

First Victory Over Dodgers In 7 Years Sweet for Spahn

Victory tasted just as sweet for Warren Spahn today even though he was the first to admit the Dodgers "ain't what they used to be."

"They aren't the team of old, but I feel good anyway," said the Great Milwaukee Braves left-hander after beating Los Angeles, 4-3, Wednesday night for the first time in seven years. "A good pitcher is supposed to beat 'em all."

That, of course, had been a sore point with Spahn over the years. Eight times a 20-game winner and a strong Hall of Fame candidate, he nevertheless had to listen to the whispers that the Braves were afraid to start him against the Dodgers. The theory was logical enough—why expose even a great left-hander to the Dodgers' right-handed power when there was a reasonable alternative?—but it hurt Spahn's pride, nevertheless.

Drops Giants To Second
So, Wednesday night, the 37-year-old Spahn "proved his point," at least to a degree, against a Dodger lineup packed with eight right-handed batters. He pitched a six-hitter, struck out six, yielded only two earned runs and wound up with a perfect

night when his victory knocked the San Francisco Giants out of first place. The Giants dipped a point behind the Braves when they lost to Bob Purkey and the Cincinnati Redlegs, 5-1.

The Philadelphia Phillies defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-1, and the Pittsburgh Pirates scored a 7-1 victory over the Chicago Cubs in a game rained out after 7½ innings in the other N.L. activity.

In the American League, the Kansas City Athletics spoiled Casey Stengel's 63rd birthday celebration with a 4½-inning rain-shortened, 2-0 victory but the New York Yankees retained their 14-game lead anyway because the Detroit Tigers beat the Boston Red Sox, 2-1. The Cleveland Indians downed the Baltimore Orioles, 6-3, and the Chicago White Sox outslugged the Washington Senators, 11-9, in other games.

Mathews' Homer Wins
Two Milwaukee errors helped the Dodgers gain a 3-2 lead in the sixth inning but the Braves tied the score on Del Crandall's triple and Felix Mantilla's sacrifice fly in the seventh and won the game in the eighth on Ed Mathews' 21st homer of the year.

Purkey pitched a five-hitter and singled home two late-inning insurance runs to beat the Giants for the third time this year. Walt Dropo and Pete Whisenant homered off Johnny Antonelli.

Richie Ashburn's triple and singles by Harry Anderson and Dave Philley sparked a three-run third-inning rally that chased Billy Muffett and enabled Jack Sanford to win his seventh game for the Phillies.

Rookie George Witt struck out 10 batters and won his fourth game for the Pirates with eighth-inning relief aid from Bob Porterfield. Frank Thomas knocked in two runs with a bases-filled single and Hank Folles hit a three-run homer for the big blows in Pittsburgh's attack.

Grim's First For K.C.
Ex-Yank Bob Grim struck out five and yielded three hits in winning his first game for Kansas City. A homer by Chico Carrasquel in the first inning and doubles by Roger Maris and Hal Smith in the fourth produced the A's runs.

Ex-Boston pitcher George Susce Jr. yielded seven hits, one Gene Stephens' homer, as the Tigers handed 10-game winner Ike Delock his second straight defeat.

The Indians snapped Arnold's Portocarrero's six-game winning streak when they scored four runs in the sixth inning with the help of Larry Doby's triple and three Baltimore errors.

An eight-run third inning enabled the White Sox to fend off the Senators in the late innings and score their fifth victory in six games. Al Smith and Luis Aparicio homered for the White Sox and Jim Lemon and Eddie Yost connected for the Senators.

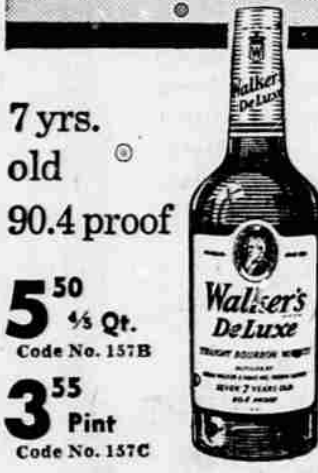

Antelope Hunt Requests Must Be In Shortly

Portland — Antelope hunters and those who wish to be in on the Wallowa controlled deer hunt drawings are urged by the state game commission to submit applications immediately.

The deadline for submitting applications is Aug. 6. All applications received after that date will not be allowed in the drawings.

A total of 600 tags will be issued for the antelope hunt, 200 for each of the three areas. Hunters who received antelope tags last year are not eligible to participate this year. A fee of \$5 must be submitted with the application.

There are 500 tags available for the Wallowa controlled deer hunt. This hunt is primarily a pack show in the heart of the Minan country and provides the hunter an opportunity to take two deer, a buck on his regular deer tag and an antlerless deer on the controlled deer tag. A fee of \$5 must be submitted for the controlled tag at the time of submitting applications.

The drawing for these early season hunts will be held August 11 and tags mailed to successful applicants on August 27. The Wallowa controlled deer hunt is scheduled for August 30 through September 3.

Poles Promised Chance To See Rafer Johnson

Warsaw—(UPI)—Polish sports fans were promised today they'll get a glimpse of the "world's greatest athlete," Rafer Johnson in Friday's U.S.-Poland track and field meet, even if his performance won't count in the final score.

U.S. head coach George Eastman of Manhattan college said Johnson had not been entered as a competitor here since there is no death-incentive event. But he will appear as an added, unofficial entry in at least one event so Polish fans can see him.

Johnson, who set a new world record of 8,302 points at Moscow as the U.S. men's team defeated Russia, has been one of the most popular team members among enthusiastic Polish fans who have been cheering the U.S. team since its arrival Wednesday.

The Poles went all out to make the Yanks welcome, even loading up on gallons of orange and lemon juice, which sell at prohibitive prices here, for the U.S. training table. And the 80,000-seat "Tenth Anniversary" stadium on the banks of the Vistula river is expected to be sold out for the two days of competition which start Friday.

Webb Triumphs Over Suzina

New York—(UPI)—Spider Webb, who stopped Germany's Franz Suzina with a "new punching pattern," apparently will test the gimmick against Joey Giardello at Pittsburgh, Sept. 17.

Webb, of Chicago, fifth-ranking middleweight contender, scored a technical knockout over blood-smeared Suzina at 1:20 of the seventh round Wednesday night in their TV fight at Madison Square Garden.

And the Spider explained today: "I stopped him with a new pattern of soft rights followed by dynamite when the opening came."

Truman Gibson, president of the International Boxing club, said, "I've advised Webb and manager Hector Knowles to accept the offer of Pittsburgh's Dapper Dan club for a 10-round TV fight with Joey Giardello at Forbes Field, Sept. 17."

The new stadium, to be built along San Francisco Bay at the southern edge of the city, will seat 45,000 fans and have parking space for 12,000 cars.
