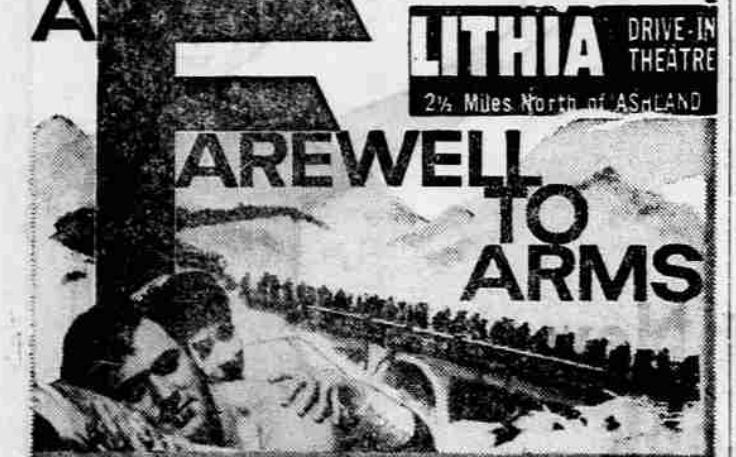

Optimism Pushes List To Year's High

New York—(UPI)—Secretary of Commerce Sinclair Weeks today gave the stock market incentive for a week end rise to new highs for 1958.

DOW-JONES AVERAGES
New York—(UPI)—Dow-Jones final stock averages: 30 industrials 482.85, up 3.88; 20 railroads 122.34, up 1.85, 15 utilities 80.55, up 0.56, and 65 stocks 167.45, up 1.54. Sales today were about 2,400,000 shares compared with 2,510,000 shares Thursday.

Weeks expressed increasing optimism on the economy and said a definite upswing seems in the cards for the fall.

Railroad issues, on which favorable last quarter predictions are being heard, made the best showing. Their gains ranged to more than a point and their average rose nearly 1½ per cent to a new high since last Oct. 9. Industrials set a high since Sept. 3 and utilities since Sept. 24, 1930.
