Oregon Leads Nation in Production of Lumber

Portland—Lumber production in the United States during 1956 totalled 37.7 billion board feet according to the latest estimates by the bureau of census.

Oregon continues to be the leading state in the production of lumber, producing 8.4

billion feet, more than one-fifth of the national total, according to Harold K. Cherry, manager of the Portland field office of the department of commerce. California production amounted to 5.9 billion board feet and Washington 2.6 billion board feet, giving the Pacific coast a combined production of 45 per cent of the U.S. total. Idaho production amounted to 1.6 billion board feet in 1956.

The estimated stocks of lumber held by sawmills on Dec. 31, 1956, amounted to 6.1 billion board feet. This compared with 5.3 billion board feet on hand Dec. 31, 1955.

Douglas fir was the leading species of timber cut in the United States in 1956 accounting for 10.2 billion board feet. Southern yellow pine accounted for 7.4 billion board feet and ponderosa pine 3.6 billion feet. Hardwood lumber production in the U.S. amounted to 7.8 billion feet in 1956.

The above estimates are contained in annual facts for industry reports on Lumber Production and Mill Stocks for 1955 and 1956. Copies of the two reports are available from the Portland field office of the department of commerce for 10 cents each.

Tests Show Religious Interest Increases as Man Grows Older

New York—When 112 men were students together in one college, their interest in religion was slight but their interest in power and influence was great. Fifteen years later, when they were husbands and fathers and more or less successful in life, their interest in power and influence had diminished very little but their interest in religion had moved way

up and held a strong second place.

These provocative facts were obtained by Dr. Irving E. Bender, professor of psychology at Dartmouth College, by comparing the scores the men made in psychological tests when they were students and when they took the same tests 15 years later.

Psychology's scientific mission is to find out and understand what makes people tick, in relation both to their individualized inner selves and to all the things which are going on in the world they live in. The 15 years covered the span from the beginning of World War II to the present

crisis years of atomic and hydrogen bombs and the division of the world into two armed camps.

Apply to All

The 112 men are all Dartmouth men. To the extent that Dartmouth men are representative of Americans as a whole, Bender's newly obtained facts apply to all of us. As for what the facts reveal about the present state of the hearts and minds of Americans, Bender could only ask questions.

"Is the resurgence of religion a part of the widespread and expanding need to belong, the need to conform?" he asked. "Or is the change motivated by fear, not without an undertone of hope. Do circumstances compel one to despair of reason and invoke the ancient answer to trust in God?"

The psychological tests applied to the men are complex and designed to get down into the depths of their beings which they themselves may not know very well consciously. The results are checked for accuracy by measuring the results of any one against those of the others. Scientific psychology believes in them.

Mark of the Times

Bender tested to find out whether the turning to religion was a mark of the 112 men having matured in 15 years, or a mark of the times in which they are living. His results indicated the latter was the case. As a check, he tested current Dartmouth students. Their religious interest scores were similar to those of Dartmouth men who are now in their 40s.

In reporting his studies to the American Psychological Association, he noted that the most pronounced increases in religious interest were among the men who studied the social sciences in college and who now "operate a small, self-run business." He also found that the increased interest was more in the theological than the philosophical aspects of religion.

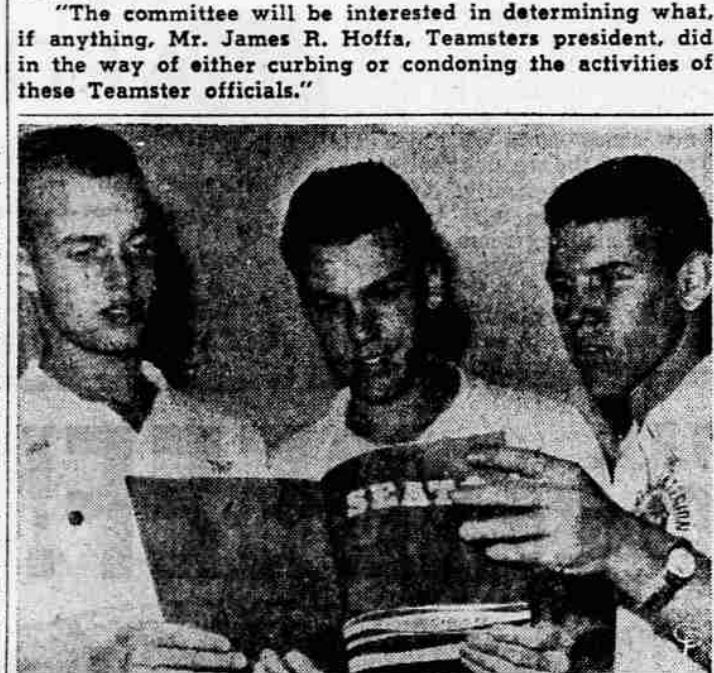

Long Beach, Calif.—(UPI)—The Coast Guard has broadcast an appeal for ships to report the position of the raft Lehi IV if it is spotted on its drifting trip to Hawaii. The request was made more than two weeks after the raft was towed to sea from nearby Redondo Beach by the fishing boat Redeemer of Israel. Nothing has been heard of

from skipper Devere Baker and the crew of three since, although the 18 by 28 foot raft is equipped with radio. The crew took enough food for three months. Coast Guard officials said there were no indications that the raft was in trouble, but that the service wanted to keep track of it just in case.
