Moscow—Nikita Khrushchev, in a message to President Eisenhower accepting the White House's proposal for a conference of government heads within the framework of the U.S. Security Council:

"The Soviet government considers that the threat to world peace at present has reached a dangerous level, so much so that no time should be lost in arguing. This cannot but delay the time of reaching agreement and the adoption of all possible and immediate steps to prevent the outbreak of a world conflict."

Genève—Dr. Nahum Goldmann, president of the World Jewish Congress, after contending that the world's 12 million Jews face a harder battle to maintain their own customs and traditions now that anti-Semitism is on the increase:

"Anti-Semitism has become a minor factor in our life and Jewish poverty is no longer substantial. Our people know how to behave heroically in bad times but have not yet learned to live creatively in good times."

Washington—House Speaker Sam Rayburn, announcing to newsmen he had informed supporters of the Hawaiian citizenship bill that he would oppose calling the measure up for a vote in the House this year:

"I told these people I thought they were making a mistake in trying to pass that bill this year."

Chicago—Rev. Cyril P. Wagner, American Catholic priest who came home Wednesday after five years of imprisonment in a Chinese Red jail:

"The Communists have even rounded up the 65 Chinese priests who were trained by the missionaries and are trying to re-educate them."

Dayton, Ohio—Widower Steve Horsley, 73-year-old great-grandfather, following announcement that he will wed an 18-year-old girl next Monday:

"A body needs someone to come home to at night, somebody to talk to and go to church with."

Steelworkers Quit At Timken Plant

Canton, Ohio—UPD—More than 9,000 members of the United Steelworkers Union walked off their jobs at Timken Roller Bearing Co. plants in four Ohio cities Wednesday night.

Picket lines were set up at four plants here and at plants in Columbus, Wooster and Zanesville as the third shift went on. Workers observed picket lines at the plants and picketing was reported orderly. Union leaders said the strike resulted from differences of "a fraction of a cent" over a new pension contract.

Washington—UPD—Back stairs at the White House:

President Eisenhower canceled plans to participate in the current Civil Defense exercise, "Operation Alert," because of the Mideast crisis. Before the revolt in Iraq, he had planned to fly by helicopter to one of the secret sites set up for emergency evacuation of the federal government in case of attack.

Indian Tribe Study Scheduled by OSC

Portland—UPD—Tentative approval was given on a contract for two studies costing an estimated \$100,000 to be undertaken by Oregon State college for a research program on natural and sociological resources of the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation.

Don C. Foster, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Portland area director, announced Wednesday that the contract—already approved by the Warm Springs General Council, the college, and the Oregon State Board of Higher Education—had been given a tentative okay by Glenn L. Emmons, Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

The studies will take two years each, Foster said.

Water Development In Russia Told

Portland—UPD—Maj. Gen. E. C. Itschner, chief of Army engineers, said yesterday that Russia is developing water resources on a large scale.

He said the Soviet Union has built or has under construction 10 projects that will develop more power than this country's biggest dam, Grand Coulee.

Gen. Itschner said the development of water resources "is a very important program in Russia, second in priority only to atomic power and missiles."

He added that he was not suggesting this country match the Russian power program. He said water resources in this country were well developed in comparison to Russia where there are vast undeveloped resources.

Machinist Union Votes to End Strike

Portland—UPD—Members of Mt. Hood Lodge 1005 of the Machinists Union voted Wednesday night to end a strike at the Freightliner Corporation here and a union official said they would return to work today.

About 170 employees had been affected by the strike which shut down truck manufacturing operations at the plant June 26.

Verle Russell, business agent for the union, said the men accepted an agreement calling for a 37½-cent hourly wage increase to be spread out over a three-year period. Twelve cents of this is retroactive to June 1 and will bring the present scale to \$3.64 an hour.
