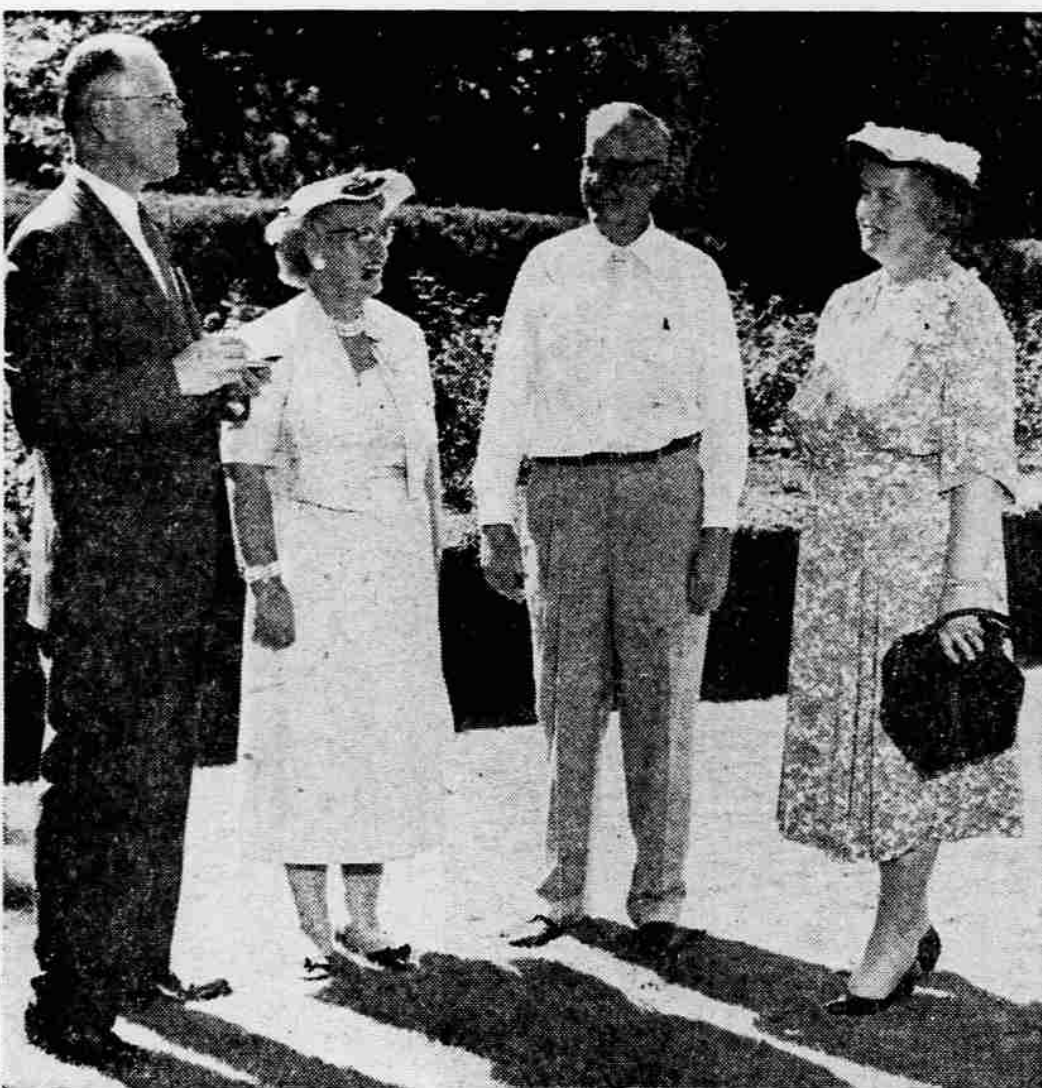
Couple Married In Home Rites
