Gorilla Killed After Escape

Antwerp, Belgium—UPI—A seven-foot gorilla escaped from a zoo Saturday and panicked the city for 2½ hours before being shot dead on a housetop.

Seven-year-old "Kobus" whose keepers reckon had the strength of five men broke out of his cage while being fed this morning.

He climbed a tree in the zoo and from there sprang over the wall. After shambling along a street and terrorizing early morning shoppers clambered up the front of a house.

From there he worked his way along a row of rooftops while police and firemen cordoned off the area and evacuated the houses.

Firemen kept Kobus at bay on his perch 150 feet above street level with powerful hoses while zookeepers made plans to recapture him.

The ape became frightened apparently and went berserk and started smashing roof tiles and chimney pots. Zoo officials decided he was too dangerous to try to capture him alive and reluctantly ordered him shot by police who had climbed up to nearby rooftops.

Kobus toppled off the roof after taking six heavy bullets in the chest. His body smashed two window verandas on the way down before coming to rest on a third.

Wife Must Move to Home Selected by Husband

When Mr. Jones developed a bad case of asthma, the doctor told him that there was no hope of improvement as long as he stayed in Chicago where he and his wife had always lived. Although he would never again be able to hold a job because of his condition, asthma sufferers sometimes find relief in other climates, the doctor said.

Jones then visited relatives in Phoenix, Ariz., and while there had no asthma whatever. He was offered a job and wrote to his wife that he was going to change his home to Phoenix because he would be able to work regularly,

there without having any more trouble from asthma. His wife wrote back that she would not think of moving, for all her family and friends were in Chicago.

Brought Divorce Suit

One year, then two years went by and she still refused even to go to Arizona to visit him. He was working regularly and making good money. At long last he brought a suit for divorce claiming his wife had deserted him.

Is there a valid ground for divorce?

Yes. The husband must provide a home for his wife and family and has a right within reason to choose the place

where they shall live. Under ordinary circumstances it is the duty of the wife to submit to his choice. Her refusal constitutes desertion.

In this case the husband could not earn a living and support his family in Chicago because the climate there made it impossible for him to work. The asthmatic condition resulted in his inability to perform one of the main responsibilities of a husband and the head of a household. There was no indication of lack of good faith on his part.

Of course, the right of the husband to select the location of the home is not an arbitrary one. He must exercise the right with due consideration for the wife. He cannot select the place they live with utter disregard for the welfare, comfort, health or peace of mind of the wife.

In Good Faith

The selection must be in good faith and not as a scheme to place the wife in a position where she will suffer from the choice. He cannot willfully scheme to place her in a position to make a choice between ill health and refusal to follow her husband for the purpose of acquiring grounds for divorce.

Desertion is a ground for divorce in nearly all of the states. The time one must be away to constitute grounds for divorce varies among the states from one to five years.

Obviously it is not desertion where a man is drafted into the Armed Services and prohibited from taking his wife with him.

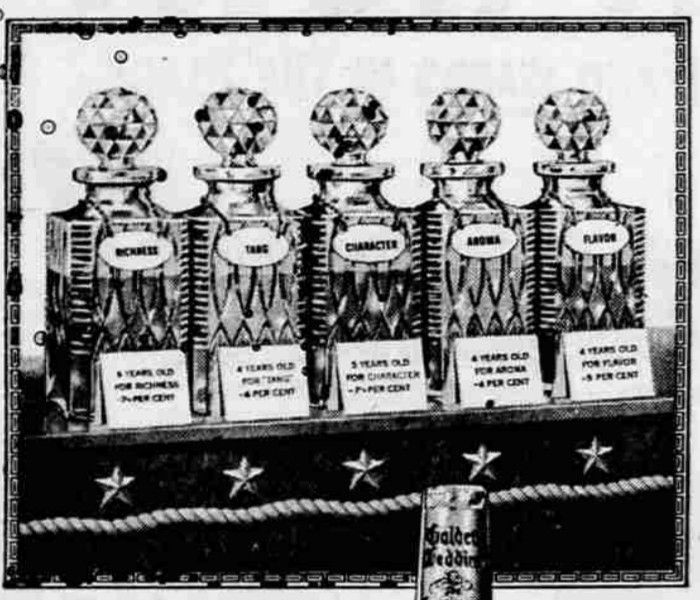

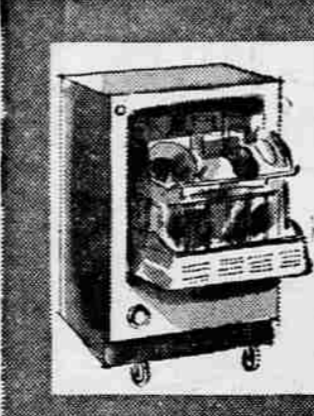

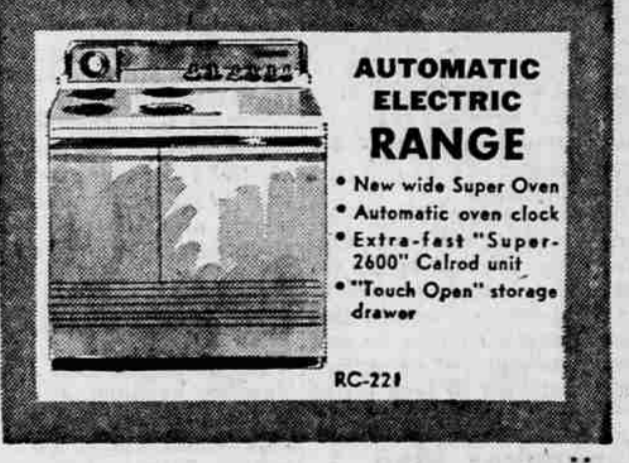
