

San Diego Adds to Lead With 10-8 Win Over Bees

San Diego made good use of baseball's most spectacular play—the home run—Wednesday night to outlast Salt Lake, 10-8, and gain a full game on second-place Phoenix in Pacific Coast league play.

The Padres slammed five homers, two by outfielder Dave Pope, off a quartet of Bee pitchers to go ahead in the middle innings and hold on for the win, which evened the series at one game apiece.

Phoenix, the victim of three Vancouver circuit clouts, dropped a 10-5 decision and its second straight to the Mounties. The win left Vancouver two games off the pace and only a half game behind the Giants.

Portland In On Act
Portland also capitalized on the home run to make it two in a row over Seattle, 6-3, and Marshall Bridges struck out 10 batters while hurling Sacramento to its second straight over Spokane by a 1-0 score.

Larry Raines, Al Jones and Carroll Hardy connected for the other San Diego four-baggers. Jim Baumer and Pete Naton belted homers for the Bees. Hardy, a former half-back for the San Francisco Forty-Niners, drove in what proved to be the winning runs with his three-run smash in the seventh.

Starter Bob Alexander, who gave way to Dick Brodowski in the eighth, was credited with the victory. The loss went to Jim Hardison, the second Bee hurler.

Bridges Wins One
Vancouver collected 14 hits off four Phoenix pitchers to give Gordon Smith his fifth win. Joe Durham led the Mountie attack with his 18th homer, a two-run drive in the second. Ray Barker and Owen Friend also homered for the winners.

The Giants, home run kings in the PCL so far this year, could manage only one four-bagger—a solo shot by Jack Dittmer in the opening frame.

Bridges ran his league-leading strikeout total to 123 while holding Spokane scoreless, the third game in a row the Indians have failed to get a run. Bridges gave up only four hits.

The Solons scored the Bees' only run when Jim Westlake, who had singled and gone to third on a single by Jim Greengrass, came home on an infield out.

Jack Littrell and Frank Kellert led Portland to victory with a two-run homer apiece. Hal Bevan and Bill Shartzer homered for the Rainiers. Elmer Singleton went the distance to even his record at 8-8.

Spokane Indians Mark Record Attendance

Spokane—(UPI)—When the Los Angeles Pacific Coast League franchise was shifted here last winter, there were many who said the new operation was doomed to failure.

But there were a few die-hard fans who said Triple-A baseball would click the turnstiles at a merry pace, even though the national sport had been dead here for two years.

And they were right. With a good share of the home season still remaining, the Indians have played before 190,000 fans.

"That's tops in the minors," says manager Spencer Harris, general manager of the Los Angeles farm club. "We should draw 300,000."

In 1947, Spokane set a Class B attendance record which still stands when 287,000 jammed the old Ferris Field park.

"That proves Spokane is a good baseball town," says Harris. "The fans are here. They just want to see good baseball."

The fans now are offered the best accommodations. The park, built in 90-days, is perhaps the finest of its size in baseball. There isn't a bad seat in the place and they are all comfortable. Parking space is adequate and free.

"They have all the comforts of home, and that's what it takes to get them to the ballpark these days," says Harris.

Vets Should Contact VA For Liability Release

A veteran selling his home and GI mortgage should first contact the Veterans administration if he wishes to be released from liability to the government on his GI loan, S. T. Brannock, officer in charge of the Medford Veterans administration office, said today.

Such a release protects the veteran in the event the new purchaser defaults in payments, Brannock explained.

Brannock pointed out that a 1956 law allows veterans to be released from liability to the government, provided the new purchaser meets credit requirements and assumes the veteran's obligations to the government on the GI loan.

The new purchaser need not be a veteran, Brannock said, and the government's guaranty of the loan is not affected by releasing the veteran from his liability.

In most states the only cost of obtaining the release is a small fee, usually not more than \$5, for a credit report on the proposed buyer, Brannock said.

Release of the veteran from liability to the government does not automatically release him from liability to the lender.

However, the Veterans administration will furnish the prospective buyer's credit report to the lender, and otherwise assist any veteran who wishes to seek his lender's release.

Veterans administration makes no charge for this service, although the lender may require the payment of a nominal fee for the processing of his release, Brannock stated.

Hunting & Fishing Southern Oregon

It doesn't look like the fish have recovered from the 4th of July yet for the reports all indicate that fishing is only "medium." With a new moon phase this situation should improve and predictions are that there will be some excellent fishing for the next 10 days to two weeks.

Fish lake, Willow Creek Reservoir and 4-Mile Lake are only fair. Upper Klamath Lake reports that fishing is not good but the prospects are for an improvement. Bob Sloan of Harriman's Resort says that during the past week there was only one large fish taken and that was by old veteran E. L. Niederman who boated a 8½ pound beauty. Bob says there were a number of smaller fish taken but very few fishermen during the past week.

Diamond Lake has been slow with the best success on the deep troll with flasher and worms or Triple Teaser and the evening fly fishing when the fly hatch has been good. Saw two fish taken last Sunday on a No. 700 series green Hot Shot trolling the east shore. Most anglers figured that although the fishing was slow it would improve very shortly.

Deschutes River, East and Paulina Lakes have been just like the rest of the fishing front. The lakes will pick up shortly but the river fishing has reached its peak for the season.

With the increased number of fishermen on our lakes there is a growing concern about the litter and trash which is being "heaved" overboard in the way of sandwich wrappers, paper bags, bottles and cans. It not only creates an unsightly mess but is definitely detrimental to the fishing itself.

It has been demonstrated that small fish will enter beer cans to hide and become trapped. This can become a major hazard to the small fry. Bottles thrown overboard and washed into the rocks to be broken and strewn on the shallow portions of the lake create a hazard to bathers and waders alike.

The management at Diamond Lake are so interested in this litter problem that they are going to furnish litter bags with the boats in hopes that the anglers will save their trash to be disposed of back at the landing.

Recently when I was at Paulina Lake I noticed that they had a rack of litter bags available for the fishermen and were asking that these bags be used. In many portions of the lake the beer can-bottle array on the bottom was very unsightly.

This might not seem too important at the present time but if one considers that with the thousands of persons using these lakes, it is possible that in the foreseeable future these lakes could well become a garbage dump.

These jewels set as they are among the majestic hills deserve our very best care. Let's extend our litter bug campaign to include our lakes and streams. Let's preserve the great outdoors so it can be enjoyed by everyone for all time.
