

Arrest of Genovese Seen Biggest Grab Since Capone Days

New York — (UPI) — The federal government may have finally snaggled the most powerful underworld figure in the United States since Al Capone.

He is mild-mannered little Vito Genovese, 61, believed to head in this country the Mafia, the centuries-old Sicilian terror and murder society which has been "enforcer" among criminals in America since prohibition.

Like Scarface Al, Genovese has managed to beat every rap—including murder.

Fair Exhibitors Should Make Plans

Salem — (UPI) — Exhibitors who plan to enter exhibits in the Oregon State Fair starting here Aug. 28 should start making plans now, the fair commission urged today.

Howard Maple, executive secretary of the fair, said prospective exhibitors should first send for a premium book which lists 14 divisions in which exhibits can be entered.

The book lists all the rules for entering each division. Exhibitors in the textile and art department must be Oregon residents.

Oregon Lumbermen Protest Policies

Portland — (UPI) — Four Oregon lumbermen were in Washington, D.C., today to protest federal timber sales policies.

The lumbermen, representing smaller firms which get logs from national forests, claim the government hasn't obtained access rights needed to allow loggers to pass over private lands into national forests.

The group planned to take its protest to the Senate Interior and Insular Affairs committee.

Making the trip were Duane Autzen, Portland; Ed Erskine, Eugene, president of the Western Forests Industries association; Ben Thomas, Woodland, Wash., and Leonard Netzorg, attorney for WFLA.

Lumbermen said the U.S. Forest Service is 500 million feet behind in offering for sale what it had announced it would post for sale this year.

Three Injured in Two Accidents

Three persons were injured in two accidents last night, according to state police.

Injured were Don Dean Goyette, 20, of 707½ West 11th st., Medford, who received a cut on his left hand, and his passenger, Miss Patricia Leila Lipper, 16, of 46 Granite st., Ashland who suffered a bump on the head; and Mrs. Ruby Ruth Hinton, 49, route 1, box 418, Talent, driver in the second accident, who was examined for possible rib injuries, and released from Ashland General hospital.

One accident occurred about 6:05 p.m. on the Kirtland rd., west of the Bear Creek bridge. A car driven by Goyette apparently failed to make a left turn near the bridge, state police said. It rolled over twice and landed on its wheels on the north shoulder of the road, police reported.

Officers cited Goyette for violation of the basic rule. The other accident occurred about 7:30 p.m. on Highway 99 in front of the Tally Ho restaurant, police said. A car driven by Mrs. Hinton apparently pulled in front of a truck owned by Ephrata Pre-Mix company, officers said. Mrs. Hinton was cited for failure to stop before entering a through highway, police said. Robert Wood, driver of the truck, Mountlake Terrace, Wash., was not injured, officers said.

San Francisco — (UPI) — A top business executive told his peers today that many of them are victims of "fads" and run their businesses on pet "theories" that could not stand up under a blunt, objective examination.

King Wilkin, president of Zellerbach Paper company, spoke at the 75th annual convention of the National Confectioners' association here. He told the 3800 delegates that some businesses are "so dominated by one or two men" that "no one dares raise his voice."

Such firms, he said, are on the road to "complacency" which leads to smugness, then to desperation and finally failure.

They fail, he said, because there is "too much emphasis on theory, which they fail to convert into practical, workable projects."

Climbers Conquer Mount McKinley

Anchorage, Alaska — (UPI) — Jubilant mountain climbers from two expeditions are en route home today after successfully reaching the 20,320-foot peak of Mt. McKinley.

Ten men reached the summit July 2 after two weeks of climbing rugged crevasses and ice-packed terrain and as a result the Alaskan flag now flies atop the jagged peak.

First member of the expedition to return to civilization was T. Sgt. Robert T. Elliott, a 31-year-old father of three who is a member of the famed 71st Air Rescue squadron at Elmendorf Air Force base.

Elliott said he and three members of the International Mt. McKinley expedition had reached the top in the late afternoon of July 2.
