

# Dow Finsterwald Garner's PGA Toga With 276 Count

Havertown, Pa.—(UP)—His dad wanted him to be a lawyer, but Dow Finsterwald was glad today he decided to become a professional golfer.  
For he won the PGA championship with a pressurized par-busting round in a head to head battle with old Slammin' Sam Snead, and it enabled him to beat out Billy Casper by two strokes for one of the most coveted titles in the business.  
In addition to winning the first place money of \$5,500—raising his money winnings

this year to \$25,423 and making the total \$102,000 during the past four years—the triumph Sunday took Finsterwald out of "the bridesmaid class."  
"Broke the Ice  
"I sure was tired of being a bridesmaid," said the smiling, good natured 28-year-old pro from Athens, Ohio, after his 31-36-87, three under par, gave him a 276 and a two stroke victory over Billy Casper in the 40th annual PGA tourney. Snead slipped to third place, four strokes off the pace.

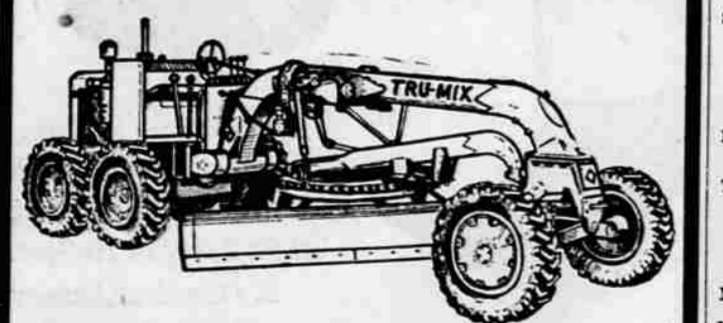

# Salt Lake Looms As PCL Contender

The already scrambled Pacific Coast league pennant race had a new contender for first place today—Salt Lake City.  
The free-swinging Bees, who have been holding down fourth place for more than a month, swept a doubleheader from San Diego Sunday to drop the Padres out of first and move to within 4 1/2 games of the top spot themselves. Aided by five San Diego errors, the Bees coasted to an 8-5 victory in the seven-inning opener, then came up with a 21-hit assault in the finale to win going away, 19-5.  
The sweep gave Salt Lake the series, five games to two, and dropped San Diego into second place, a half game in back of Vancouver.  
The Mounties closed out a highly successful week at Phoenix with a 4-0 victory. George Bamberger scattered eight singles to pick up his fourth shutout and ninth win of the year and give Vancouver the series, five games to one. A crowd of 5,785 swelled the week's total to 40,008—an all-time record for a PCL series in the British Columbia city.  
Sacramento defeated Spokane, 6-4, and Portland dumped Seattle twice, 9-4, and 4-3, in other games.  
Salt Lake battered losing pitcher Bud Podbielan, who went all the way in what must have been the pitchers' nightmare of the year, for 14 runs in the second inning, three in the sixth and two more in the seventh. The 14-run second frame was two shy of the all-time PCL mark set by the old Salt Lake Bees against Vernon in 1923.  
The Bees pounded out 13 hits in the big inning, including a home run, two triples and three doubles, as the Utah club batted around twice. Dick Barone and Joe Christoffer both homered for the winners.
