Oils Lead Smart Recovery on Market

New York — (UPI) — Domestic oils, steels and rails led a smart recovery on the stock market today.

The rise came in the afternoon after selling apparently had run its course in international oils which had been depressed sharply by the coup in Iraq.

Volume centered on the international oils with Royal Dutch in top place followed by Jersey Standard, Shell Transport, Getty and Texas Co. These issues regained a large part of losses that ranged to more than three points in Gulf.

The domestic oils had gains running to more than four points in Richfield which along with Phillips, Amerasia and Pure Oil set new highs.

UAR Recognizes Iraqi Government

Cairo — (UPI) — The United Arab Republic granted diplomatic recognition today to the new Iraqi government.

The official announcement less than 24 hours after the Baghdad coup d'etat came shortly after President Gamal Abdel Nasser cabled his good wishes to the Iraqi revolutionary leaders.

The overthrow of the pro-Western government gave Nasser one of his greatest victories for it drastically weakened the Eisenhower Doctrine and Baghdad Pact.

Nasser's message, in reply to a cable from Iraq recognizing the U.A.R., said:

"I have received your telegram conveying recognition of the U.A.R.

"In expressing my appreciation I send my regards to the great Iraqi people in the name of the U.A.R. God grant you success in the service of Arabism."

Nasser sent his message from a yacht on which he and his family are returning from Yugoslavia where he conferred with Marshal Tito. He departed a day ahead of schedule for the three-day trip home.

DAV Said Gaining Ground in Battle

Portland — (UPI) — Paul E. Frederick, national commander of Disabled American Veterans, says the organization is gaining ground in its battle against some policies of the Veterans administration.

Frederick, 34, Cincinnati, said the DAV has been opposing policies of the VA since 1934 when a new yardstick for measuring claims resulted in some 60,000 disabled veterans having compensation reduced or cut off. He said the law stated that when doubt existed about compensation the question was to be resolved in favor of the veterans.

He said the DAV now was winning about 40 per cent of its appeals.
