Pairings Announced For Oregon Ladies' Softball Tourney

Medford, Ore. (Special)—Pairings for the annual women's state softball tournament of the Oregon State Softball Association were announced by State Director Bob Robertson yesterday following a meeting at the Veterans Administration Domiciliary, Camp White.

Two games each at the Eagle Point High school field and the VA's Memorial stadium are slated on the opening night, Thursday, Aug. 7.

At Eagle Point high the Klamath Falls Basinettes will battle the Madras Merchants at 7:30 p.m. with Eugene McCulloch Chain Saw and Astoria rivals at 9 p.m. The Salem Shamrocks will tussle Springfield in the starter at Memorial stadium and the Rogue Valley Dairy Maids will oppose Hillsboro in the second round.

The tournament, a double elimination affair will extend through Sunday, Aug. 10. All Friday, Saturday and Sunday games will be played on the Camp White diamond of the VA.

Robertson at the Wednesday session discussed tournament plans with committee members of the Eagle Point Lions club and with officials of the VA domiciliary. The Lions club is tournament sponsor. The state director, who resides at Albany, also inspected the stadium facilities.

At Least 14 Games

A program of 14 and possibly 15 games will be offered by the tourney. There will be four games on Friday and Saturday, as well as Thursday, and two or three contests on Sunday.

Medford Yankees completed a five-game unbeaten season in the intermediate circuit of the Southern Oregon Junior Baseball league yesterday by clipping the Medford Giants 14 to 1.

The champions got the jump early in the game with seven runs in the first inning.

Other games saw Lone Pine whip Central Point 5 to 0 and Ashland blank Jacksonville 10 to 0.

The Yankees runs in the first inning were on a double by Bob Schroeder, two hits by Jim Calhoun and other singles by Jim Berry and Dick Deffley. Calhoun hit four for five in the tussle. Mike Barnes, pitching five innings, yielded three of the Giants four hits and struck out batters eight times.

Lone Pine flinger Bud Lowery subdued Central Point with a two hitter, walking five and fanning eight. The Piners got only four hits but had the aid of 11 bases on balls and five wild pitches.

Bob King, on the hill for Ashland, turned in a one-hit task with seven strikeouts and four bases on balls. Steve Harris homered for the winners.

Lewiston took over first place Wednesday night with a 5-3 overtime victory over Salem but Tri-City and Yakima are only percentage points behind.

Hillis Layne personally put the Bronces out in front of the pack with a two-run homer in the last of the 12th as the Bronces won their third game straight.

Ken Moursund went the route for the winners scattering 10 hits in winning his eleventh game.

Tenth Straight

Tri-City piled up its tenth straight victory with a wild 12-8 decision over Yakima. Ray Looney got the Braves two runs in the first with a triple and the Braves broke it open with eight runs in the second.

Vern Piver had a two-run single in the big frame and Al Muench added a three-run double.

Joe Drotar, third Tri-City pitcher, came on in the third and went the rest of the way to wrap up the decision.

Wenatchee scored once in the bottom of the ninth to nip Eugene 4-3. Stu Hanson went the distance for the winners allowing seven hits for his seventh victory of the year.

Los Angeles (UPI)—Ranking heavyweight contender Zora Folley battles a personal "jinx" Friday night against Pete Rademacher in a bout that may decide the next challenger for champion Floyd Patterson.

Folley, almost certain to enter the ring for the nationally televised 10-round bout as the favorite, has won 43 of 45 professional fights, but his only losses have been in the Olympic auditorium where Friday's fight is being staged.

The charity "Fight for Lives" will be blacked out within a 150-mile radius of Los Angeles.

Folley's only pro setbacks have been at the hands of Johnny Summerlin and Young Jack Johnson, early in his career. His loss to Johnson came after he suffered a rib injury in a gym workout.

Olympic matchmaker George Parnassus said today that he was asking the National Boxing Association and the California Athletic Commission to recognize the winner of Friday's bout as the No. 1 contender for the title.

Klamath River Closure Lifted

A couple of new "whiz kids" got Eddie Sawyer off to a dilly of a start in Philly. The two youngsters were Harry Anderson and Ray Semproch, both of who were still playing on the sandlots when Sawyer led the original "whiz kids" to a National league pennant in 1950.

Together, they provided Sawyer with a warm welcome back as manager of the Phillies Wednesday night when they combined in a pair of victories over the San Francisco Giants.

Anderson belted a three-run homer to give the Phils a 3-1 triumph in the completion of a game suspended on June 22. Then Semproch pitched a five-hitter to blank the Giants 2-0, in a regular scheduled contest.

Anderson's homer came in the sixth inning off southpaw Johnny Antonelli and it made Sawyer look like a genius. Ex-manager Mayo Smith used to platoon the left-handed-hitting Anderson. One of the first things Sawyer said upon taking over the Phillies was that he would play the 26-year-old outfielder against all kinds of pitching.

Braves Take Lead

Semproch never permitted a Giant runner to advance past second base as he achieved his 12th victory in the second game. Philadelphia scored its first run off southpaw Mike McCormick in the opening frame on a walk and two singles and Bob Bowman homered with the bases empty in the fourth.

The two losses knocked the Giants out of first place. Milwaukee moved a full game in front on Joey Jay's two-hit 6-0 triumph over St. Louis. Jay struck out seven and didn't walk a man as he posted his sixth victory and third shutout of the season. Only Cardinal hits off Jay were singles by Gene Freese in the fifth and Don Blasingame in the ninth.

Pittsburgh climbed out of the cellar and shoved Los Angeles into it by sweeping a doubleheader from the Dodgers, 11-3, and 6-3. Ronnie Kline scored his 10th victory in the opener and Bob Friend his 12th in the nightcap.

Steve Biko's two-run homer helped the Dodgers jump to a quick first inning lead in the first game but Roberto Clemente's three-run homer in the fourth followed by Frank Thomas' 27th homer enabled the Pirates to clinch the victory. Dick Stuart contributed four hits, including a pair of triples.

Yanks Best Lary

Friend, like Kline, fell behind in the first inning of the nightcap when he gave up two runs but the Pirates rallied with five in their half of the frame. Friend struck out 10 but still required relief in the ninth from Roy Face.

Frank Robinson's two-run homer in the 10th inning brought the Cincinnati Reds legs from behind to a 6-5 win over the Chicago Cubs. Robinson hit his homer off loser Don Elston after Bobby Thomson had homered off winner Hal Jeffcoat in the top of the inning to put Chicago ahead. George Crowe also homered for the Redlegs.

The Yankees ran all over the Tigers, 16-4, in beating Frank Lary for the first time this season and stretching their American league lead to 13 games.

Lary, who had beaten the Yanks five straight times this year, departed in the sixth on the short end of a 4-0 score. The Bronx Bombers rallied for six runs off Hank Aguirre in the seventh and piled up six more in the ninth. Mickey Mantle and Yogi Berra each homered and drove in four runs while Norm Siebern also homered in an 18-hit attack that brought Art Ditmar his sixth victory.

Hurls Five-Hitter

Jim (Mudcat) Grant hurled a five-hitter for Cleveland and battery-mate Russ Nixon drove in three runs in a 5-3 decision over Washington. Nixon homered in the second inning and then doubled home two runs off Pedro Ramos in the seventh to break a 3-3 tie. Gary Geiger also connected

Rogue River Trout Luck Improving

Portland—UPI—The weekly report on fishing conditions prepared by the State Game Commission:

Southwest: Summer steelhead angling has been good in the Steamboat vicinity. Salmon angling at Winchester bay remains slow. Some sea-run cutthroats are being taken in Gardiner area on lower Umpqua.

Cos Bay bar is improving for salmon angling. Sea-run cutthroats are appearing in lower Coquille river.

Salmon angling on lower Rogue at the jaws is picking up and has been fair to good.

Trout fishing in the upper Rogue and north fork area is improving after the series of thunder showers and muddy waters.

Central: East fork Hood river is fair to good. Very good catches of 9 to 10 inch eastern brook have been taken by fly fishermen at Wantum lake. Challe lake is good. Other lakes in this area have been very good. Trout fishing on the Deschutes in the Maupin and Oak Springs area has been very good. Some 10 to 14 inch fish are being landed. Angling at East and Paulina lakes has been fair to good. Kokanee angling at Crane Prairie reservoir has been excellent in Quinn river channel and Cultus river channel. North Twin lake is good both on flies and salmon eggs. South Twin lake is good. Ochoco reservoir is good with most fish being taken on troll with small lures. Devil lake on the North Century drive has been fair to good for late evening fly fishermen.

Odeh lake is still slow with a few small catches of kokanee and rainbow reported. The fish out of Davis lake are large and in good condition.

There are still some nice catches being made via the slow troll but it is slow. The water is starting to lower now and it is hoped that fishing will pick up soon. Willow Creek reservoir is doing about the same—so, so fishing.

SINGLE EGGS AND FLIES

Word from Diamond lake says that for the past week the fishing was slow. The weather has been very good and this may account for the letup in fishing. Best methods have been the single egg during the middle of the day and flies for the evening.

A strange thing about this Diamond lake fishing is that some anglers have excellent success while others go fishless. Sometimes this isn't all accident. Barring the anglers who have unusual skill there is another class who like to aid their luck a bit by chumming.

Rogue Access Tract Acquired

Portland—Acquisition of the Wickham tract of 26 acres on the lower Rogue river was given the go-ahead by the game commission at its meeting last week to provide angler access to this important stretch of river.

The tract is popularly known as the Alameda bar just below the town of Galice and is a popular boat launching and bank angling area for lower river fishermen.

Purchase of the Alameda tract culminates a long term program of the game commission in acquiring angler access sites along the entire length of the main Rogue river. With the inclusion of the Alameda bar, 13 sites have been acquired and developed for public access by the game commission. On several of these sites the game commission has cooperated with Josephine county, Jackson county, or the highway department in the development.

Eight other sites along the Rogue have been developed by the highway department or Josephine county. The Grants Pass Izaak Walton League has also provided a concrete boat launching site at Grants Pass.

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
