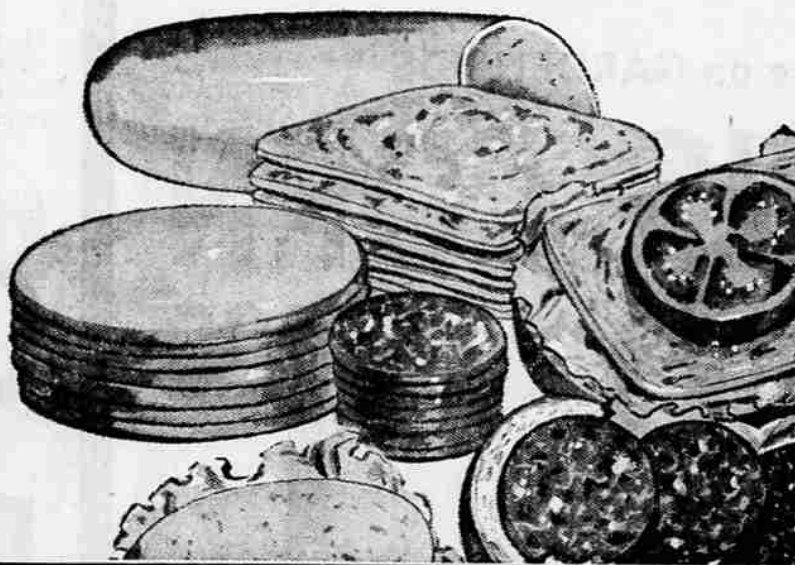

Girl May End Battle of Chain With President

Washington—(AP)—Blonde Angeline Cliett, 19, may end her battle with President Eisenhower Friday if he holds out and refuses to release a 10-pound chain from her neck.

Angeline took the chain from her grandfather's garage and locked it around her neck 17 days ago. Then she and her aunt mailed the only key to the President and drove from Texas to the capital.

Angeline wants the President to release the chain so she can tell him about the plight of some land to which her mother claims ownership in Texas. Her mother contends a federal court in Houston set aside her deeds to 700 acres of land "without a trial."

Refused Audience
Angeline has been refused an audience with the chief executive on grounds there is nothing he can do. But she continued her around-the-clock sit-down strike in front of the White House in 90-degree weather, hoping the President would see her anyway.

If he doesn't have a change of heart, Angeline said she would strike the chains from her neck herself on Friday because "I don't want to worry Mr. Eisenhower any more than necessary."

The White House has sent the key to guards who have offered it to Angeline several times.

A federal court recently issued a writ of seizure to the land Mrs. Cliett claims she owns. She has armed herself and refuses to leave.
