The Medical Roundup

The Inheritance of a Harelip

At the recent meeting of the American Association of Plastic Surgeons, Dr. Herbert Conway of New York said that his group had kept in touch with 196 mothers who already had borne one child with a harelip and a cleft palate.

Ordinarily, these defects occur once in some 700 births, but if a woman who has had a child with this defect should have another, it has one chance in 20 of also having a harelip.

In a study of 400 cases of harelip, Dr. Lyndon Peer, of Newark, N. J., a hereditary factor was found in one out of 4 cases. A parent, a grandparent or other relative had the defect. When no hereditary influence could be traced, Dr. Peer guessed that during pregnancy there might have been some deficiency in the nutrition of the mother.

A New Drug to Stimulate The Brain

At the meeting of the American Psychiatric Association, in San Francisco, much interest was displayed in a discussion of the new energizers which, instead of quieting people, are designed to give them more pep and energy and drive and sense of well-being. They often can pull a man out of a miserable depression. One of these drugs is iproniazid, which was first devised as a cure for tuberculosis.

If the new energizers turn out to be as good as it is hoped they will be, there doubtless will be more emptying out of people from mental hospitals. Unfortunately, not all new drugs turn out to be useful and safe when thoroughly tried out by many physicians. Today many a promising drug has to be abandoned because, in too many cases, it produces unpleasant or even dangerous side-effects.

At the convention five new drugs received particular attention. One, called imitramine hydrochloride, has been widely used in Europe to help people in depressions. Another drug is 2-diethylaminoethanol. Its use was described by Dr. Carl G. Pfeiffer, of Atlanta, Ga. It is helpful in mid depression, so-called neuro-rasthenia, schizophrenic withdrawal, fatigue states, and states in which old people draw back into themselves.

A third drug is called amphetamine-hydrate. Dr. H. V. Agin told of work with it. It is promising, especially in cheering up elderly and depressed people in hospitals.

Two other drugs were described by Dr. Anthony Sainz, of Marcy, New York. One, called methadone, pulled 90 of 100 depressed patients out of their distress. As yet, it is not on the market. Another drug promises to be helpful in quieting people who are manic.

Transplanted Glands

At a recent meeting of the American Association of Plastic Surgeons, Drs. George L. Jordan, Jr., and Riley P. Foster of Houston, Texas, told about transplanting a thyroid gland and some parathyroid glands into a patient, a man of 28, suffering greatly because his thyroid and parathyroid glands had had to be removed surgically. He received glands transplanted from a stillborn infant. There was no evidence later of function in the thyroid gland, but there was good evidence that the parathyroid glands were functioning and keeping the man comfortable. When a person's parathyroid glands are lost, his muscles keep cramping unless he gets large amounts of calcium with vitamin D. Another patient, a 53-year-old woman, also received as a transplant a thyroid and some parathyroid glands taken from an infant who had died. In this woman, also, the parathyroid glands functioned well for a time.

Psoriasis

At a recent conference on psoriasis sponsored by the New York Academy of Sciences, Dr. Jacob Bleiberg, of Newark, N. J., described encouraging results obtained with a lotion containing 2 percent coal tar extract. Patients were told to paint it on the lesions on only one side of the body, while using their old ointment on the other side.

After a six-week test-period, six of the patients had a clean skin on the side treated with the new lotion, while little change could be seen in the red spots on the other side of the body.

WICHE Session Set For Aug. 9

Frank J. Van Dyke, Medford, chairman and commissioner from Oregon of the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education, will attend the annual meeting of the commission at Boulder, Colo., Aug. 9-11.

Other Oregon commissioners are Dr. John Richards, Eugene, chancellor at Oregon higher education, and Mrs. Edna Scales, Sandy.

WICHE, an 11-state organization created five years ago by interstate compact, is responsible for promoting cooperative programs in higher education among the Western states. It administers a University student exchange program in the health sciences, makes studies of Western educational needs and resources, and sponsors or going regional councils in several professional fields. Three commissioners from each member state, appointed by the governors, direct a permanent Commission staff with headquarters on the University of Colorado campus at Boulder.

Educational television's uses will be dramatized at this year's meeting by a demonstration lecture which will be televised on the spot, to be viewed by the commissioners both in person and via telecast.

Panel reports on medical education in the West, and on the newly-launched Western Council on Mental Health Training and Research, also will be heard by the commissioners. A review of the commission's total program will follow on Sunday, and the group will adjourn after a business meeting August 11.

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New Cancer Clinic Series Under Way

The first of a regularly scheduled series of cancer clinics was held last week at Sacred Heart Hospital. The clinic is composed of local physicians and surgeons particularly interested in the problem of cancer treatment.

Patients are referred to the clinic by their attending physician. The history and physical findings are presented to the group, following which the case is discussed and recommendations made to the referring physicians.

Four patients were presented at the first clinic meeting. It was felt by those in attendance that the clinic was a worthwhile addition to the cancer program in the community. This service is at no cost to the patient.

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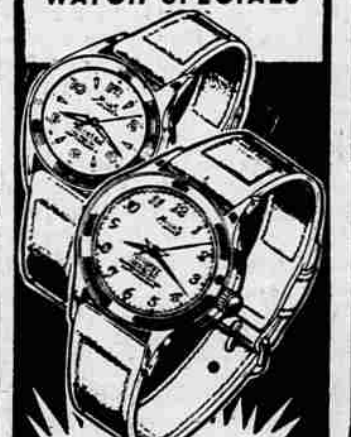
