carried their revolvers and Krueger had the revolver and Emburg a rifle. They planned to get in some target practice.

They stopped to get a drink of water at a creek and as they bent over Emburg said he heard a shot. Krueger straightened up, said "I've shot myself," and collapsed.

After making Krueger as "comfortable as possible," Emburg hiked back to the highway for help. Gilbert said he returned to the scene with Emburg and that Krueger was brought to the highway where he was pronounced dead by Ray Cotner, deputy coroner for Hood River county.

Adelie Penguin Dies at Portland

Portland — (UPI) — An Adelie penguin of Portland's Antarctic flock died Tuesday, leaving a total of five small Adelines and nine big Emperors. Cause of the death wasn't known.

Klamath Bill Wins Approval

Washington — (UPI) — The House Indian affairs subcommittee Tuesday approved a bill providing for sale of Klamath Indian lands in Oregon.

But before it sent the measure to the full House Interior committee the subcommittee adopted an amendment calling for a review of the appraised sales price for the land.

Under the amendment, the Interior department would appoint three appraisers to take another look at the estimated value of the land and report their findings to Congress by next Jan. 15.

The amendment also provides that no sales of Klamath land would be permitted

until after July 1, 1959.

A subcommittee spokesman said the effect of the changes would be that termination of federal control over the Klamath tribe would be delayed until August, 1961. Under a bill already passed by the Senate the termination date would be August, 1960.

Leggled Bingo Near in New York City

New York — (UPI) — The city council took the first step Tuesday to legalize bingo in New York City.

A council bill would allow bingo on Sunday only after 6 p.m. and would bar any person under 18 from the game. Under the bill, bingo would be legal next Jan. 1.

The measure now must be approved by the Board of Estimate, signed by Mayor Robert Wagner and endorsed by the voters in the November elections.

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
