# Ingrid Bergman Granted Annulment; State Plans Appeal

Rome — (UPI) — A Rome civil court today granted annulment of Ingrid Bergman's Mexican proxy marriage to Roberto Rossellini but the state was reported planning to appeal the verdict.

This would mean an annulment could not become final for at least a year.

Court President Mario Elia signed the verdict granting Italian film director Rossellini's request for a declaration that his marriage to Miss Bergman was null and void.

Miss Bergman did not contest the suit.

The court sent copies of the verdict to the attorneys for Rossellini and Miss Bergman and to Public Prosecutor Dr. Martino Ferrajolo.

Court sources quoted Ferrajolo as saying he planned to appeal the verdict within the next two days on grounds of insufficient documentation.

An appeal would force a delay in Miss Bergman's plans to marry Swedish impresario Lars Schmidt. She announced last week end in London that she and Schmidt intended to wed as soon as she was free to do so.

Her friends said she had been looking forward to an autumn wedding.

Tuesday, a report from Bombay said Indian script-writer Sonali Das Gupta had filed for divorce from her husband, Hari.

Rossellini's name had been linked romantically with Sonali before the break-up of his marriage to Miss Bergman.

**Legal Separation**  
Rossellini and Miss Bergman got a legal separation from a Rome court last November. They were married in 1950, shortly after the birth of their first child.

Rossellini had asked for the annulment on grounds Miss Bergman's Mexican divorce from her first husband, Swedish surgeon Peter Lindstrom, was not valid under Swedish law.

As a result, Rossellini's attorney, Angelo Currao, contended Rossellini's proxy marriage to Miss Bergman May 24, 1950, in Juarez, Mexico, was void.

Lindstrom later won a Swedish-recognized divorce from Miss Bergman in Los Angeles. He since has remarried.
