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Police Hunt Robber Who Got \$2,470

Portland — (UPI) — Police carried on an intensive search Saturday for the well-dressed gunman who held up the Pacific First Federal Savings and Loan association here Friday afternoon and snatched out with a total of \$2,470, most of it in marked bills.
The blue-suited bandit walked up to the cage of Mrs. Jenna Colgan at 2:30 p.m. and showed a pistol which he carried inside a black zipper briefcase.
"This is it. Give me your big bills," he ordered.
Mrs. Colgan handed him a package of \$10 bills, a package of \$20 bills, and single \$50 and \$100 bills. He ordered her to get to the rear of her teller's cage and then walked out the front door.
Police said the packages of \$10 and \$20 bills were "marked" money and the bank had the serial numbers of all the bills.
The bandit was described as about 55 years old and was said to be wearing a grey hat and dark blue suit.

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Nuclear Test Device Announced by AEC

Washington — (UPI)—The Atomic Energy commission said another nuclear test device was exploded at Bikini Saturday.
It was the 13th officially confirmed test explosion since the current series started at the Eniwetok - Bikini proving ground in April. At least two additional tests are believed to have been held.
The AEC said the latest explosion was at 3:30 p.m. July 12 Eniwetok time (8:30 p.m. PDT Friday).
The commission usually reports only test explosions large enough to be detectable far beyond the Pacific proving ground. In past series it has detonated the larger weapons at Bikini and the smaller ones at Eniwetok.
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Bill Approved to Admit Narrow Rolls

Washington — (UPI) — The House Ways and Means committee overwhelmingly approved a bill Friday to permit newspaper rolls as narrow as 13 inches to be imported duty-free.
The law now exempts from duties only paper rolls which are at least 15 inches wide.
The legislation, sponsored by Rep. Frank Icard (D-Tex.) was sought by newspaper publishers who said it was necessary to meet the trend toward narrower newspaper pages.
It was opposed by some domestic paper manufacturers who said it would expose them to unfair competition from lower-priced foreign paper.

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
