Drivers Licenses Suspended Listed

Salem — The department of motor vehicles has released names of 321 drivers whose licenses were ordered suspended during the period beginning July 14 and ending July 18.

Length of suspension varies, depending on charges involved, recommendation of court, discretionary action by the department or requirements of Oregon law. The department said some of the licenses involving financial responsibility and court recommendations may have been reinstated after suspension was ordered.

The department warned drivers that the penalty for driving while suspended is a jail sentence of no less than two days and up to six months; and there may be imposed a fine up to \$500. Under licensing procedures, this will also result in an additional year of suspension.

Railroad Fails To Reach Destinations

Akron, Ohio—(UPI)—The Akron, Canton & Youngstown Railroad goes neither to Canton nor Youngstown, although it has tried to bridge the gap for 77 years.

When the road was originally planned in 1881, it was supposed to stretch west from Akron to St. Louis, Mo., and east to New Castle, Pa., but it never got to either point.

A series of owners felt victim to bankruptcy trying to extend the line to various new terminals without success. But despite its length—177 miles—the road is a prime favorite of Akron shippers because it connects with nine different north-south railroads at 21 different junction points.

New York—(UPI)—Stocks rose to new 50-week highs today on moderately active trading with chemicals, oils, selected steels, and special issues strong.

The industrial average approached the 500 mark and the general average set a new high since Aug. 9, 1937. Utilities managed to score another small rise on top of one Wednesday after seven sessions of decline.

Net gains extended to more than two points in the general list.

New highs in the chemicals included Air Reduction, Dow, Hooker, Pennsalt, Union Carbide and Vick.

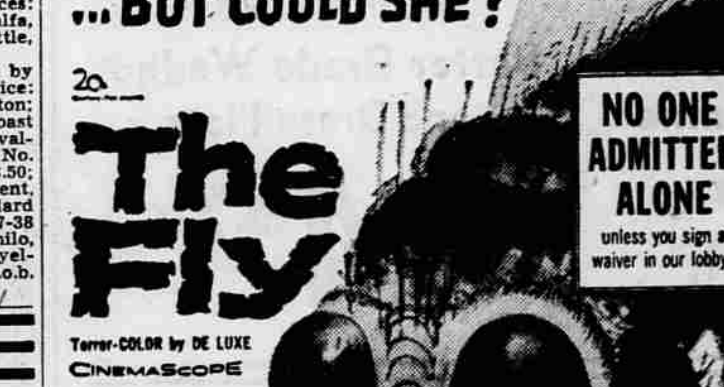
