Sullivan, Monroe, Stacey Win in Jr. Golf Tournament

Five winners and a number of runners-up received trophies at the Rogue Valley Country club Tuesday afternoon at the wind-up of the Southern Oregon Junior Golf championship.

Mike Monroe, 15, defending champion in the boys division for boys 12 through 15 years, won again this year in that division. Mike is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Allen Monroe of Medford.

Pam Stacey, another defending champion from Medford, captured first in the girls division. Miss Stacey, 16, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Stacey.

Treasure Sullivan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Sullivan of Ashland repeated as winner in the junior girls division, for youths up to but not including 15 years old.

Other winners included John Kerr, 16, Portland, in the junior division for boys 16 and 17; and Larry Babica, 11, Eureka, Calif., in the pee wee division for boys 11 and under.

The tournament included 36 holes of golf. In the boys division, Monroe carded a 153 total to edge out second place Byron Wood, Eugene, who scored 157. Third place went to Bob Vales, Crescent City, Calif., with a 161.

Miss Stacey dominated the girls division, which was open to girls 6 through 17, with a 162. Cassie Thompson of Medford came in second with a 226 score.

The junior division wound up in a tie at the end of regulation play with Kerr and Tony Monroe, Medford each carding a 153. In a sudden death playoff young Kerr birdied the 19th hole to win first place. Following second place Monroe was Stewart Schroeder, Medford, who also had to birdie the 19th hole to break a three-way tie. Tied with Schroeder with 156 each were Larry Hiron and Pete Geertson, both of Eugene.

Following Larry Babica who carded a 180 in the pee wee division were Mike Soran, Klamath Falls, with a 183, and Doug Olson, Medford, with a 184.

Sue Lance of Medford scored a 202 in the junior girls to place second behind Miss Sullivan's 173.

At the conclusion of first round play Monday Kerr was in third spot behind Monroe and Schroeder but he was able to pick up three strokes on the leader in Tuesday play to tie Monroe and force the playoff.

Mike Monroe led his divi-

sion throughout both days as did Miss Sullivan and Miss Stacey. However in the pee wee division Larry Babica had to come from second place to top Soran, who led after Monday play.

Marciano Turns Promotor; He Sells Potatoes

Greensboro, N.C.—(UPI)—Retired heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano set out today as a potato promotor.

He began a tour of supermarkets in North Carolina, Tennessee and the Virginias autographing 10-pound bags of "carefully selected" potatoes that carry a picture of Rocky in fighting pose, a picture of his championship belt and a list of his fights over a nine-year span.

"We're just in the preliminary stages now... just fighting the four-rounders," he said in telling newsmen of plans for his Salem, Va., packing partnership, Rocky Marciano Enterprises, Inc.

From potatoes, he and his partner Jim Carniglio plan to branch out into packing onions, tomatoes and citrus fruit, some of it from farms they own in South Carolina, Virginia, Florida and New York.

League Leaders Loose; Portland Wins in PCL

Something's got to give in the Pacific Coast league this week—and Tuesday night it was the loop's two top clubs.

Fourth-place Salt Lake, paced by home runs off the bats of Carlos Bernier and R. C. Stevens, dumped league-leading San Diego, 8-5, and George Bamberger picked up his 100th PCL victory while hurling third-place Vancouver to a 5-1 win over the number two club, Phoenix.

Vancouver gained a full game on San Diego to move within two games of the pace-setting Padres. The loss to Vancouver left Phoenix a half game out of first.

Larry Sherry and Joe Stan-

ka hooked up in a 10-inning duel at Sacramento as the Solons pushed across a run in the bottom of the 10th to record a 1-0 victory over Spokane. Jim Westlake blooped a single into center field to score Stanka, who got on base via an error, with the deciding run.

Portland took an early lead against Seattle then withstood two late-inning Ranier rallies to eke out a 3-4 win.

Salt Lake opened its crucial series with San Diego by taking a 6-1 lead after four innings of play. The Pads came back with a three-run burst in the sixth but relief pitcher Eddie O'Brien came in to put out the fire and save the win for starter Jack Lamabe. The Bees collected a dozen hits while the Pads had 11.

Shortstop Andre Rodgers of Phoenix, the PCL's leading hitter, lined out his 22nd homer of the season in the first inning at Vancouver but Bamberger settled down to allow the Giants only seven scattered hits the rest of the way. The victory gave the Mountie hurler an 8-7 mark for the year.

Buddy Peterson and Ray Barker led the 11-hit Mountie attack with a homer apiece. Don Taussig attempted a shoe-string catch of Barker's sinking liner in the fifth, but the ball got past him and rolled to the wall to give Barker a three-run, inside-the-park homer.

Stanka allowed Spokane only four hits while winning his fifth game of the season. Sherry limited the Solons to six hits but the 10th inning error by shortstop Lyle Olsen, which gave Stanka a life, proved fatal.

Portland scored what proved to be the winning run in the seventh frame when Alex Cosmidis and Dave Melton hit back-to-back doubles. The Rainiers came back with two runs in both the eighth and ninth innings, but Jim Davis came in to save the win for Al Laary. George Freese smashed his 18th homer for the Beavers and Jack Littrell connected for his 10th.

Bowmen Set Archery Tournament

The largest and most unique archery event of its kind will be staged near this northern Michigan community July 29-Aug. 1 as bowmen compete for a \$5,000 purse.

Bear said the top 16 contestants, 8 men and 8 women, from the 13th annual National Field Archery association tournament to be held at the Michigan National Guard camp July 28-31, will be invited to compete for the purse at the Bear Invitational Aug. 1 at the same site.

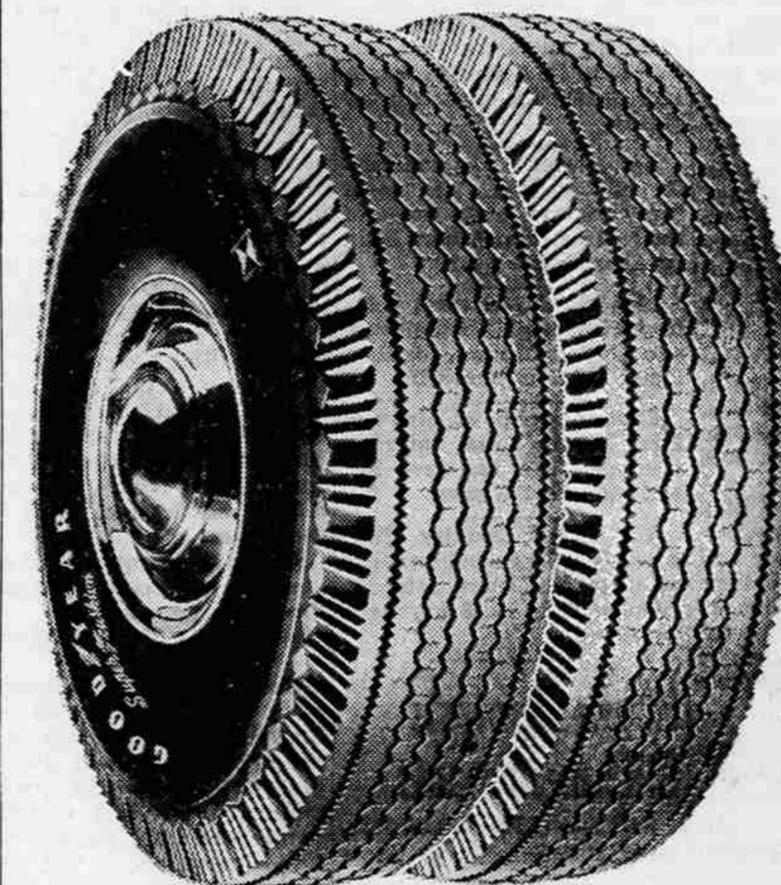
