

New York Yankees Aim At Old League Game Record; Leading By 13 Games

The New York Yankees aren't looking to coast into the World Series, they're aiming to fly in by a record 20-game margin.

They didn't decide on that figure arbitrarily, either. If they can make it, they will shatter their own record of 19 1/2 games by which they won the 1936 American League pennant.

The runaway Yankees increased their lead to 13 games—largest margin of the season—with a 5-0 victory over the Chicago White Sox Monday night.

Southpaw Whitey Ford breezed to his 11th victory while giving up only three hits and walking none. He got the only run he really needed when Hank Bauer led off the first inning with his ninth homer off Jose Early Wynn.

Mickey Mantle slammed his 23rd homer in the seventh to help Ford run his lifetime record to 24-8 over the White Sox.

Sensors Blanked
Ex-Yankee Jack Urban halted Kansas City's six-game losing streak when he shut out Washington, 4-0, on four hits for his seventh triumph of the year.

The Athletics rapped Pedro Ramos for three runs in the first inning, Preston Ward doubling home two of the runs and then scoring himself on Harry Simpson's single.

Bob Boyd's eighth-inning homer broke up a pitching duel between Skinny Brown and Herb Moford and led the Baltimore Orioles to a 2-1 win over the Detroit Tigers.

Boyd also scored Baltimore's first run in the opening inning when he doubled and came home on Gene Woodling's single. Brown yielded seven hits and struck out eight in posting his third straight victory.

The Boston Red Sox broke a three-game losing streak by defeating the Cleveland Indians, 4-3, in 10 innings.

Southpaw Don Mossi walked in the winning run by giving up a base on balls to pinch hitter Ted Lepcio with the bases full. Jim Mudecat Grant, however, was the loser.

Braves Regain Lead
Murray Wall hurled two-hit ball after replacing Dave Siler in the seventh to gain his

fourth victory. Dick Brown homered for the Tribe.

Milwaukee, which relinquished the National League lead Sunday recaptured it from San Francisco by drubbing the Giants, 12-3, behind Lew Burdette's five-hit pitching.

Wes Covington and Johnny Logan paced the Braves' 16-hit attack, the bulk of which was borne by loser Red Worthington. Covington drove in three runs with a homer and three singles while Logan also knocked in three runs with a homer and a pair of singles.

Leon Wagner homered for the Giants. The victory was Burdette's eighth of the year.

Little Don Zimmer cracked out two home runs as the Los Angeles Dodgers made it four in a row over the Cincinnati Redlegs with an 8-5 decision.

Zimmer drove in four runs with his two homers while Charlie Neal contributed a three-run homer and Steve Bilko connected with the bases empty.

Durrelle Is Favored To Whip Holt

New York—(UPI)—Canadian Yvon Durrelle is favored at 9-5 to keep his British Empire light heavyweight crown Wednesday night in the week's outstanding fight—a 12-rounder with Mike Holt of South Africa at the Montreal Forum.

The bout will be televised ABC throughout the United States, but not in Canada.

Durrelle of Baie Ste. Anne, N.B., will be defending the 175-pound title he won on a second-round knockout over Gordon Wallace, May 30, 1957. At 29 his 73-19-2 record includes 37 knockouts.

Holt, 26, is champion of Africa. The slugger from Pretoria outpointed Yola and Pompey at London, June 3, to get the shot. His 31-60-0 record includes 21 knockouts.

Durrelle is favored because of his strength and ruggedness. Durrelle is rated third Ring and fourth NBA. Holt is ranked fifth Ring and seventh NBA.

Another Canadian, lightweight, Gale Kerwin of Ottawa, Ont., meets Bobby Scanlon of San Francisco in a 10-round TV-radio NBC fight at Madison Square Garden Friday night. Unbeaten Scanlon is favored at 7-5 because of his speed and skill.

Scanlon won 28 of his 29 bouts and had one draw. He is a "picture fighter." He scored 10 knockouts. Lanky Kerwin's 27-6-1 record includes six knockouts. Neither is rated.

There was no advance word of what punishment—if any—would be meted out to the club-throwing, terrible-tempered tee shot artist who announced only last month as he won the coveted U.S. Open that he was a "reformed soul."

Subsequent events failed to prove that assertion. He withdrew from three events after only nine holes and also was accused of "unbecoming conduct" after verbally attacking tourney officials. And then he had been on probation for

past misdemeanors since last January.

None of his fellow pros would permit themselves to be quoted but one of their top members summed up the general feeling when he said: "This is like a child with a temper tantrum whose mother keeps saying 'no, no,' and he keeps right on doing as he pleases. That kind of a child has to be sat on—hard."

Bolt is scheduled to be one of 166 pros, including 11 former champions headed by defending champion Lionel Hebert, to tee off Thursday in the revamped tournament which this year for the first time changes from match to medal play because of financial reasons.

The change in format was made because the big names were being knocked out in early rounds in recent years and the guys named Joe who survived couldn't draw peanuts.

Tommy Bolt Goes On Trial Today

Havertown, Pa.—(UPI)—U.S. Open golf champion Tommy Bolt goes "on trial" today before his own profession, facing possible suspension from tournament play because of his behavior.

Bolt's predicament, as he faced the wrath of the long-suffering Professional Golf association executive committee, hurled into the background Thursday's opening of the annual PGA tournament.

The status of the man known as "Thunder," whose most recent explosions had drawn him a \$500 fine, was to be decided today at a command appearance before the governing body of his own association.

There was no advance word of what punishment—if any—would be meted out to the club-throwing, terrible-tempered tee shot artist who announced only last month as he won the coveted U.S. Open that he was a "reformed soul."

Subsequent events failed to prove that assertion. He withdrew from three events after only nine holes and also was accused of "unbecoming conduct" after verbally attacking tourney officials. And then he had been on probation for</
